New ice cream shop opens in Grundy Center

GRUNDY CENTER - The people of Grundy Center have spoken: they wanted ice cream, and now they have ice cream ... along with malts, milkshakes, sno cones, and other sweet treats available at the community's newest business: Sweet Tooth Icy Treats.

Located in the former Grundy Motor building at 1309 G Avenue, Sweet Tooth Icy Treats opened for business late last month and has been teeming with customers ever since.

Vern Folkedahl, who owns the building, says the ice cream shop is a partnership between him and his 9-year-old granddaughter Jenna Blythe.

"The whole thing was Jenna's idea," Folkedahl said. "After I bought the building and was renovating it, she came in one day and asked if she could sell snow cones out of here in the summer. I had nothing planned for this particular spot in the building, so I said why not? Her idea was as good as any other idea."

So, the two sat down and planned out the business venture, bringing the whole business to life in just a matter of a few months.

Though Jenna is too young to work at the shop at 9-years-old, she enjoys spending her time there, and seeing her vision become a reality.

"She just shines here, she's totally in her element," Folkedahl said.

And Jenna isn't the only one whose eyes brighten when they stop at the ice cream shop.

Since their opening day on Father's Day weekend, Folkedahl says he's been astounded at the amount of support they've received from the community.

'Our first weekend was phenomenal, and it's been busy ever since," he said. "You'd think with our location next to the pool it'd be a ton of kids, but for every one kid there's five adults that come in. We've got a lot of people with a sweet tooth around here, but it's been great. The community has been very supportive of us, and everyone is excited to have an ice cream shop in town."

City of GC approves development agreement for upper elementary renovation

The Grundy Register GRUNDY CENTER - As local daycares take on more new youngsters and the wait list for preschool spans three to four years, the City of Grundy Center is faced with the ever growing need for preschool and child care services in town.

In an effort to address the needs of families and children in the community, the city is taking a step towards action.

During their Monday night meeting, the council voted unanimously to hire 571 Polson Development, LLC, to assist in a plan for the renovation of the old upper elementary building.

This renovation - which is roughly estimated to cost around \$2 million - would make much-needed improvements to the building, and create more space for preschool and other child services at the facility. The cost of the renovation would largely be covered by \$1 million in potential historic tax credits and \$500,000 from a private donor. The remaining \$500,000 would need to be secured through fundraising or other methods.

Currently, the Grundy Center Community School District owns the building, and the city leases it and sublets the space

to different community organizations including: the Grundy Family YMCA for its before and after school program, along with the local Head Start office and the Grundy Center Preschool and Childcare Center for preschool. The space is also utilized by the Grundy Center Archery Club, Robotics Club and school drama department.

Though the space already functions as a family/children's educational support center, the facility is in need of repairs and improvements, and could be redesigned to accommodate more than 100 estimated children in need of preschool or child services in town.

For more than a year and a half, the city and school have each held countless discussions to explore possible options such as a renovation of the upper elementary or the construction of a new facility, along with the costs of either option and the feasibility of either option.

When a private donor came forward offering \$500,000 to

New sign in Conrad warns **South Main speeders**

CONRAD- In response to complaints directed to city hall and the Grundy County Sheriff's Office, law enforcement officials have increased their presence along South Main Street in Conrad and installed a sign that reads "Slow Down,

Kids Playing."

According to Sheriff Rick Penning, deputies issued 10 warnings or citations in a oneweek span after Conrad Mayor Jeff Martin and City Clerk Lori Stansberry reached out to ask for help in enforcing the 25-mile per hour speed limit from Duesenberg Drive north

through the rest of town. Because the road comes in from the country, drivers often fail to slow down and drive as fast as 60 miles per hour in the residential area between the Oakwood Golf Course and the Wolf Creek Bridge.

Jodi Rowe, of Operation Threshold of Grundy County, said the donation is a huge help to the pantry's mission, saving them money that can be used to provide other necessities for families in need of some extra

"We want to give a big thank you to Iowa Select," Rowe said. "We appreciate their generous donation and support of the

In total, volunteers with Iowa Select Farms' "Haul out Hunger" team unloaded 10 cases, or 120 pork loins, to the pantry.

According to Rowe, the end of the month is always tougher on families, so the 120 pork loins that were donated will provide two to three meals per loin for each family.

The pantry is open every Monday and Wednesday from 1 to 5 p.m., though if someone is in need of services and can't make it during that time, they can call to schedule another time to pick up food.

Currently, the organization serves an average of 50 to 60

families each month, with more some months and less others.

In addition to the food pantry, the organization also organizes meal boxes for clients for holidays such as Thanksgiving, Christmas and Easter, and gathers and distributes school supplies to local children each year. The Grundy Register **GRUNDY** CEN-TER- After speaking to a group of children and adults for about a half hour at the library in Grundy Center last Wednesday morning, Chad Lewis had them split almost evenly into who believed in Unidentified Flying Objects (UFOs) and who doesn't.

Lewis has been fascinated by the topic for as long as he can remember, perhaps in part due to his home state of Wisconsin: three of its cities claim the title of "UFO Capitals of the World." In Grundy Center, he shared several Iowa-centric stories, even including some of the downtown buildings from here in town.

One of the most notorious comes from Van Meter, just

Lewis touched on other cases and noted that for its population, Iowa has a relatively high level of UFO sightings that are reported.

be used towards a renovation of the old upper elementary building last year, both entities began to focus more attention on researching the feasibility and cost of a potential renovation.

But, the donor's money along with the historic tax credits - comes a deadline, which sets the clock ticking for the city and the school to figure out a plan.

During the Monday night meeting, council members spoke with Glenn Lyons of 571 Polson Development, who walked the council through the steps they would need to take to get the ball rolling on the proj-

Over the next month, the nuncil will work with Polson to discuss the renovation plan with an architect and contractor, solidify the costs and exact work that needs to be done, ensure that the current tenants will have their needs met by the space, and to form a non-profit group to take ownership of the

building if the renovation proceeds (since neither the city nor the school could own it if the building were to receive historic tax credit funding). The group will then submit the development plan to the private donor for approval. After that, the group would need to apply for the historic tax credit funding before the August deadline.

The council agreed that they needed to get the ball moving on this development plan sooner rather than later.

"The need for preschool and child care services has been critical for a long time, so I say yes, let's do it now," said council member Janetta Miller. "We can't afford to wait."

chool district - including school board member Bob Johanns and the district's new Superintendent Robert Hughes - also came to voice their support for the project during the meeting.


"I truly agree that we need to embrace early childhood services, and that those services

need to be available for families," Hughes said. "From my perspective, the school board been very positive about the possibility and their willingness to work collaboratively to see this project through. The daycare and preschool are a great feeder system for our school, and we don't want to see families move or take their kids out of town to other daycares and preschools. We want to keep those families here in town and provide them the services they need, and I think the board is in support of that."

Though it's still in the earliest of stages, if the project were to be fulfilled, renovation work could potentially begin as early as next year.


These facilities should provide accommodations for fairgoers and others that will attend our ever-increasing event schedule, while providing a steady source of revenue that the board can put towards other capital improvements," Lynch said. "We need to grow our infrastructure in order to host larger events and entertain larger audiences."

If things go well, the board could still add another 30 spots to the south and 30 to the east, and Gutknecht says that's a definite possibility in the future. He also mentioned a pond, a shower house and a playground as additions that could be part of the next phase.

"We just kind of want to use space that has been underutilized for a long time," he said. "I'm just hoping the community will enjoy it and utilize it like they should, (and) have fun

It's all part of an ambitious agenda to improve the fairgrounds and make them an attraction that everyone in the county can be proud of, and Gutknecht is preparing himself for another big endeavor next: replacing the grandstand bleachers. Nevertheless, he feels that he, his board members and local supporters of 4-H are up to the task, and his enthusiasm is contagious.

Supervisors view new voting machines, take no action on purchase

GRUNDY CENTER- The Grundy County Board of Supervisors walked to the annex building and received a detailed summary of new voting machines from Dani Dunham of Matt Parrott Election Services

during Monday morning's regular meeting.

Inquiries from the board, County Auditor Rhonda Deters and her staff ranged from the ease of use of the new units and the cost (about \$3,500 each) to the inevitable question of whether the Russians could hack into them during the 2020 election. As Dunham explained, nothing is completely secure in this day and age, but Deters added that Grundy County has always taken election security extremely seriously.

In all, the county would likely need to purchase nine of the machines—one for each of its seven precincts, one for absentee ballots and one as a backup. Dunham, who works out of Waterloo, also touted the plug and

go simplicity of the units as a major selling point and promised to be available to assist with any problems that might arise. The board did not take any official action, but conversations are expected to continue, as the machines have not been replaced in almost 30 years.

Before reconvening in the annex, the board discussed potential upcoming hot mix asphalt projects on county roads with Assistant County Engineer Steve Cox, which will include D53 in Melrose Township, T19 in Wellsburg, T47 in Stout, D55 (Green Products road), Center Street and South Main in Conrad, the T47/175 intersection between Morrison and Grundy Center, and the T47 dips headed south toward the Tama County line. No official action was taken, and the board is waiting for quotes from contractors before moving forward.

After some contentious moments with residents over the last several months, Cox and Deere Financial and authorized the board generally agreed that the overall roads situation is im-

"We need a dry fall. That would be nice," Cox said.

The board discussed changes to the employee personnel policy including allowing employees to share unused vacation days with coworkers who exhaust theirs in the event of a catastrophic illness but voted to table any further action until after the department head meeting on August 1.

IN OTHER BUSINESS, the board:

• Approved a budgetary resolution and a separate resolution authorizing the county auditor to transfer funds in budget year

• Approved a multi-use governmental application for John the chairperson to sign the same.

And although there haven't been any recent accidents, Martin did point to a "close call" as evidence that someone would get hurt eventually if the limits aren't enforced.

"There are kids in that area, and I don't want to have something bad happen," Martin, who added that he lives in the aforementioned area on South Main, said. "It's all local traffic. We're not a tourist area. We're just trying to change habits and keep people safe."

From what Martin has heard so far, the efforts are already

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working as neighbors have told him that they've "never seen people driving so slow" along the road. During the school year, a bus stop is situated on South Main Street between Hackberry Lane and Oakwood Drive.

The Sheriff's Office has not received any other recent complaints about problem areas for speeding in the county, and Penning plans to continue to enforce the laws on the books while listening to residents who have safety concerns.

"You never know where we'll be," he said.

10 Years Ago This Week - 2009

Remembering a legend, reflections on Ed Thomas: Tom Teeple's barbershop in downtown Parkersburg is a hangout as well as a place to get a haircut for a cross section of the male population of this southern Butler County community, with topics discussed covering the spectrum of local happenings and typical small-town goings on to politics and, of course, local sports. Dropping by on a typical day, a person was just as likely to happen upon Parkersburg's most famous resident. Aplington-Parkersburg head coach Ed Thomas, seated in Teeple's well-worn barber chair, the two exchanging the sort of banter that characterized a 40-year friendship. "I can't even begin to tell you how many haircuts I gave Ed Thomas over the years; hundreds probably," said Teeple, reflecting on the pleasant memories. "I wouldn't even try to put a number on it." But Teeple said that Thomas's presence in his barber chair wasn't always what it appeared to be to the casual observer. "I'd like to think that Ed felt comfortable here, that he could come in and relax for a while," Teeple said. "To be perfectly honest with you, there were a lot of times he'd come in and sit in the chair and I'd just be going through the motions; I wasn't even cutting his hair." And their conversations weren't always concerning Aplington-Parkersburg football. "There was a lot more to Ed Thomas than football. We'd start talking about his family, the Lord, or the community in general, and our conversations would just escalate from there," said Teeple, wistfully. "Those are conversations between Ed and I that I'll always cherish." Teeple said that his friendship with Ed Thomas predated his coming to assume the head coaching mantle of the then Parkersburg Crusaders in 1975. "It was the fall of 1969 and Sue (Tom's wife) and I had purchased the barbershop in What Cheer, Iowa, and we had moved down there, and I had two people from Parkersburg with trucks move us down there." Teeple said. "We got unloaded and I took the trucks to the gas station in What Cheer so I could fill up their tanks. "I walked into the station to pay for the gas and there was a long-haired, skinny kid with wire rim glasses, a loud shirt, white bell bell bottom jeans and sandals sitting there, and he asked who I was I told him, then asked who he was and he answered Ed Thomas. That's how I met Ed.".

50 Years Ago This Week - 1969



Oats were blown down and they also received hail damage. In fields where there was heavy straw they will not come up. The hemp crop suffered the most from the hail. On the Mrs. J. L. Murphy farm there is 20 acres of hemp that was waist high that looked the day after the storm as if it had been completely ruined. There is not much hemp in the storm area.



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Grassley Q & A: Price **Transparency in Health Care**

Question: Does secrecy contribute to health care costs?

Answer: Sticker shock for health care in America has been a growing concern for decades in the United States. From prescription drugs to lab tests, durable medical equipment, outpatient surgery and hospital stays, Americans increasingly feel they pay through the roof for medical care. As chairman of the U.S. Senate Finance Committee, I've worked to bring transparency to the policymaking tables to expose wrongdoing, increase accountability, drive up quality and drive down costs. Specifically, I support anti-kickback and sunshine laws that protect taxpayers and put patients first. My open payments law created a federal database that requires health care providers to disclose financial payments from pharmaceutical companies and medical device manufacturers. Last year I secured expansions to include nurse practitioners and physician assistants. When health care providers prescribe medication or recommend a particular therapy or treatment, consumers ought to know about financial relationships between them and the industry. For decades, a veil of secrecy has shrouded increasingly complex pricing arrangements negotiated between doctors, hospitals, insurers and benefit managers. For taxpayers who underwrite subsidized insurance and foot the bill for public health care programs and patients who pay steep out-of-pocket costs for medical care, improving transparency in the U.S. health care system is a big deal. It's a policy goal worth the growing pains it will take to get it right. Unraveling the whole ball of wax to make pricing information user-friendly for consumers is a tall order. The bottom line is clear. Americans are fed up with the secrecy that allows soaring health care costs, sky-high prescription drug prices and surprise medical bills to keep climbing.

Question: What reforms are underway to improve price transparency in U.S. health care?

Answer: I'm glad to see the Trump administration continue its efforts to bring transparency to the murky pricing system in the health care marketplace. So far this year, it has required hospitals to post list prices for their health care services and announced regulations for drug companies to disclose the list price of prescription drugs in television advertisements. I've re-introduced bipartisan legislation I wrote with Sen. Dick Durbin that would require pharmaceutical companies to list prices of drugs in direct-to-consumer ads. President Trump in June also signed an executive order to pull back the curtain on secrecy so consumers and taxpayers have a better understanding about the prices they're paying for services provided. In the coming months, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services will roll out federal rules to help unleash free market forces and drive down costs. Like doctors who take the Hippocratic Oath, it's important policymakers take care to first, do no harm and to avoid unintended market distortions. For example, mandating price disclosure on negotiated rates should not be leveraged by providers and insurers to collectively bid up their rates. That would defeat the utility of transparency to help bring accountability. Clear, meaningful information should be used to help boost competition, drive innovation and drive down prices. Unleashing government interference willy-nilly is the wrong remedy to solve soaring prices. That's why I'm working to steer market-driven reforms that put patients in the driver's seat and put the brakes on secrecy. Price disclosure should help root out cost-shifting and expose artificially inflated prices that grow the taxpayer tab and gouge consumers. Secrecy provides cover for insurers, providers, drug companies and benefit managers to milk the rebate system and pad their bottom lines. For too long, patients and taxpayers have been caught in the middle. The debate on price transparency can be a game changer in the health care marketplace. Consider how the retail landscape has changed for consumers in the market to buy a car. Many buyers can get a better price because they can research and compare information on what price would be reasonable to pay. It should be no different in healthcare. Transparency brings accountability and better prices. Getting the rules right on price disclosure is important to help make health care more affordable for more Americans and the taxpaying public.

Iowa Crop Progress and Conditions Report

Week of June 24-30, 2019

DES MOINES - Iowa Secretary of Agriculture Mike Naig today commented on the Iowa Crop Progress and Condition report released by the USDA National Agricultural Statistics Service. The report is released weekly from April through November.

"The much needed warmer temperatures have helped the crops progress," said Secretary Naig. "Some parts of the state had below-average rainfall over the last seven days, but sub-soil moisture is still adequate for the crops to grow."

The weekly report is also available on the USDA's site at nass. usda.gov/ia.

Iowa experienced scattered storms across the state that delivered high winds and hail, limiting opportunities for fieldwork during the week ending June 30, 2019, according to the USDA, National Agricultural Statistics Service. Statewide there were 4.4 days suitable for fieldwork. Fieldwork activities included planting, harvesting hay and spraying.

Topsoil moisture condition was rated 0 percent very short, 2 percent short, 74 percent adequate and 24 percent surplus. Subsoil moisture condition was rated 0 percent very short, 1 percent short, 69 percent adequate and 30 percent surplus.

Corn condition improved to 64 percent good to excellent. Soybean planting has nearly finished with 97 percent of the expected soybean crop planted. Ninety percent of the crop has emerged, over two weeks behind the 5-year average, and one percent has started to bloom. Soybean condition rated 64 percent good to excellent, also an improvement from last week.

Seventy-nine percent of the oat crop has headed, 8 days behind last year and average. Nine percent of the crop has started coloring, nearly a week behind average. Oat condition rated 64 percent good

Eighty-three percent of the first cutting of alfalfa hay has been cut, two weeks behind average. Reports that a second cutting of alfalfa hay has also began across the state. Hay condition declined to 63 percent good to excellent. Pasture condition rated 70 percent good to excellent. Livestock experienced some stress with the recent heat. Feedlots remain muddy but have started to improve.

Weather Summary

Unseasonably dry conditions were reported across a majority of the state with locations across northern Iowa observing above average rainfall; west-central Iowa experienced rainfall deficits over an inch below normal. Unseasonable warmness also returned to the state over the reporting period with the average temperature 2.50 degrees above the normal of 73.0 degrees.

Weekly rainfall totals ranged from 0.01 inches in Des Moines (Polk County) to 4.27 inches in Creston (Union County). The statewide weekly average precipitation was 0.95 inches, while the normal is 1.16 inches. The week's high temperature of 98 degrees was observed in Little Sioux (Harrison County) and Mapleton (Monona County) on the 29th, 13 degrees above normal. Cresco (Howard County) reported the week's low temperature of 53 degrees on the 26th, five degrees below average.

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


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Friday's softball: Comets finish unbeaten in West

D-NH, ranked second in Class 2A and carrying a 23-2 record into the final two weeks of the regular season, was scheduled to play Class 1A No. 6 Don Bosco in Dike on Tuesday, 1A's top-ranked Mason City Newman on Wednesday and rounds out the week on Friday at Lisbon against a team that has been receiving votes at times in the 1A poll this season. The regular season wraps up the following week with games at Roland-Story, a twinbill with Independence and a road game at Iowa Falls-Alden.

Coach told us these next two weeks are going to be the hardest schedule the Wolverines have played in a while," D-NH junior Reece Beuter said. "Playing these games will definitely help us improve and we need to step up and embrace

Beuter, recently returned from a minor injury suffered in a game against Aplington-Parkersburg, has been tack sharp on the mound for the Wolverines with a 5-0 record, allowing one earned run in 39 and two-third innings pitched with 64 strikeouts compared to 12 walks. The No. 2 in the rotation, Drew Sonnenberg, is not far off pace with a 0.68 ERA in 41 innings pitched with 35 strikeouts and

"We're not so worried about our pitching and defense," Leonard said. "Our two guys that will throw in the tournament will be difficult to hit and we feel good with those two guys and the defense behind them.'

The Wolverines recognize where they need to work – a .313 team batting average is good but lags behind some of the best that surround D-NH in the state rankings. Top-ranked Wilton and third-ranked North Linn are both hitting at a .357 clip and fourth-ranked Treynor leads 2A with a .374 team bat-

We feel like our offense has held us back in the past in the postseason. We really wanted to challenge ourselves there," Leonard said. "We're trying to see as many good pitchers as we can."

We have to show up every day and play our best game, D-NH senior Ely Sohn said. "Whenever there's a bad play, we can't dwell on the past. We have to try and make every play and focus in."

Parker Kiewiet provides a spark at the top of the lineup, hitting .373 with 22 stolen bases in 23 attempts. Sohn is 22-for-22 stealing bases. Beuter is the team's leading hitter at .429 and leads the team in doubles (7), home runs (2) and runs batted in (28), typically hitting third or fourth in the order.

D-NH catcher Zak Wauters, who also does some relief pitching for the Wolverines, is confident in how the team can respond most of the time in tough situations.

'We're going to keep coming at you," Wauters said. 'We'll never quit, never go

With a roster only 14 deep, the Wolverines made sure to put in the extra work in the offseason to ensure opportunities for success.

"The spring and winter workouts have really paid off with this group of guys," Wauters, a sophomore, said. "We've got a couple younger guys that are getting there too, but getting four [NICL East titles] in a row is awesome putting baseball on the map here.

... We want to make sure we're playing our best baseball at the end of the year.'

For the seniors, the potential of getting to Principal Park in Des Moines is a golden chance to put a cherry on top of what has been an eventful school year, including a state runner-up campaign in football, a state appearance for the basketball team and a state championship in boys track and field.

'It'd be an awesome way to go out," Leonard said. "I think that's how they want to go out, and they'll do what they can to do that. They're great team-

Sohn added, "We've talked about being conference champs but now we want to do more beyond that, get a lot more."



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
