Supervisors approve new motor grader purchase

GRUNDY CENTER- The Grundy County Board of Supervisors unanimously approved the purchase of a 2019 John Deere motor grader and trade-in of a 1999 model during its regular meeting on Monday morning.

According to County Engineer Gary Mauer, the 2019 John Deere 772 six-wheel drive will cost around \$307,000, and with a \$32,000 trade-in for the 1999 CH with 14,000 hours on it, the net cost will be around \$275,000.

Mauer also brought the board a list of five already embargoed bridges that were further reduced in their load capacities after announcing two closures at a recent meeting, and after the replacement of the Wolf Creek bridge, it has been removed from the list and should be re-opened within 30 days.

The board then passed a second resolution that will embargo 15 new bridges (either posted at one lane or with a sign imposing specific weight limits) due to a change in state law allowing specialized haul vehicles to go from primary to secondary roads. The hiring of Harris Kopsa as a co-patrolman at the Conrad shop at a starting pay rate of \$21.57 per hour received unanimous approval.

Dennis Brubaker, who lives on 270th Street between Grundy Center and Conrad, spoke before the board about the condition of the gravel road, and Alice Church of God Pastor Jim Hartman joined him. Alice, which is also located on 270th, has been forced to move Sunday worship services on multiple occasions due to navigability issues.

Brubaker did not criticize the Secondary Roads department and instead hoped that a constructive solution could be found, noting that the crews did a great job on 280th Street and Hawk Avenue north of Conrad.

"I'm bringing up thoughts and don't know that an answer will come in today," Brubaker said.

The board did not take any official action. The supervisors later moved forward on a plan to hire Lance Van Heiden to fix a damaged tile line at a cost between \$200 and \$600 but did not specify which fund would be used to cover the repairs. They also voted unanimously to purchase a second sump pump using carryover funds.

- Reappointed Carl Huber to the Veteran's Affairs Commission.
- Reappointed Mike Branon and Todd Geer to the Grundy County Memorial Hospital Board of Commissioners.

- Appointed Jim Mutch and Kent Nederhoff to the county conservation board.
- Approved a fireworks permit for the Grundy County Agricultural Society.

Celebrate the Fourth of July in Grundy County

REINBECK - The annual Reinbeck Fourth of July celebration is right around the corner, and community members from around the county are invited to join in on this year's festivities.

The event, which is organized annually by the Citizens for Reinbeck committee, will be held on Wednesday, July 3 and Thursday, July 4 this year.

This year, there are several new events and activities along with the tried and true favorites.

The festivities will kick off on Wednesday evening, with a Community Appreciation Dinner at the Reinbeck Memorial Building from 5 to 7:30 p.m., followed by a free movie at Elmwood Park starting at 8:45 p.m. To end the night, there will be a Fireman's Dance and live music at the Memorial Building from 9 p.m. to 1 a.m.

On Thursday, there will be a pickle ball tournament at the tennis courts at Elmwood Park along with a fishing derby at the Izaak Walton Pond - both from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. At 10 a.m. is the crowning of Little Mr. and Miss Reinbeck (on College Street

in front of Elmwood Park), followed by a 7 on 7 football tournament by the GR Booster Club. Anyone is invited to show up and play in the tournament.

For the youngsters (ages 3-8), big wheel races will be back again this year starting at 10:30 a.m. on Thursday (located on College Street in front of El-

mwood Park). If you're looking to do a little shopping, vendors and food will be set up at Elmwood Park starting at 11 a.m. After that, the kiddie parade

will be held at 12:30 p.m. on College Street, followed by the grand parade at 1:30 p.m.

Throughout the afternoon on Thursday, a number of other activities will be offered, including: bingo at Elmwood Park, Trunk's Country Foods egg toss, crazy train rides, petting zoo, laser tag, mini golf, a bounce house, obstacle course, inflatable rides, face painting, trap shooting, a magic show, balloon animals and more.

At 7 p.m., local band Janey and the Growlers will perform live music at the park.

All of the festivities lead up to the big event - the Fireworks Show - which is set to start at 10 p.m. on Thursday night. The best viewing area will be from Elmwood Park and nearby. Following the fireworks show is a new event: a group sky lantern launch by the Lion's Shelter House at Elmwood Park.

Work continues on downtown facade project

GRUNDY CENTER - With Felix Grundy Days fast approaching, the crew at Cardinal Construction have been working hard to put the finishing touches on the facade renovation project in downtown Grundy Center.

On Tuesday afternoon, workers used a crane to place a new cap on the turret atop the Spartan Fitness building at 629 G Ave.

A crowd of onlookers, including Spartan Fitness owner Jenny Meyers, gathered to watch the progress.

"I think it'll be really neat to see it all complete," Meyers said. "It will be fun to compare it to old photos of the original turret and see how it looks."

Meyers, who rents the space from property owner Dave Loftus, said she didn't know exactly when the original turret was

taken down, but Loftus estimated that it was taken down sometime in the early 1950s.

Throughout the rest of downtown Grundy Center this week, workers have been painting

window frames and trim on building facades, and repainting street markings as the town prepares for its biggest celebration of the year.

1. Discard sharps in a red sharps container—OR— in an empty liquid laundry detergent jug with the lid taped on. (Containers will not be provided by Grundy County Public Health.)
2. When your container is full or almost full, call Grundy County Public Health at 319-824-6312 to set up a time to drop off your sharps container.
3. Bring your entire container to Grundy County Public Health, 706 H. Ave Suite 2, Grundy Center, to be placed into the designated sharps container box.

Your container will NOT be returned.

Grundy County Public Health is pleased to provide this program FREE of charge to you through a partnership with the Grundy County Convenience Center.

Green shares Girls State experiences

CONRAD- Deidra Green, a BCLUW senior-to-be, was one of over 200 young leaders chosen to attend the annual Girls State convention in Des Moines last week, and as she described it to the women of the Conrad American Legion Auxiliary on Monday afternoon, she learned a ton about the processes of government at all levels throughout the five-day event that ran from June 16-21.

Attendees were split into two parties—the Federalists and the Nationalists—and Green was placed in the Federalist Party in the town of Harbor Ray. Her first appointments were to become a city health officer and a civil services commissioner. In one day, she heard over 70 speakers expounding upon their political platforms.

"That was very tiring, but they were all really good," she said.

She wound up becoming a county attorney, which she remarked was fitting because of her propensity for arguing and being right. Governor Kim Reynolds made an appearance and spoke to the girls, along with several other state officials and politicians. They visited the Capitol building and learned about the judicial branch and the history of the lawmaking

Although she had a lot of fun, Green stressed that it was a strict environment, and she and the other girls were almost always busy. And despite all of the arguments and political debates of the week, she remains

steadfast in her beliefs at the end of the day.

"I like what I like, and people can like what they like," she said. "I do like the different views of some people, but if I like something, I'm going to like it. I'm not really easily persuaded."

And at the end of the day, she achieved one major milestone out of her trip: she got registered to vote and plans to cast a ballot in the 2020 election.

City of Wellsburg makes changes to fireworks ordinance

WELLSBURG - With the Fourth of July quickly approaching, those looking to discharge fireworks in the Wellsburg area should be aware of a change in the ordinance for fireworks that is now in effect.

According to the City of Wellsburg ordinance on fireworks, users must be 18 years old to discharged consumer fireworks without parental supervision.

A person shall only discharge the fireworks on real property they own, or on property where consent has been given.

Novelties such as sparklers, caps or snakes can be discharged on a public place as long as all trash, wrappers and wires are properly disposed of.

Fireworks shall not be discharged by persons showing visible signs of, or determined to be, intoxicated or under the influence of a drug or narcotic. Anyone discharging a consumer



firework assumes all responsibility and consequences thereof, and no person shall discharge a firework in a reckless manner or manner likely to cause death, injury, fire or property damage.

No person shall discharge consumer fireworks outside of the following dates and hours: July 3rd from 9 a.m. until 10

p.m. and July 4th from 9 a.m. until 11 p.m.

Fireworks ordinances for the cities of Dike, Conrad, Wellsburg and Grundy Center remain the same as in years past.

Logan Clark receives Iowa Select Farms SelectCare Excellence Award

One local man - Logan Clark - who lives outside of Holland, was recently awarded Iowa Select Farms' very first SelectCare Excellence Award in honor of his outstanding character and excellent work ethic.

"I remember we needed to get more caretakers and feed into our Isopork farm, and there was over a foot of snow on the ground and it was still falling," recalled Jeremiah Hall. "Our first and only call was to Logan Clark. He had been out pushing snow all evening but he said he would be there to help us as soon as he could. At daylight, he came breaking through the

drifts. He got us into the farm, and everyone was so relieved and thankful he was there."

Logan was recognized as the very first recipient of Iowa Select Farms' SelectCare Excellence Award. Nominated by Noel Williams for all of his effort in rescuing farms, trucks, tractors and people from the snow, he was recognized for a much bigger contribution—his above-and-beyond effort, his positive attitude and quite simply, how much he cares.

Logan joined the Iowa Select Farms' maintenance team three years ago, where he started working for Tracy Borkowski. Logan's timing was perfect, as Tracy needed a right hand man

to pull out of day-to-day maintenance and oversee larger, more extensive remodel projects. He saw something in Logan.

"The cool thing about Logan is that he does anything you ask of him, and he gets the work done," said Dan. "He made sure things were as smooth as they could be for the managers up there, and kept the projects on schedule. He's someone you really enjoyed working with."

Last year, Logan again switched gears to help the construction team build new finisher farms. It was a different type of farm, a brand new team and a completely new set of challenges. But Logan took it all in stride.

10 Years Ago This Week - 2009

The effects of a national recession have caught up with a local manufacturing facility. Grundy Center's NCM, a manufacturer of air filtration for automobiles, will close within 13 to 14 weeks, according to NCM President and COO Jerry Bakker. Bakker made the announcement on Friday to NCM's 86 employees. "Things were very, very tight with business being down," Bakker said. "But then we saw General Motors [situation]. As we were forecasting what that was going to do to us, we saw that we were going to be in an extreme cash crunch by the end of June." And it was a big crunch. Bakker said their business year-to-date was down over 50 percent. "Normally we would have survived something like that had our normal business been up and running, but with all the industries we serve being down, we knew something had to happen," Bakker said. He said the earliest they would close would be the beginning of September.

25 Years Ago This Week - 1994

50 Years Ago This Week - 1969

He has purchased a home at Hubbard and will take over the practice July 1 recently resigned by Dr. Larry Richards, 32, who lived in the Hardin county community about a year.

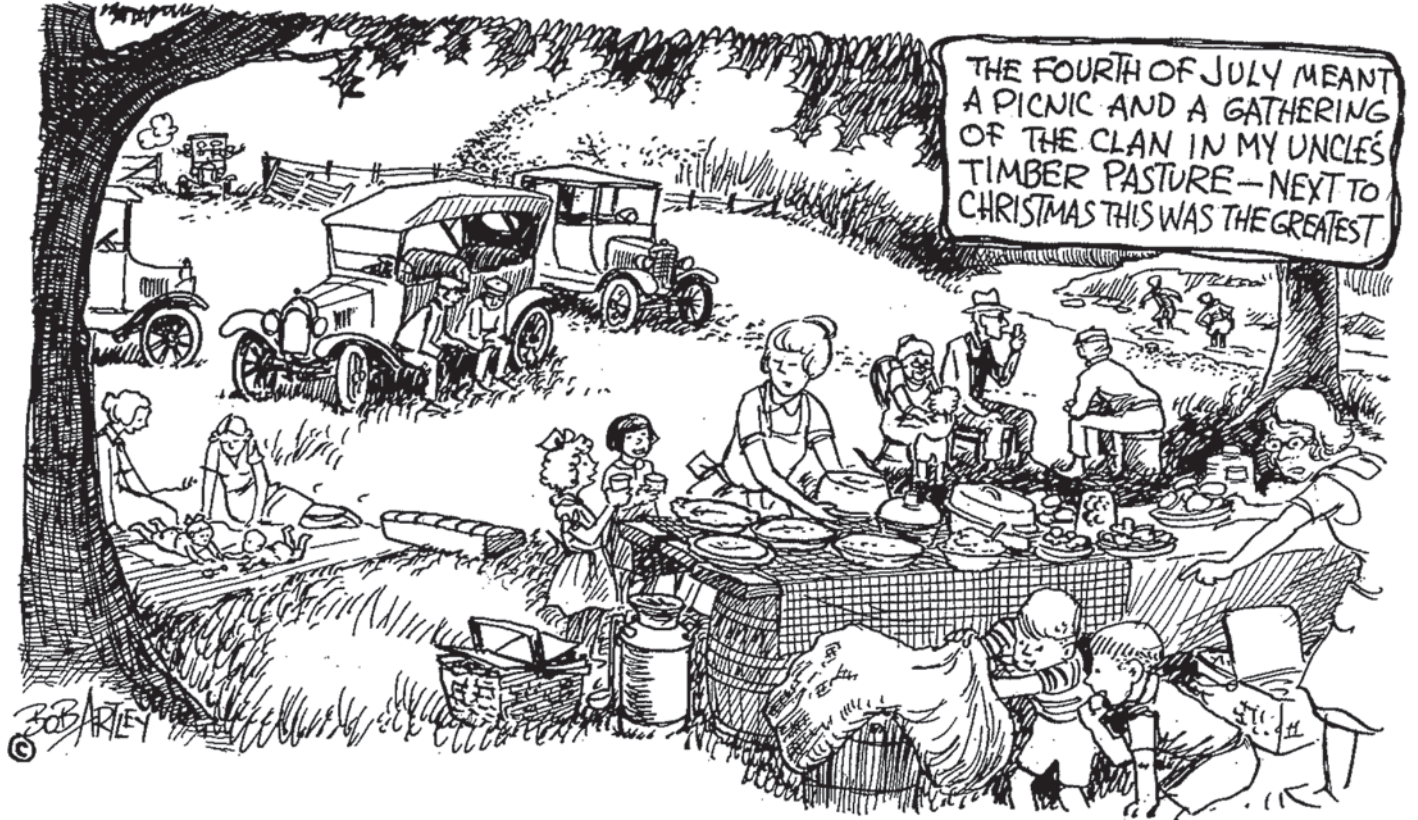
Grundy county's 1969 corn and soybean prospects now appear doomed to almost certain mediocrity because of adverse growing conditions resulting from one of the coolest, wettest springs on record. After producing three consecutive 100-plus bushel corn crops in 1966, 67 and 68, only a miraculous change in weather conditions during the next four months of the growing season will enable Grundy county farmers to harvest a corn crop approaching the century mark.

75 Years Ago This Week - 1944

Sgt. Robert Ray of Conrad, who returned to his American army unit in Italy after being a German prisoner for many months, arrived in the United States last week. He came over on the same boat that brought another Conrad boy, Sgt. Grant Butler. Sgt. Ray is in Washington, D. C., at present but is expected home in a few days.

Grundy county is building up a substantial road fund. The county treasurer's balance sheet for the first of the month shows a balance of \$98,000 in the road construction and maintenance fund. When the second installment of collections is made before the end of the year this amount will be substantially increased. Road moneys are coming in as they do in an average year as there has been no change made in the road tax levies. But road expenditures the past two years have been decreasing. The road construction funds have been accumulating. Only a small portion of the construction funds were spent last year and unless the late heavy rains call for much construction work, there will be little done this year. By the close of the year the county may have close to a normal two-year road construction surplus on hand. These funds are being laid up for construction work that will start again as soon as the war is over and labor and material for construction are available again. Maintenance expenditures can't be much curtailed but they will be less this year than last year because there will not be much resurfacing done only at places on the roads where there is water damage.

Mrs. Ellen Fairall from Waterloo has brought suit against her former son-in-law, in which she asks damages in the amount of \$8,600 for personal injuries she received when she claims her son-in-law assaulted her at his farm on July 11th of last year. In the petition which she has filed in the office of the clerk of courts she states that while visiting the farm on July 11th, 1943, "the defendant without provocation and in a fit of anger willfully struck and assaulted her with such violence as to cause her great bodily injury." Mrs. Fairall further states in her petition that "the defendant choked and kicked her and pushed her to the ground." She states: "As a result of this assault she sustained such injuries as required the attention of a physician and that she is still periodically receiving medical treatment." As a result of the assault she states that she has endured great pain and suffering and that she was under opiates for ten days after the assault." She states she received cuts and lacerations and sustained a spine injury which is permanent. Mrs. Fairall states that she is 65 years old and that she was in good health before the alleged assault and that she had been employed as a governess and attendant for children. She has been unable to work during the past year, she states. She asks \$500 for loss of earnings during that period and \$1500 for future loss of earnings.

As I sifted through the crowd at the first "Rock Around the Clock Tower" event of 2019 last Thursday night, I couldn't help but admire what the devoted team at Chamber-Main Street has created—while thanking God for the sudden lack of precipitation as the festivities kicked off. Lisa Bienfang, since she took the job, has been an absolutely tireless advocate for the community, a meticulous planner and a true innovator, and the impressive turnout for the car show and concert (with a wide range of food vendors and kid's activities courtesy of the ambulance and police departments) is yet another sign that Grundy Center is headed in the right direction.

Of course, you can't have a conversation about the event without singing the praises of Tank Anthony, one of the absolute best singers on the circuit right now. As I got to know him, helped him set-up and learned a bit about his backstory, it led me to an obvious question: *You're from Texas, perhaps the most widely known music state in the nation (though California, Michigan, Mississippi and Tennessee may like a word). Why the heck did you move to Iowa?*

His answer was illuminating: in Texas, he told me, singer-songwriters are "a dime a dozen." Your plumber and your electrician are probably in a band together, and the guy serving you at Whataburger has one too. It's cutthroat, and it's tough to break through in a place where everyone's trying to make it in the same industry, no different than moving to Hollywood to act or Nashville to get a record deal.

But in Iowa—and especially in the rural areas—musicians are much more encouraging, collaborative even. They'll talk to each other, drink beers with each other and even get up on stage together, and that's why a talent like Tank Anthony packed his bags and relocated to Iowa Falls. We're all luckier for it, and because he must've sensed that I'm still a recovering musician who once pondered the logistics of moving to Nashville or Austin and striking out myself (many lives ago), he was gracious enough to let me pick a few songs on guitar while he blew the gazebo crowd away.

Small towns—and the people who live in them—are always fighting an uphill battle compared to event organizers in places like Des Moines, Cedar Rapids and Cedar Falls: it's just easier to attract vendors, musicians and people in places where there are more. But since I came to this area six years ago, I've been repeatedly impressed with the forward thinking leaders who make up this county: despite major changes and losses of stalwart businesses over the last few years, Grundy Center's downtown remains incredibly vibrant and full of variety.

Dike, thanks to its prime location and the remarkable generosity of a few local philanthropists, has grown by nearly 500 residents in under 30 years, built a state-of-the-art golf course and landed the "crown jewel" of athletic facilities with the Kruger-Hemmen Complex. Conrad joined the Main Street Iowa program in its early days and supported a complete transformation of its downtown area, and now it's preparing to undertake a major housing development project that could add as many as 40 new lots. Grundy Center is following suit on downtown revitalization, and Lisa has never been hesitant to try out new events and marketing strategies. Some of them land better than others (often due to factors beyond anyone's control, like the weather), but all of them are proof that she's been phenomenal at her job so far.

And people are paying attention. Even in places like Grundy Center, they want to come out and be entertained more than one weekend a year, and they want to showcase what they have to offer to both residents and visitors. And as anyone who lives in a community like this knows, we sure do have a lot to offer.

Iowa Crop Progress
and Conditions Report

Week of June 17-23, 2019

DES MOINES – Iowa Secretary of Agriculture Mike Naig today commented on the Iowa Crop Progress and Condition report released by the USDA National Agricultural Statistics Service. The report is released weekly from April through November.

"The cool, wet weather pattern persisted across much of the state last week," said Secretary Naig. "Now that most farmers are done planting, we need some warmer temperatures to help the crops catch up."

The weekly report is also available on the USDA's site at nass.usda.gov/ia.

Crop Report

Another wet week as showers and thunderstorms moved through the State meant Iowa farmers had limited opportunities for fieldwork during the week ending June 23, 2019, according to the USDA, National Agricultural Statistics Service. Statewide there were just 3.1 days suitable for fieldwork. Fieldwork activities included planting, harvesting hay, spraying and applying nitrogen.

Topsoil moisture condition was rated 0 percent very short, 1 percent short, 68 percent adequate and 31 percent surplus. Subsoil moisture condition was rated 0 percent very short, 1 percent short, 62 percent adequate and 37 percent surplus.

Ninety-six percent of the expected corn crop has emerged, two weeks behind last year and 15 days behind the 5-year average. Corn condition improved to 62 percent good to excellent. Ninety-five percent of the expected soybean crop has been planted, two weeks behind average. Eighty-one percent of the crop has emerged, over two weeks behind last year and average. Soybean condition rated 63 percent good to excellent, also an improvement from the last report.

Oats headed reached 58 percent, eight days behind last year and average, while 3 percent of the crop has started coloring. Oat condition rated 63 percent good to excellent. Wet conditions slowed progress on the first cutting of alfalfa hay with just 73 percent of the crop harvested statewide, nearly two weeks behind average. Hay condition rated 66 percent good to excellent. Pasture condition continued to improve and rated 69 percent good to excellent. Feedlots were muddy after recent rainfalls.

Weather Summary

An unsettled and active weather pattern across the Midwest brought multiple days of showers and thunderstorms across Iowa during the reporting period. The western two-thirds of Iowa experienced above average rainfall while the northeast corner was slightly drier than average. Unseasonable coolness also continued across the state. Temperatures averaged 67.2 degrees, 4.1 degrees below normal.

Weekly rainfall totals ranged from 0.23 inches at Cresco (Howard County) to 5.01 inches in Allerton (Wayne County). The statewide weekly average precipitation was 1.73 inches, while the normal is 1.17 inches. The week's high temperature of 86 degrees was observed in Oakland (Pottawattamie County) on the 17th, four degrees above normal. Cedar Rapids (Linn County) reported the week's low temperature of 49 degrees on the 18th, 12 degrees below average.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 99 OF THE GRUNDY CENTER CITY CODE OF ORDINANCES RELATING TO THE MINIMUM CHARGE FOR SANITARY SERWER USE

Be It Ordained By the Council of the City of Grundy Center, Iowa:

SECTION 1. PURPOSE. The purpose of this Ordinance is to amend Chapter 99, Section 99.07 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Grundy Center, Iowa, as to Sewer Use Charge.

SECTION 2. AMENDMENT TO MUNICIPAL CODE. Section 99.07 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Grundy Center, Iowa, is hereby amended so as to delete the entire Section and substitute therefore the following:
99.07 MINIMUM CHARGE. The minimum charge per month per user shall be \$20.40. The total minimum charge shall be paid by the user responsible for the meter. In addition, each user responsible for a meter (except as provided in Section 99.08) shall pay a user charge rate for operation and maintenance including replacement of \$1.28 per 100 cubic feet of water as determined in the preceding section. For those properties where sump pump connections into the sewer system have been approved by the City pursuant to Section 95.04 (2), there will be an additional monthly charge of \$10.20. There will be a 2% rate increase made effective July 1st of each calendar year and reviewed every five years.

SECTION 3. REPEALER. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances heretofore enacted by the City Council of the City of Grundy Center, Iowa, in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby expressly repealed.

SECTION 4. SEPARABILITY OF PROVISIONS. It is the intention of the City Council that each section, paragraph, sentence, clause and provision of this Ordinance is separable, and if any such provision is held unconstitutional or invalid for any reason, such decision shall not affect the remainder of this Ordinance or any part thereof other than that affected by such decision.

SECTION 5. EFFECTIVE DATE. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication as provided by law.

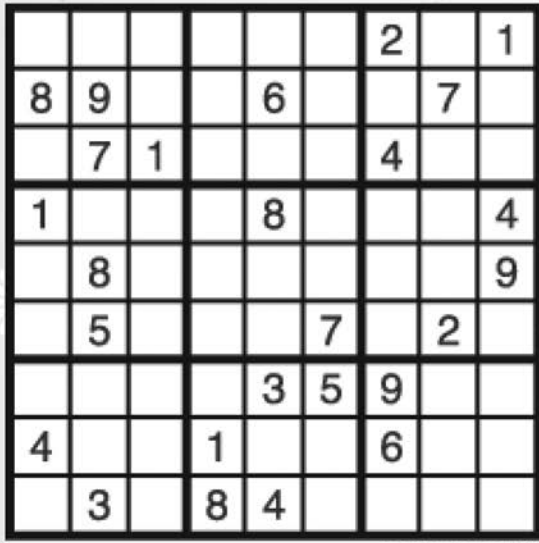

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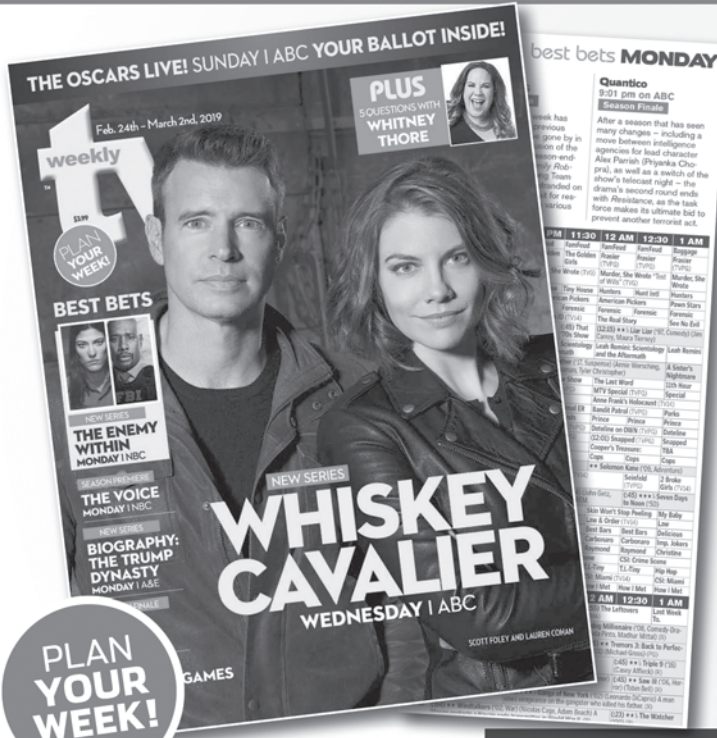
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Wednesday's softball: Single run gets Comets past Cougars

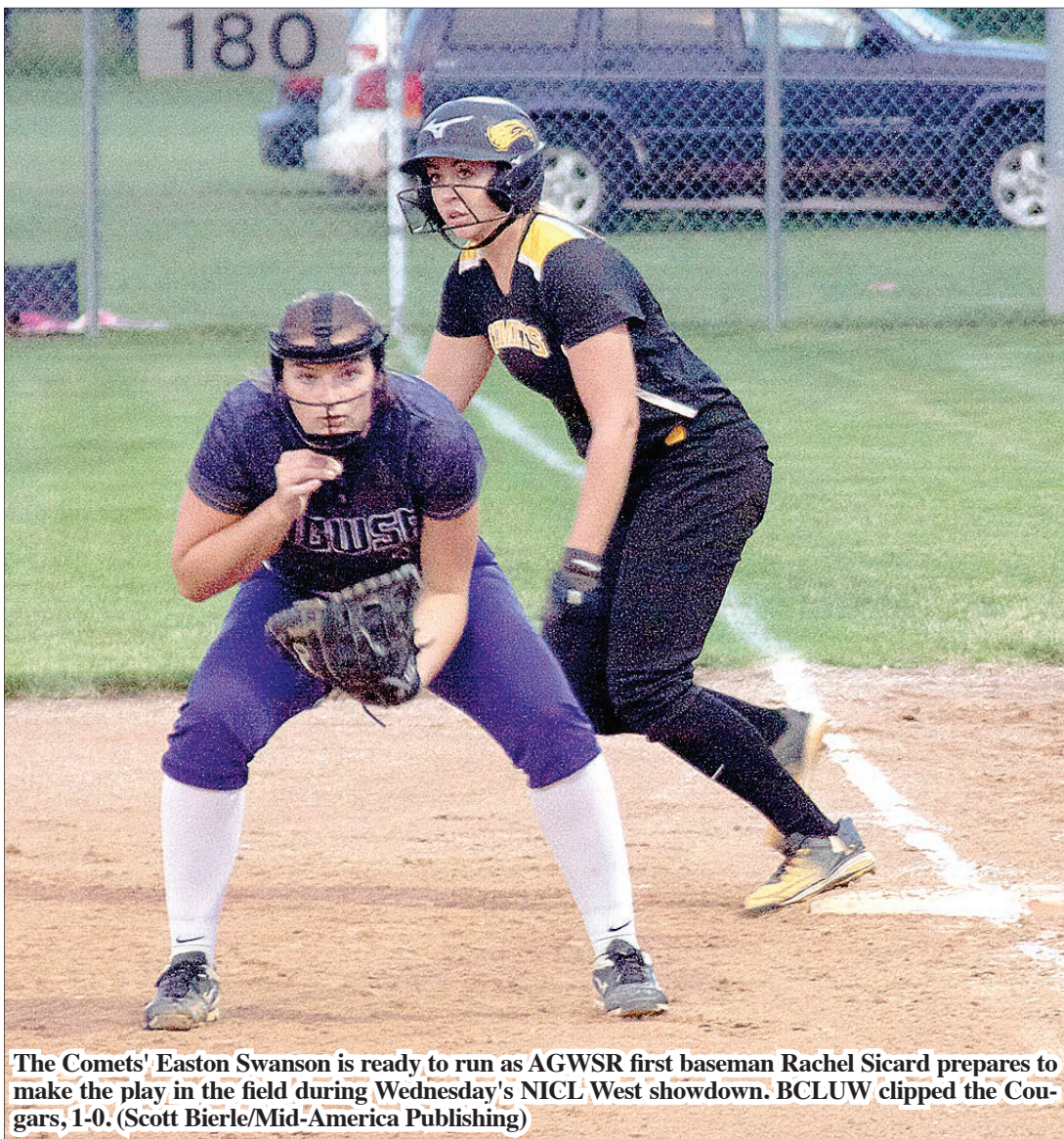

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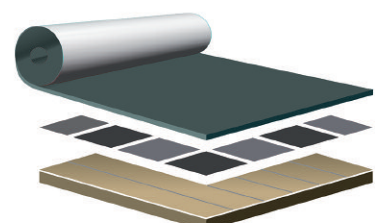
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Friday's baseball: Cougars keep it rolling

Starr and Bartling in relief combined on a four-hitter. Starr struck out seven, walked five and hit one in five for the win.

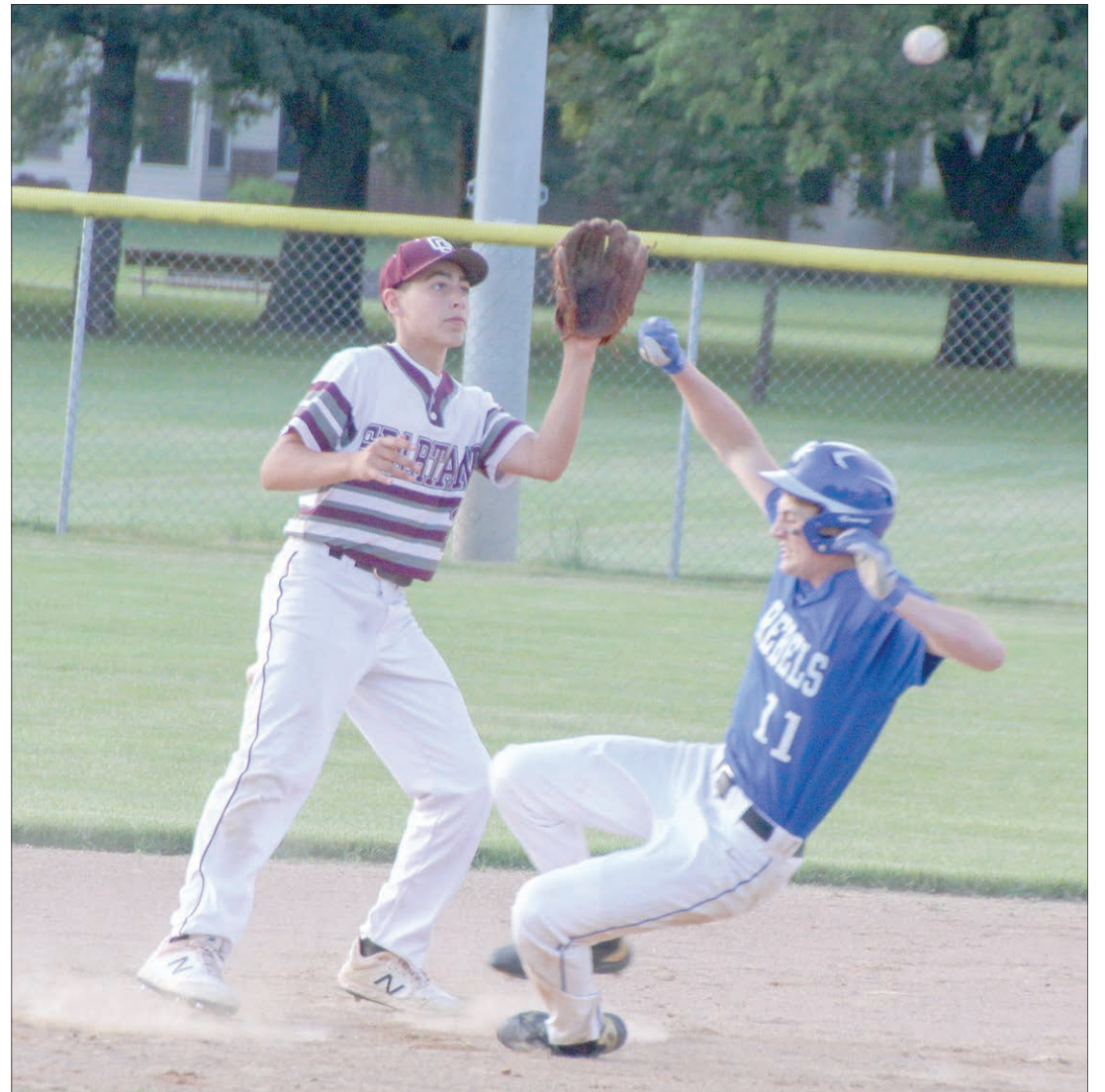

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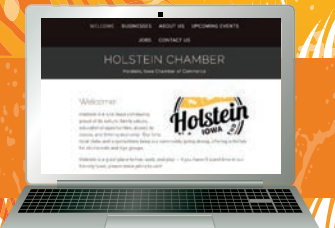
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
