Rickert helps lead Pioneer Trail completion project

The Grundy Register GRUNDY COUNTY - Former attorney and Reinbeck resident Mike Rickert has dedicated decades of his life to the Pioneer Trail in Grundy County.

Back in 1985, Rickert was instrumental in leading the group that first got the trail started, and to this day, Rickert still walks the trail almost every morning.

Now, 34 years after the trail was first started, Rickert is involved in an effort to finally get the trail completed, connecting the towns of Reinbeck, Morrison, Grundy Center and Hol-

Working together with the Reinbeck Development Corp, Grundy County Conservation, Butler-Grundy Development Corp and local cities, the group is hoping to connect the trail between all four towns (currently the trail is not connected between Reinbeck and Grundy Center) and eventually make the trail a hard surface trail (currently it's crushed rock).

"Having outdoor recreation here is so important," Rickert said. "We need some place for people to get outside, get on their bike or get walking. Right now, not a lot of people use the

trail because it's not finished and you can't walk or bike the whole trail; I could see if it was completed you could get a lot of people out on this trail."

Rickert said his passion to complete the Pioneer Trail was revived about a year ago, when he and his wife visited the Turkey River Trail between Clermont and Elgin.


Portions of that trail run along the highway ditch - something that would need to be done in order to connect the final segments of the Pioneer Trail. Though it will be a long process to work with the DOT, cities and various organizations to get the trail finished, Rickert says he knows it's possible.

"When I saw the [Turkey River Trail], it made me realize that if they can do it, so can we," he said.

Rickert said his dream would be to see the trail become a thriving focal point in outdoor recreation that could draw visitors from within and outside the community.

Jeff Kolb, Director of the Butler-Grundy Development Alliance, said the Pioneer Trail has the potential to make an im-

pact in Grundy County. "I see the Pioneer Trail being

something similar to the Rolling ty," Kolb said. "That trail sees and its usage increases each

hard surface. That was a game changer and that's one thing people say they really like when they visit."

Kolb says there's an amazing interest in trails nowadays, as they provide just one more amenity for attracting and keeping new residents to an area.

"A trail isn't the be-all endall, but it's just one more amenity that can attract and keep young families to an area," he said. "For a lot of young people that leave small towns, it's because there's not enough amenities, there's not enough to do. A trail is one attraction that could attract and keep those people in the area, and bring tourists from around the state. A lot of people look for trails like this where they can ride from town to town."

Kolb pointed to the river trail in southern Minnesota, which connects a series of small towns with a scenic trail.

What was once a dying group of small towns has been revitalized by the investments into the trail, which brings countless visitors during the summer and fall months.

D-NH student hopes to raise money for service dog

The Grundy Register DIKE-NEW HARTFORD -One local D-NH High School student, junior Tessa Smith, is on a mission to get herself a service dog, with a little help from friends, family, classmates and the community.

At just 18-months old, Tessa was diagnosed with a rare disease called Ataxia-telangiectasia, or AT. AT is a progressive, degenerative disease that affects part of the brain that controls muscles and movement, leaving many who are diagnosed - including Tessa - in a wheelchair.

The disease impacts a wide variety of muscle control, and progressively inhibits mobility, speech and other day to day functions. In addition, those diagnosed with AT often have immune system problems, parimmunodeficiency, ticularly making the risk of getting sick much more deadly.

Tessa, who has lived with the disease all her life, hopes that having a service dog will help

her become more independent. "I can't do a lot of stuff on my own, and I think a service dog would help because it could

American Lutheran Church receives mental health advocate award

GRUNDY CENTER - Recently, the American Lutheran Church in Grundy Center received a mental health advocate award for their work in helping reduce the stigma on mental health, and raise awareness of and support for mental health topics in the congregation and community.

The award is given each year during the Iowa Empowerment Conference to an organization that supports mental health.

This year, the Lutheran Church was nominated for the award by Brian Heeren, an area local who is a former president of the Empowerment Conference, which is sponsored by the National Alliance on Mental Illness.

In his letter of recommendation, Heeren writes how the church has always been supportive of mental health in the local community.

He noted that he's been invited on multiple occasions to speak to the congregation about mental health and provide info and answer questions on the

In addition, the church oversees the North Iowa Food Bank Mobile Pantry for people in Grundy County (and nearby counties), which delivers to the homes of people who are unable to come to the traditional food bank due to anxiety or other rea-

Heeren added that in general, the church and it's Pastor - Luther Thoreson - have done an excellent job in supporting congregation and community members dealing with mental illness themselves, or in their families.

"They have had people in their congregation who have attempted suicide, or people in their congregation who have lost love ones to suicide. They provide the family with support the same as any other death," Heeren wrote in his letter. "They have reached out to oth-

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ers in their community as well to lend support to those who have lost friends or family to suicide. They had a person who does suicide prevention come in and help them get more information on how to help others during this time."

According to data, studies show that 60 to 70 percent of religious organizations do not address or understand how to address mental health to their congregation - but that's not true for the American Lutheran Church.

'I am glad that Pastor Luther and his congregation are helping others by sharing information and support, and that's why I'm happy to nominate them for this award," Heeren wrote.

Pastor Luther Thoreson and his wife Paula accepted the award last month, and according to Luther, he feels it's important to address and support mental health issues just like any other issue.

"If I'm being honest, nearly everyone has a friend or relative with mental health issues, so why not talk about them," he said. "There's help for that just like there's help for physical issues. It really does touch everyone."

Thoreson says it's his goal to help open up the topic, and reduce some of the stigma associate with mental health.

"The whole goal is to open people up to these issues, start discussions and get people help if they need it," he said. "I want to give a big thank you to the congregation for being so open to including these things in our church, and for helping to support mental health discussions. The hope is to only grow this in

"If you go there on any weekend in the summer, it's like RAGBRAI there," he said. "On a once dying Main Street, there's now bike shops and pie shops and micro-breweries, and other things that bike enthusiasts enjoy.

let her membership in the Conrad Legion Auxiliary unit lapse. Now 96, she's still a regular presence at monthly meetings.

Unit 681, which started with 25 members, grew out of the United Service Women of America, and it met on the fourth Monday of each month. Reece fondly remembers the bake sales, ice cream socials, potluck dinners, Lions Club meals, flower shows, joint meetings with the men of the American Legion and the square dance demonstration that she participated in.

Before leaving for Florida, Reece rose through the ranks to hold practically all of the leadership positions with the Conrad unit and regularly attending state events. Current treasurer JoAnn Klein, an active promoter of Unit 681, its mission and its community activism, has relished the opportunity to learn from older members.

"It's awesome. I love the history," Klein said.

And even today, Reece can recite the preamble to the American Legion Auxiliary Constitution by heart. It's one of those things that will never leave her for as long as she lives.

The modern iteration of the Legion Auxiliary is a small but mighty group of women who work hard to promote patriotism and service, and sending a BCLUW High School student to Girls State every year is always a highlight. They regularly serve community meals on Veteran's Day and during city celebrations, and they're known for distributing poppies and "Quilts of Valor" to local veterans.

They're still working to attract younger members, but the ones they have are fountains of knowledge and enthusiasmeven the ladies who are closing in on 100 years old.

'It's just hardworking gals who enjoy their jobs," Reece said. "When I look back at all the things, all the rugs that were made and the blankets, I'm glad we did it."

dog (CARES, Inc. located in Kansas), Tessa was put on a two year waiting list, with the hopes of having a dog ready for her by December of 2019.

Once the dog is ready, Tessa is expected to have \$5,000 ready to pay for the dog, plus travel and lodging expenses to Kansas City for one week, where Tessa and the dog will train together.

A couple of the Smith family's friends, Burnette and Laura Dove, have organized an omelet breakfast fundraiser for Tessa at the New Hartford Community, located at 303 Broadway Street in New Hartford.

The breakfast will be held on Sunday, September 15 from 7:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m., and a portion of the breakfast proceeds will be donated to Tessa's family to help with the purchase of a service dog. There will also be a silent auction and bake sale.

For those who can't make it to the fundraiser breakfast but would still like to donate, the Smith family has an account set up at Veridian Credit Union in Cedar Falls and Waterloo. Since Tessa is a minor, the account is under Stephanie Smith's name but is labeled Tessa's Service Dog. Community members are welcome to donate to the ac-

Tessa, who has always been an animal lover, says she's beyond excited to be so close to finally getting a service dog.

"Every time we go out shopping anywhere, she's always buying stuff for the dog," Stephanie said. "She's got a whole closet filled with toys, dog bowls, collars and treats that she's bought for the dog with her own money.'

For her, Tessa says she's most excited about spoiling the dog, but she's prepared to be involved in every aspect of caring for the dog - even scooping up dog poop.

"To say she's persistent about it is an understatement; she's set a goal in her mind and she's

going after it," Stephanie said. "She's taken charge of the project all on her own. The big thing about Tessa is that she doesn't let her disability stop her from doing anything. She's the most positive person. She's always smiling, never complains and always has a positive outlook. She's also stubborn, and if she wants something she's going to go after it."

Stephanie says she's grateful to the friends and community members who've stepped up to plan the fundraiser breakfast for Tessa, and that she knows the family will be happy with whatever support they get from the community.

"People here are so generous, and I know we'll be happy after Sunday," Stephanie said. "Any little bit helps."

The regular school election will be held as a combined election with the regular city election on November 5, 2019. For the first time, the city/school election will be combined and will use the regular general election precincts. Voters will go to the polls for this election at the same place that they vote for a regular general (presidential or gubernatorial) election.

Eligible voters in Grundy County may request an absentee ballot for the city/school election from the Grundy County Auditor's Office. Requests for an absentee ballot to be mailed may be filed with the Grundy County Auditor's Office at this time through October 25.

The deadline to pre-register to vote in the city/school election is October 25. You may verify your voter registration at https://tinyurl.com/IASOS-VOTE. If an eligible voter is not already registered to vote, he or she may do so in one of 1. Register to vote by mail:

Voter registration forms are available on the Grundy County website - www.grundycounty. org – under the heading "Where do I?" Click on "Register to Vote" to download a voter registration form. The completed form should be delivered or mailed to your County Auditor. Mailed voter registration forms that are post-marked by October 21 are considered on time to pre-register even if they are received after October 25.

2. Register to vote in person at your County Auditor's Office by October 25 at 5:00 p.m.

3. Register to vote online: Voters may go to https://sos. iowa.gov/ and follow the online voter registration link. An Iowa driver's license or non-operator ID is required for online regis-

The "SAME DAY VOTER REGISTRATION" law allows a person who is eligible to register and vote on Election Day (November 5, 2019) by going to the polling place for the voting precinct in which the individual resides and completing a voter registration application, making a written oath, and providing proof of identity and residence. For more informa-

tion regarding same day voter registration, go to http://tinyurl. com/IOWAEDR. This "SAME DAY VOTER REGISTRA-TION" procedure may slow up the voting experience for voters choosing to wait until Election Day to register and vote at the polling site.

It is anticipated that absentee ballots will be available for the city/school election on October 7. This is the first day that voters may vote absentee in the Grundy County Auditor's Office for this election. 10 Years Ago This Week - 2009

Walking through the construction on the western edge of the Grundy County Memorial Hospital on an overcast day a week back, everything seemed to be coming together quickly: Ryan Bingman, Director of Operations at GCMH and Becky Dirks, Community Outreach Coordinator, both clad in hard hats, were clearly excited about the progress. "We are right on schedule. We have structural steel up, and the crane is gone now, so we're just doing the smaller steel and the roof decking," he said, motioning to the skeleton of the Acute Care area that was taking shape. "Even with the mud we had, the structural steel was able to go up, and we had a lot of the concrete poured in the Acute Care before the steel went up something that was scheduled to be poured after the steel — so that has helped out quite a bit." It's hard not to be excited as the \$13.5 million modernization project, announced in early June this year, continues to run on track to hit the projected opening date of June 2020.

25 Years Ago This Week - 1994

Three Grundy Center Lady Spartan basketball players and their coach and his wife joined 16 Iowa high school basketball girls and five adults on a trip to Russia this past August to play basketball against some of Russia's finest. Lynn Folkedahl, Megan Modlin and Alison Weichers, along with Coach Jodi Bermel and his wife Kathy, became a part of the Northeast Iowa Select Team which traveled to Russia, playing against various Russian teams. The American group was quickly introduced to a different lifestyle compared to life in the United States. The Russian culture took some getting used to, and the Americans appreciated the hospitality that the Russians extended them. Time was spent sightseeing the magnificent architecture of the buildings such as the Kremlin, and Lenin's Tomb, and St. Basil's Cathedral in Red Square. Their favorite events were a Moscow River boat ride, the circus, eating at the Moscow McDonald's, and winning a few games. The trip was a once-in-a-lifetime event for the group, and it served as a reminder to be appreciative for some of the small things that many Americans take for granted. Two youths received leg cuts in a car-motorcycle accident near the intersection of Main and Center Streets in downtown Conrad at 2 p.m. Sunday. They were Kenneth Sanderson, 19, of Beaman, and David Stone, 15, of Conrad. Both were treated by Dr. Glendon Button and then released. The mishap occurred when a Honda motorcycle driven by Sanderson was struck by a car backing from the curb. The motorist, Sarah C Arter, 53, of Waterloo, was ticketed for making an improper start. Sanderson's bike and Mrs. Arter's 11963 Pontiac each received an estimated \$150 damage.

Twelve justices of the peace and mayors handled 1,350 minor court cases in Grundy county during 1968, according to a report issued this week by Stale Auditor Lloyd Smith — and more than half of the cases were processed in two mayors courts. Ten justices and two mayors collected \$17,288.02 in fines last year, the Auditors report shows. Another \$2,610 was collected by the Clerk of District Court, bringing to \$10.898 02 the amount of fines levied by nil courts In the county Of this total, \$14,786.40 was apportioned to the county's five community school districts plus six others. In addition to fines, the justices and mayors collected an unspecified sum In court costs which is the reimbursement to the Justices for time and expenses resulting from operation of the court. The Justices receive no other remuneration than court costs; mayors, of course, receive a small salary for being mayor.

75 Years Ago This Week - 1944

The Grundy County Poor Farm, better known as the Grundy County Home, is going out of business. The 160-acre farm and buildings have been rented to Herman Sietsema for the coming year, on a cash and share rent basis. Possession will be given March 1st. The county home will be continued until the new tenant takes possession next March. The farm equipment and livestock owned by the county and stored and housed at the county farm will be disposed of at public auction. Lewis Aswegan, who has been steward at the county farm the past seven years, will take up other work after his contract with the county expires on March 1st. The home for Grundy county's poor is being closed because there are not enough patrons for it. Poor patronage for a county home is no discredit to any county. There are now only three inmates at the county farm. The enrollment at the county home has been dropping down ever since 1933.

Earl Graham Jr., son of Mr and Mrs. Earl Graham of Waterloo and former residents of Grundy County, is in the veterans' hospital in Springfield, Mo., for hospitalization. He was with the American Army In Italy. He received shrapnel wounds in one leg a few months ago and was sent home for care and treatment. He was inducted into the army from Grundy County in 1941 and received his basic training at Camp Claiborne. He was sent overseas two years ago last February and was in the African and Sicilian campaigns before going to Italy.

Iowa Crop Progress and Conditions Report

retary of Agriculture Mike Naig today commented on the Iowa Crop Progress and Conditions report released by the USDA National Agricultural Statistics Service. The report is released weekly from April through November.

"Near seasonal temperatures along with the pattern of dry conditions continued across most of the state last week," said Secretary Naig. "With four percent of the corn and 15 percent of the soybeans nearing maturity, farmers are starting to prepare equipment for harvest."

The weekly report is also available on the USDA's site at nass.usda.gov.

Crop Report

Most of Iowa experienced cooler than normal temperatures and below normal precipitation during the week ending September 8, 2019, according to the USDA, National Agricultural Statistics Service. Statewide there were 5.7 days suitable for fieldwork. Fieldwork activities included harvesting hay and seed corn, chopping corn silage. seeding cover crops and preparing machinery for corn for grain and soybean harvest.

Topsoil moisture condition was rated 5 percent very short, 26 percent short, 68 percent adequate and 1 percent surplus. Areas in 28 counties were rated as D1 moderate drought according to the September 3, 2019, U.S. Drought Monitor due to the persistent lack of rain in parts of Iowa. Subsoil moisture condition was rated 5 percent very short, 24 percent short, 70 percent adequate and 1 percent

Ninety-one percent of the corn crop was in or beyond the dough stage, 2 weeks behind last year and 12 days behind the 5-year average. Sixty percent of the crop reached the dented stage, 2 weeks behind last year and 9 days behind average. Four percent of corn had reached maturity, 11 days behind average. Corn condition rated 63 percent good to excellent.

Ninety-four percent of the soybean crop has started setting pods, 18 days behind last year and nearly 2 weeks behind average. Fifteen percent of the crop has begun coloring, 12 days behind last year and 9 days behind average. Soybean condition rated 61 percent good to excellent.

The third cutting of alfalfa hay reached 76 percent, nearly 1 week behind average. Pasture condition declined from the previous week to 42 percent good to excellent. There were no livestock issues to report from this

past week. **Weather Summary**

Drier than normal conditions prevailed across most of Iowa during the first week of September; precipitation deficits were generally under three-quarters of an inch across the state with only the southwest corner of Iowa reporting above average totals. Temperatures were generally seasonable with departures of one to two degrees above and below average in parts of western and eastern Iowa, respectively. The statewide average temperature was 66.8 degrees, 1.8 degrees below normal.

The rest of Sunday (1st) was uneventful across Iowa with high temperatures reaching the mid to upper 70s under cloudy skies. Overnight lows into Monday (2nd) dipped into the mid-60s. Partly sunny skies and a southerly wind helped boost temperatures into the low 80s on Labor Day. Shortly after midnight on Tuesday (3rd) thunderstorms, some of which were strong, formed in northeastern Iowa and quickly moved into Illinois. Additional showers and thunderstorms moved through Iowa during the late morning and afternoon hours, brining measurable rain across the state's northern half. The highest rain totals were reported in northeastern Iowa with Lansing and Waukon (Allamakee County) observing 1.53 inches and 1.34 inches, respectively. Wednesday (4th) was a cool and mostly sunny day across Iowa. Highs were in the low 70s, up to 14 degrees below average at certain locations. The statewide average high was 74 degrees, five degrees below normal.

Thursday (5th) started off cool and sunny with comfortable conditions into the early afternoon before a low pressure center over Minnesota pulled warm front through Iowa. The arrival of the front brought warm and humid conditions through the evening hours before a cold front cleared the state into Friday (6th) morning. Winds shifted into a northerly direction under sunny skies. High temperatures peaked in the upper 70s and lower 80s. Saturday (7th) began mostly clear until showers moved through the state in the afternoon hours. Thunderstorms formed in southern Iowa during the nighttime hours and lingered into Sunday (8th) morning. Rainfall totals at 7:00 am were highest in southwestern Iowa with Shenandoah (Page County) reporting 2.56 inches; over ten stations reported totals above one inch with the statewide average rainfall of 0.41 inches.

Weekly rainfall totals ranged from no accumulation at multiple locations to 2.56 inches in Shenandoah (Page County) The statewide weekly average precipitation was 0.50 inches while the normal is 0.84 inches. The week's high temperature of 92 degrees was reported on the 3rd in Donnellson (Lee County), 11 degrees above average. Elkader (Clayton County) and Manchester (Delaware County) reported the week's low temperature of 45 degrees on the 9th, on average seven degrees below normal.

Grassley Q & A: National Suicide **Prevention Awareness Month**

Question: Why are suicide rates increasing in the United States? Answer: In the last two decades, suicide rates are on the rise, according to the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), making

it one of the leading causes of death in the United States. The federal agency reports more than 47,000 lives were lost to suicide in 2017. And in nearly half of the 50 states, suicide rates have climbed more than 30% since 1999. Iowa's suicide rate from 1999 to 2016 increased 36.2%, according to CDC statistics. In an effort to help prevent death by violence, including homicide and suicide, the CDC operates the National Violent Death Reporting System (NVDRS), a state-based, anonymous data clearinghouse to help inform policymaking. The NVDRS started compiling data in 2002 with six states and expanded to all 50 states in 2018. Gathering specific data points, from demographics to toxicology reports, they help provide a fuller picture of violent deaths in America. This information is pivotal for policymakers, law enforcement, social services, schools and court systems to assess prevention programs and identify challenges in local communities to prevent violent deaths. The NVDRS findings categorize factors that contribute to suicide, including: relationship problems; problematic substance use; personal crisis; chronic physical illness; financial problems; and gender (men are nearly four times more likely to die by suicide). Suicide is a serious public health problem in the United States that impacts generations of families from all walks of life. Its causes are complex. With rates of suicide on the climb, it's as important as ever to sweep away the secrecy and stigma that have shadowed this public health risk for decades. Raising awareness is a critical way to effect change in society and will help better identify risk factors, prevention strategies and effective resources to lower the number of deaths by suicide and help prevent the tragic loss of life and the lifelong burden and heartache on the loved ones left behind.

Question: What legislative initiatives have you led in Congress for suicide prevention and outreach?

Answer: As one of Iowa's U.S. Senators, I have worked to improve and strengthen resources available to farmers and veterans who are struggling to cope and manage life situations that may lead to self-inflicted harm. Each of the following bills have been signed into federal law. In 2016 I co-sponsored legislation to improve the toll-free hotline for veterans. When the Department of Veterans Affairs says it's operating a call center to provide emergency counseling for veterans in crisis, it better be answering those calls in a timely, responsive way. My bill puts in place quality benchmarks so Congress is able to measure if the VA is adequately doing its job. This initiative builds upon two other bipartisan bills I worked on to improve suicide prevention services for veterans, including the Clay Hunt Suicide Prevention for American Veterans Act – which started a pilot program to repay the loan debt of psychiatry students to help recruit them to work at the VA – and the Joshua Omvig Veterans Suicide Prevention Act, named after an Iowan from Grundy Center who died by suicide after serving in Iraq. When our brave men and women return home from the line of duty, the federal government must keep its promises and help them transition to civilian life, including timely access to mental health care services. Another sector of the population identified by the CDC with higher suicide rates is agricultural workers. In the last Congress, I co-sponsored the FARM-ERS FIRST Act with Senator Joni Ernst to improve mental health support and resources for farmers in crisis. Our legislation provides seed funding through the USDA to state departments of agriculture and state extension services and nonprofits to establish helplines and suicide prevention training and outreach programs in rural communities.



D-NH launches brand new mobile app

DIKE- Dike-New Hartford Superintendent Justin Stockdale always wants to be on the cutting edge, and during his tenure, he hasn't been afraid to try new things.

So last year, he reached out to the Donovan Group, the district's PR and Marketing firm out of Milwaukee, about creating a comprehensive mobile app that would provide updates on all things Dike-New Hartford, from school delays and closures to Wolverine scores. Last week, it officially launched.

"The intent behind it is simply to get information in the hands of our stakeholders in the most immediate way we can," Stockdale said. "It's far handier and more efficient than mass emails, Twitter or Facebook."

While mobile apps are becoming relatively commonplace at larger school districts, Stock-

dale added that he isn't aware of said. "We're closing in on 600 many others in the Cedar Valley area. He sees it as putting out information even faster than updating the website and easier for users to navigate.

Former KWWL-TV journalist and current Donovan Group associate Jerry Gallagher currently serves D-NH from the company's Cedar Falls office and worked with Stockdale to develop the project, the first that Donovan Group has finished.

Stockdale plans to work out the kinks with the app in the first few weeks after the rollout, and his goal is to manage push notifications so that the ones with the widest appeal will reach students and parents through the app. As of Tuesday, downloads of the app have already surged past 500.

"We've got some discussions to have yet, and I just call those growing pains of a new idea that you flesh out as you go," he

downloads in less than a week. That, in and of itself, lets me know that people see this method of receiving information in a positive way."

The app was released just in time for D-NH's big win over Aplington-Parkersburg in football last Friday, and other notifications thus far have included a food drive and a free breakfast for students. As the district administration gets a better idea of which news is most important to parents, students and staff, it will make adjustments accord-

"I could see this being the wave of the future. I can't think of a way you can get information out faster in terms of reception," Stockdale said.





ORDINANCE NO. 546 AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING A CENTRAL COMMERCIAL DISTRICT OVERLAY ZONING DISTRICT BY ADD-ING SECTION 39 TO CHAPTER 165 OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF GRUNDY CENTER, IOWA,

Be It Ordained By the Council of the City of Grundy Center, Iowa:

SECTION 1. PURPOSE AND INTENT. The purpose of the Central Commercial District Overlay Zoning District (hereinafter the "overlay district") is to provide guidance for future development in the specific area and to encourage continued successful business development in the downtown Grundy Center area, particularly the Main Street Grundy Center retail and service business area. The overlay district is intended to encourage appropriate building design standards in a manner that complements and strengthens the downtown retail and service business sector. The provisions of this section shall apply in addition to any other zoning district regulations and requirements in which the land may be classified. In case of conflict, the more specific standard shall apply.
SECTION 2. BOUNDARIES.

boundaries of this overlay district shall be the same as the boundaries of the C-1 Central Commercial District. The legal description of the overlay district and official zoning map of the overlay are on file in the office of the City Clerk.

SECTION 3. APPLICABILITY. The provisions of this Ordinance shall apply to a specific property only in the event the property owner is utilizing local, state. or federal funds to partially or fully fund the substantial improvement or construction of a building; however, the owner of any property lying within the overlay district, regardless of whether the owner is requesting local, state, or federal funds, shall consult with the Grundy Center Chamber-Main Street Design Committee before substantially improving or constructing a building within the overlay district and shall obtain a certificate confirming the completion of such consultation from the Design Committee before commencing work.

SECTION 4. USES. Allowable uses of land lying within the overlay district shall be the same as the uses allowed in the C-1 Central Commercial District. SECTION 5: SITE PLAN REVIEW. Anv-

one proposing to substantially improve a building or construct a new building structure or development, including proposed residential facilities, shall submit a detailed site plan and building plans to the City Clerk. The City Clerk shall forward a copy of the submitted documents to the Grundy Center Chamber-Main Street Desian Committee for review. The Design Committee shall recommend either approval or denial to the City Council within thirty days of the Committee receiving the plans. The City Council shall review the recommendation of the Design Committee and either approve or deny the site plan and building plans. Elements to be considered in this review process are proposed use, proposed building improvements or new structural elements. with particular attention to exterior building design elements, parking provision (if any), and how the proposed improvement or development will complement existing nearby uses and building design elements In the case of emergency repairs needed as the result of unanticipated building or façade damages due to events such as fire, vandalism, or weather related damages, site plan review will not be required, provided that the needed repairs do not alter the appearance of the structure prior to the event causing the unanticipated damages. "Substantial improvement" includes any

new building construction within the overlay district or any renovation of an existing structure that involves any modification of the exterior appearance of the structure by virtue of adding or removing exterior windows or doors or altering the color or exterior materials of existing walls. All façade improvements, changes, alterations, modifications or replacement of existing façade materials will be considered a substantial improvement. Included in this definition are any new, modified or replacement awning structures or similar material extensions over the public sidewalk area. A substantial improvement also includes any increase or decrease in existing building height and/ or alteration of the existing roof pitch or appearance. Any new freestanding sign, projecting wall sign, or monumental sign, or an increase in size or height of any existing freestanding sign, projecting wall sign, or monumental sign, shall be considered a substantial improvement. Routine repair or replacement of existing roof materials that do not materially change the appearance, shape or configuration of the exiting roof will not be considered a "substantial improvement". Owner-occupied detached single family residences shall not be subject to these regulations. SECTION 6: BUILDING DESIGN RE-VIEW. All plans to substantially improve or construct new building structures within the overlay district shall be reviewed by the Grundy Center Chamber-Main Street Design Committee, and the Committee shall submit its recommendations regarding building design to the City Council at the time it submits its recommendations regarding the site plan. The City Council shall then approve or deny the proposed building design plans. The building design shall comply with Grundy Center Chamber-Main Street's Design Guidelines. Paramount in this review will include consideration of building materials. exterior building materials on all sides,

coloration of materials, building height, roof line, size and location of windows and doors, roof mounted appurtenances, and facades. In addition to consideration of typical physical structural improvements to structures, review is also required of any wall painting, mural wall signs or painted artwork or other similar applica-tions to exterior walls. The purpose of review of said exterior wall paintings or drawings is to ensure that said applications are consistent with the prevailing standards and character of the downtown "Substantial improvement" shall have the same definition as set forth in subsection 5 of this section. The follow-

ing design elements will be reviewed: a. Proportion: The relationship of width and height of the front elevations of adjacent buildings shall be considered in the construction or alteration of a building. The relationship of width and height of windows and doors of adjacent buildings shall be considered in the construction or alteration of a building. Particular attention must be given to the scale of street level doors, walls and windows. Large expanses of blank wall spaces at street level are to be discouraged.

b. Roof shape, pitch and direction: The similarity or compatibility of the shape, pitch and direction of roofs in the immediate area shall be considered in the construction or alteration of a building. Routine repair and maintenance or replacement of existing roof materials will not be subject to review provided that the existing roof line and configuration is not altered during the course of said repairs

or maintenance. c. Pattern: Alternating solid surfaces and openings (wall surface versus doors and windows) in the front façade, sides and rear of a building create a rhythm observable to viewers. This pattern of solid surfaces and openings shall be considered in the construction or alteration of a building. d. Materials and texture: The similarity or compatibility of existing materials and texture on the exterior walls and roofs of the buildings in the immediate area shall be considered in the construction or alteration of a building. A building or alteration will be considered compatible if the materials and texture used are appropriate in the context of other buildings in the immediate area.

e. Color: The similarity or compatibility of existing colors of exterior walls and roofs of buildings in the area shall be considered in the construction or alteration of a

building. f. Architectural features: Architectural features including but not limited to cornices, entablatures, doors, windows, shutters, fanlights and other elements prevailing in the area shall be considered in the construction or alteration of a building. It is not intended that the details of existing buildings be duplicated precisely, but those features should be suggestive of the extent, nature and scale of details that would be appropriate on new buildings or associated with building alterations.

g. Exterior Mural wall drawings, painted artwork, exterior painting: ments shall be reviewed to consider the scale, context, coloration and appropriateness of the proposal in relation to nearby facades and also in relation to the prevailing character of the downtown area. Exterior painting of detached single family and two-family residential structures within the district shall be exempt from this provision. Other multi-family dwelling structures will be subject to this review.

SECTION 7: SIGNAGE: Typical business signage shall be subject to a mandatory site plan review by the Grundy Center Chamber-Main Street Design Committee. All signage shall conform to the requirements of the Zoning Regulations of the City of Grundy Center.

SECTION 8: REMOVAL OR DEMOLITION OF BUILDING STRUCTURES: Removal or demolition of structures within the overlay district is allowable, subject to securing a demolition permit from the City Clerk. If no immediate building reconstruction plans are proposed within 30 days following building removal or demolition, the site shall be filled and graded to a topographic elevation equal to or level with surrounding adjacent property natural grade levels. Within 30 days of final grading of the site or at the earliest opportunity during the growing season conducive to plant germination, the site shall be seeded with grass. Reasonable efforts shall be taken by the property owner to ensure proper germination of the vegetation and the property owner must maintain the property in accordance with city ordinances.
SECTION 9. SEPARABILITY OF PRO-

VISIONS. It is the intention of the City Council that each section, paragraph, sentence, clause and provision of this Ordinance is separable, and if any such provision is held unconstitutional or invalid for any reason, such decision shall not affect the remainder of this Ordinance or any part thereof other than that affected by such decision. SECTION 10. REPEALER. All Ordinanc-

es or parts of Ordinances heretofore enacted by the City Council of the City of Grundy Center, Iowa, in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance and of the Municipal Code are hereby expressly repealed.

SECTION 11. EFFECTIVE DATE. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication as provided by law.

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


