Supervisors embargo two bridges with more to come

The Grundy Register GRUNDY CENTER- The Grundy County Board of Supervisors acted on County Engineer Gary Mauer's recommendation to embargo two bridges during Monday morning's meeting, and 19 more are on the agenda for next week.

Of the two bridges embargoed at three tons, one (F-4) is located on 160th Street just west of I Avenue, and the second (K-12) is on L Avenue. F-4 is currently slated for replacement in fiscal year 2022 at an estimated cost of \$820,000, and K-12 is on the schedule for FY2021 at an estimated cost of \$210,000.

Because the state legislature raised the load limit for rural gravel roads from 20,000 pounds to 25,000 pounds on single axle vehicles, the county will vote on a resolution to embargo an additional 19 bridges.

The Rock around the Clock Tower car cruise and concert series, presented by the Grundy Center Chamber-Main Street, will be held from 4 to 7 p.m. on the third Thursday of each month from June through September.

Visitors are invited to come out and enjoy live music performed by local bands, admire classic cars from collectors around the area, shop from local vendors at the flea market and grab a bite to eat from the various food vendors. There will also be activities for the youngsters, including Touch a Truck, pace painting, story time, chalk art, bubbles and more.

Grundy Center Chamber-Main Street Director Lisa Bienfang says the first Rock around the Clock Tower event last September was such a success, they decided to do it again this summer - only bigger and

BCLUW J-Term classes focus on unconventional topics, building

The Grundy Register CONRAD- It's not every day that you walk into a high school and get up close presentations on Washington, D.C., food trucks, baseball, filmmaking, survivalist techniques and conspiracy theories, to name a few. Then again, BCLUW Principal Kristyn Kell isn't interested in doing the same thing and getting the same results.

That's one of the main reasons she, along with her teachers, created the four-day "J-Term" for the month of June: each day, from 8:30 to 3:30, students were allowed to participate in a special course of their choice out of a total of 12 options. Last Thursday, they shared what they learned to the public during an hour-long community showcase.

"It was fun to see the teachers go all in, and I'm just super proud of the hard work and dedication, planning and preparation that went into it," Kell said. "When you walked into those rooms, those kids were

GRUNDY CENTER - Despite getting a late start opening due to school going later into the year, the Grundy Family Aquatic Center is now open for the season, and already packed with pool-goers looking to soak up the sun this summer.

Grundy Family Aquatic Center Manager Colton Sandell says the pool's opening day on Friday, June 7th was packed with eager kids lining up at the door, ready to splash into sum-

"We opened a little later than usual this year since school wasn't out as early, but so far it's been great and we've had a lot of people in," he said. "There were a couple of days were it was a little chilly, but with it warming up more and more, we're planning on a consistent crowd."

Sandell says there were several improvements made to the pool before opening this year, including new ropes, guard tubes, first aide gear and more, with umbrella repairs on the

The pool is open every day from 11:45 a.m. to 12:45 p.m. for adult lap swim, and then for regular open swimming from 1 to 5 p.m. each day. Family swim - for children accompanied by adults - is held each day from 5 to 6 p.m., followed by open swim from 6 to 8 p.m.

After 8 p.m., the pool is available for party rentals, which can be arranged by calling the pool at 319-825-5200.

"We're looking forward to another great season here at the pool," Sandell said.

Offerings included the aforementioned Washington, D.C. trip summary from Noah Cross, a sampling of food truck fare, a filmmaking class complete with a 16-minute movie about robots, hitmen and dating (written by and starring Dillon Jacobson), a history of baseball from its origins to the steroid era with Grant Bohlke, ultimate health with Anthony Jahr, the John F. In short, there was a little bit of something for everyone, whether you wanted to fix a house, learn to dance, or explain why you believe the CIA—and NOT the Mafia, LBJ, Lee Harvey Oswald or Fidel Castroput the fateful hit on the president in Dallas on November 22, 1963. Grothoff's outdoor adventure class spent time at Wolf Creek Park and Pine Lake in Eldora before camping out in Bangor and acquiring a taste for Meals Ready to Eat (MRE) commonly used for deployed soldiers in combat.

Blast from the past: Liberty Park Swimming Pool in Grundy Center

Shown above is a photo of the old Liberty Park Swimming Pool in Grundy Center taken in the 1940s. The elevated pool was built during the Great Depression and cost about \$10,000. The pool opened to the public on August 24, 1935. The pool was in use for over 30 years before it was leveled and replaced in 1968. The pool held 50,000 gallons of filtered, soft water to offer swimmers a safe haven from the heat. The pool was 9 feet deep at its deepest point, and offered a roped off shallow area for non-swimmers. Single admission for children was 10 cents, and adult admission was 25 cents. Swimmers could rent a towel for 5 cents, a wool suit for 10 cents and a swim cap for 10 cents. The pool was open until 10 p.m. every night of the week, and oftentimes, youngsters would sneak in for a dip after closing time by hopping over the walls. Grundy Co. Sheriff warns of scams

The Grundy County Sheriff's Office wants to remind residents that the scam artists are hard at work.

Reports were received today of 2 potential victims of scams that were able to be stopped either by alert family members or their financial institution.

Scams may include:

1) a telephone call stating they are a relative in jail needing bond money or fine money 2) a telephone call stating

they are a relative in the hospital needing money to get treatment

3) a telephone call stating they are the IRS and the victim needs to send money

4) a telephone call stating they are Police Dept or Sheriff's Office and the victim owes

Do not send money. Call your relatives first and ask where they are and if they are in trouble or need money.

Listen to your bank officials if they advise you that the withdrawal of money is not in your best interest.

Report such calls to your local law enforcement agency.

Survey shows business opportunities in downtown Grundy Center

GRUNDY CENTER - A survey conducted by the Grundy Center-Chamber Main Street has identified areas of opportunity for existing business owners, as well as opportunities for potential business owners looking to move their business to downtown Grundy Center.

GC Chamber-Main Street Director Lisa Bienfang says the survey - which guizzed participants on what types of businesses and services they would like to see in downtown Grundy Center - was filled out by over 400 people, and is part of the Chamber-Main Street's "Ready to Recruit" initiative.

Results from the survey will be used as a way to strengthen the downtown business community, and assist both current and potential business owners in fulfilling the needs of the community.

"Grundy Center Chamber-Main Street has made business recruitment and retention a high priority to improve the local economy and quality of life," Bienfang said. "One other goal of this survey is to identify what consumers want and what they will support. By going through the comprehensive 'Ready 2 Recruit' process, we will be equipped with information, resources, and best practices to assist new and existing businesses help Grundy Center grow and thrive.'

One of the biggest gaps the survey showed was in retail and food service, where consumers said they want to see a number of services provided, including: somewhere to get ice cream and sweets, a full service restaurant, a variety store, a spa, a breakfast/deli spot, a bakery and

Most people said they would be very likely to patronize a full service restaurant, an ice cream shop, a breakfast/deli shop, a bakery, a variety store and a hardware store. Fewer people said they would be likely to visit a wine bar or a brew pub.

Based on survey results, the potential prospects for expansion show the most opportunity in an ice cream/sweets business, specifically noting the importance of quality treats, outdoor seating and space for parties.

Another big area for opportunity is in the retail side of things, where survey-takers agreed that they would like to see a variety store that offers everything from tools, to home furnishings, to craft supplies and more.

The survey also showed that over 70 percent of survey-takers agreed that downtown Grundy Center is improving and making progress, while 26 percent agree that it is holding steady.

Based on the survey, there are 12 potential prospects interested in either moving a business to downtown, or opening a new business downtown.

"These survey results show some retail and food service gaps and opportunities for existing businesses to capture more revenue potential by offering additional products and/or services," Bienfang said. "The results also help us focus our recruitment efforts with high quality data and collateral information for prospective businesses to be confident in their decision to locate in Grundy Center."

Mauer told the board that 15 of the embargoes are directly due to the change and will be set at 40 tons, and four of them are reducing the load limit below 40

"It's just another unfunded mandate," he said. "In the next couple years, there are going to be more of those."

The board voted 4-0 (Jim Ross was absent) to approve the embargo. Later, the supervisors discussed an issue with a damaged tile line on the property of Ryan Sicard in drainage district A4, and Mauer recommended hiring a private contractor to repair the tile before sending the county a bill. As he explained, the secondary roads department doesn't spend money from its budget on private property as outlined in the Iowa Code.

Eventually, the board voted 4-0 to approve a motion from Supervisor Barb Smith to work with the landowner and explore

repairing it with a private contractor and the county overseeing the process, and fellow Supervisor Heidi Nederhoff volunteered to contact Sicard as he lives within her district in northwest Grundy County.

After a brief public hearing with no verbal comments, the board voted unanimously to vacate a portion of Westbrook Avenue east of Highway 57.

Stage IV kidney cancer in 2015, Freese went in to the University of Iowa Hospital and Clinics for surgery, where the initial diagnosis showed that the cancer had spread to his bones, liver and lungs. His right kidney was removed - along with a tumor over six and a half inches in

In Freese's case, the cancer is treatable but not curable, and the doctors are focusing on trying to prevent it from spreading further.

After undergoing clinical trails involving immunotherapy and low doses of a chemo pill twice a day, Freese's cancer is now stable, and his largest tumor has been reduced to half its size since January of 2017. Throughout further testing, Freese received the good news that the cancer has not spread to his bones, and they are confident it is not in his liver. Though he still goes in for a checkup and CT scan every 28 days, Freese says he considers himself very fortunate to lead a normal life.

"While there have been some down times over the last four years, the continued support from family, friends, co-workers and sometimes people I don't even know helps me deal with this disease," he said. "The medication does not make me

sick and I consider myself to be very fortunate to lead a very normal life. The medical staff at the University has been outstanding. I pray that this disease will never affect you or your loved ones, but if it does, please consider participating in a clinical trial if you are given the chance. Clinical trials offer cutting edge technology and treatments, without them medical professionals cannot gain insight on how to treat the disease or possibly find a cure."

Freese encouraged the audience to keep the faith, and never lose hope.

"You will never beat cancer if you have no faith and have lost hope," he said.

So far, this year's Grundy County Relay for Life has raised \$27,500 to support the fight against cancer. Becki Jo Shuey, one of the Grundy County Relay for Life organizers, says the group is still receiving money for silent auction prizes that have not yet been picked up, as well as any team money that has not yet been turned in, so they expect the total number to be higher. 





Grassley Q & A: **Disaster Assistance Update**

Question: What amendment did you get included in the federal disaster relief package?

Answer: Catastrophic flooding across Iowa has caused tremendous damage throughout the Missouri and Mississippi River basins impacting more than two-thirds of Iowa's 99 counties. Breached and overtopped levees and swollen tributaries have swamped hundreds of thousands of acres of farmland, displacing families, disrupting small businesses and destroying public infrastructure. In April I met with area farmers in Malvern in Southwest Iowa to learn about their losses and recovery needs. Estimates show more than 800 on-farm storage bins located in eastern Nebraska and Southwest Iowa burst open, spilling upwards of 10 million bushels of grain into standing flood waters. The damaged grain losses delivered a blow to affected producers. Unlike the livestock indemnity program, prevented planting disaster relief and farmland restoration and watershed recovery grants, the USDA did not have a disaster relief program on the books for stored grain damaged by natural disaster. That's why I wrote an amendment to bridge the coverage gap. It was included in the \$19.1 billion federal disaster relief bill President Trump signed into law on June 6. The Grassley amendment authorizes the USDA to include on-farm stored commodities under the Wildfire and Hurricane Indemnity Program (WHIP). Many farmers were counting on their stored grain to help pay bills, make tax and loan payments or finance the 2019 planting season. Passage of the disaster relief bill will make a good down payment towards recovery and help stem a growing tide of anxiety that's taking a toll during the years-long slump in the farm economy. Above normal rainfall that was forecast by the National Oceanographic and Atmospheric Administration is further dampening this year's planting season. As of the first week of June, oversaturated farm fields spanned across the grain belt, putting America's farmers way behind schedule. Reports showed corn planting at 67 percent, with 30 million acres of corn yet to plant. Getting flood recovery dollars in the pipeline will bring a welcome infusion of relief to rehabilitate and repair public infrastructure, roads, and bridges; help local communities recover and rebuild; top up USDA coffers for agriculture-related losses, watershed recovery and farmland rehabilitation; and invest in flood mitigation efforts. I will continue working closely with federal agencies to make sure disaster relief programs are working as intended and keep check on damages still being assessed, including riverfronts in Davenport and Burlington in Southeast Iowa.

Question: When is the deadline for Iowans to apply for individual disaster assistance?

Answer: Iowans in the following nine disaster-designated counties may be eligible for federal assistance due to severe storms and flooding that occurred March 13 to May 16, 2019: Fremont, Harrison, Louisa, Mills, Monona, Pottawattamie, Scott, Shelby and Woodbury. Iowans must apply by July 1, 2019. Assistance is available through the Federal Emergency Management (FEMA) and Small Business Administration (SBA). SBA loans are available for renters, homeowners and businesses for repairs and replacement of damaged personal property. Complete applications online at https:// disasterloan.sba.gov/ela/. Or, call the SBA disaster assistance center at (800) 659-2955. Note applications must be submitted to maintain eligibility for any additional FEMA dollars. To register for FEMA assistance, go online to www.disasterassistance.gov or call (800) 621-3362. The FEMA phone lines are open 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. (Central Time), seven days a week. Federal disaster grants are not taxable income and will not affect eligibility for Social Security, Medicaid or Medicare. As of June 4, \$13 million in FEMA recovery assistance has been disbursed for disaster victims in those nine counties. FEMA direct housing assistance is available to eligible Iowans in Freemont and Mills counties. My state staff is available to help Iowans identify available resources and to trouble-shoot problems they may have with federal agencies. Since flooding began in mid-March, they have been working closely with local residents and agencies to coordinate relief efforts.

Governor Kim Reynolds activated the statewide proclamation of disaster emergency. Iowans in 64 counties are eligible for state individual assistance programs for severe weather and flooding that occurred March 13 to May 16, 2019. As of June 4, the governor also activated the state individual assistance program for 18 counties affected by flooding and tornadoes on May 17 and continuing. 
