GRUNDY ČENŤER- Tim Wolthoff was in his early 20s driving truck for a Wellsburg-based gravel hauling company, and he'd just purchased a brand new Citizens Band (CB) radio. When he reported for work on a Monday morning, it was gone: the whole fleet had been robbed. Up to that point, he'd wavered on what he wanted to do for the rest of his life, but in a moment of clarity, he made up his mind.

After over 40 years in law enforcement, 37 years with the Grundy County Sheriff's Office and the last two as the county's emergency management coordinator, Wolthoff, who worked his way up to Chief Deputy, reported for duty for the final time last week and capped off an illustrious career in the same town where he grew up and graduated from high school.

colleagues recalled the Chief Deputy's wealth of local knowledge, his knack for breaking burglary cases and his ability to form bonds with people who would have otherwise been adversaries.

Hometown boy

graduating from Upon GCHS, Wolthoff considered becoming an Industrial Arts instructor, studying at both Ellsworth Community College and a bad motorcycle accident left him laid up for most of a summer between schools, he took a job at John Deere in Waterloo. He'd had a long-running curiosity about law enforcement, but the aforementioned incident sealed the deal.

"I had a scanner and was always interested in listening to the guys out there and the radios," he said.

It didn't take long for his hometown Grundy Center Police Department to take notice and hire Wolthoff on as a full-

World War II. Both died in the wars and were buried overseas.

Although there were many soldiers lost in foreign wars, Rannfeldt said he chose to write his book about local soldiers who were actually buried overseas.

"In Vietnam and Korea and other foreign wars, the soldiers' bodies were taken home and buried, but in World War I and World War II, many of the soldiers were buried overseas," he said. "I wanted to write about them because they are the ones that are sometimes forgotten; there is no grave to visit."

The book starts with Roland Roeder, a young man in his early 20s, who lived between Reinbeck and Grundy Center.

When doing his research for the story, Rannfeldt found out

GCPD warns local business owners of scam

GRUNDY CENTER - The Grundy Center Police Department is warning local business owners in Grundy Center and Grundy County of a new scam, in which an advertising company is trying to sell advertisements to local business owners.

According to the GCPD, a Texas-based company called Universal Adcom - which has been known to engage in fraudulent practices - has been targeting businesses in Grundy Center, along with businesses around the county and the nation in the attempt to sell fraudulent advertisements to them.

This company said they were working with the Police Dept. and the Grundy Center Chamber-Main Street, and both organizations have stated that they have no affiliation with Universal Adcom.

GCPD Police Chief Doug Frost said the company has been engaging in these calls nationwide, and that his department has already spoken to several business owners to warn them of the scam.

"It's the same as any scam," Frost said. "Before you give money to anyone, you have to verify it. Call us here at the police department, and tell us about it. Don't give them any money if you're not sure if it's legitimate. If you're unsure, you can always ask them for more contact information. Right now, we've already been in contact with a lot of the local business owners about it."

Frost said it's important to stay vigilant, and never to give someone money unless you verify their claims first.

CONRAD- Eric Engle and Josh Cordes are ready to bring something different to the annual Black Dirt Days celebration in Conrad—something that most of the audience has probably never seen before.

The first ever deadlift competition will begin behind the Conrad Public Library on Saturday with a weigh-in at noon, a rules meeting at 12:45 and lifting at 1:00 p.m. They're expecting between 50 and 60 lifters, and they've received an influx of sponsorships from local businesses to cover trophies, prizes and necessary construction equipment.

"It's really cool to have something different and to have the community support, and to have people coming from different parts of the state, that's pretty neat," Cordes said. "I'm thinking it will be a pretty good success. I think it's going to be neat just for the people who don't know what it is to introduce them to it. They may have never gotten a chance to see it or do it.' Lifters are expected to make the trip to Conrad from across the state, and many will be first time visitors to the communi-

ty. And while Engle and Cordes—who hatched the idea after competing in Baxter last summer—are crossing their 'T's' and dotting their 'I's' to make sure that everything goes off without a hitch, they're excited to offer festivalgoers a whole new experience.

"I'm probably just as excited for the spectators and their comments during and after (the competition) because people are going to see things they've never seen before. We've got guys lifting in the 700 pound range that no one would consider touching without a skid loader," Engle said. "There are people that are going to be wide eyed and in awe."

Above all else, it's an opportunity to introduce fans, aspiring lifters and men and women who just want to get in better shape to a fascinating and fast rising sport, and if the contest goes well, Cordes and Engle plan to make it a yearly tradition complete with a scholarship for an outstanding local student. "Especially at our age, you don't deadlift for the accolades. You deadlift because you like to do it, and you want to get other people interested in it," Cordes said.

time officer in 1979. Sheriff Rick Penning, who'd grown up in Wellsburg, started as a jailer, became a deputy and was eventually elected sheriff in 1982, helped the Dike PD and got to know his fellow young officer-though, one could argue, not for a great reason.

"I knew (Wolthoff) had a white Mustang, and he tore up the streets," Penning joked.

His assessment of his partner, however, has improved greatly in the years since.

"Tim was very detailed. He dotted his 'I's,' crossed his 'T's.' He was conscientious. He was good with the public, and I can't hardly ever remember a complaint," the sheriff said.

Bill Martin's retirement as the sheriff and Penning's appointment opened up an opportunity for Wolthoff, and he jumped at it. Nonetheless, his old boss at the city police department, Francis 'Skee' Gutosky, was considering a run of his own, and if he won, it would've bumped Penning back down to deputy and left Wolthoff without a job.

He took the risk, and the rest, as they say, is history.

A consummate cop

A workaholic through and through, Wolthoff took interest in all aspects of law enforcement, but none moreso than accident scenes and burglaries. Even in his final weeks on the job, he was working a string of robberies in the county and surrounding areas and made an arrest on May 12.

"All I wanted was a quiet week," Wolthoff said.

One case that stands out involved a burglary at the north

that Roeder was the first man in the county to volunteer for World War I. He was also the only known Reinbeck local to have died and been buried overseas during World War I.

After joining the army, Roeder was a "runner" stationed in France. His job was a very dangerous one. He was in charge of carrying messages between the colonel and the commander on the front lines, running out through the battlefield while dodging enemy bullets to get his

side trailer park in Grundy Center on Halloween night: Wolthoff, as he drove by, noticed a vehicle with Black Hawk County plates and wondered why it was in town for the holiday. He remembered the letters on the license plate and got a call-less than an hour later—alerting him of an armed robbery in the area. The suspect just happened to be driving the same car he'd passed by earlier. As it turned out, the suspect, who knew that the victim had recently come into a windfall of cash, put a ski mask over his face and wielded a tire iron while unsuccessfully demanding the money.

He was convicted of armed robbery and ended up in the Fort Madison maximum-security prison. Wolthoff doesn't have a secret or a trick to share with aspiring cops: there's no substitute for hard work-though, he does note, specific items stolen often mean it's someone familiar with the victim, while a more general machine shed or garage robbery could easily be random.

"It's just basic going out, boots on the ground and knocking on doors, you know. 'Hey, did you see anything in the area?"" Wolthoff said. "Those are fun, especially when you can solve them.'

Wolthoff, Penning and the rest of the team have prided themselves on keeping the communities and rural areas they serve safe over the years and doing everything they can to live up to an old saying: if you're going to do anything wrong, stay out of Grundy County because they'll catch you at it.

"I felt proud of that because we want people who were go-

ing to be law-abiding. That's who we want in the county," Wolthoff said. "If you're here for other reasons than following the laws, those are the ones we don't need."

And although he's certainly a tough, law-and-order officer at his core, Wolthoff has built a strong reputation predicated on respect for the people he interacts with-they've sent him letters from correctional facilities, corresponded as they turned their lives around and even asked him to keep belongings for them.

"I've met people that I've arrested and gotten to know them, where they are really down to earth, good people. They just made some bad choices in life," he said. "I've had people that have contacted me when they were in prison wanting to know, 'Hey Tim, are you still there? When I get out, I'm going to come by, shake your hand and thank you.' I've gotten a lot of thank yous from the people I've arrested, and that makes you feel good... Sometimes, it takes sitting back here incarcerated for them to realize: is this what you want to do for the rest of your life?"

The times they are a changin'

Ask any cop how law enforcement has changed over the last several decades, and you'll likely get a variation on the same answer: courts want more warrants, less use of force and more concrete probable cause as they seek prosecutions. 'Gut instincts' and consent searches are frowned upon, and an officer could end up waiting several hours for a routine inspection of a vehicle along Highway 20 as

they drive back to Grundy Center, type a warrant and wake a judge up to sign it.

Compounded with the increasing number of mental health cases and the burden of local sheriff's departments to deal with them, it's a whole new ballgame. A rotating crew of deputies often spends entire days and afternoons monitoring an individual who needs a bed at one of Iowa's mental health facilities, and it continues to put a strain on small departments statewide.

"It's ridiculous... The system's broken. It really is,' Wolthoff said. "They're build-ing new beds, I hear, but those beds will be full.'

Another recent phenomenon is the rise of cybercrimes, which have even trickled into mostly rural counties like this one- from phone scams to illicit messaging to cases of child pornography and sexual abuse.

Through all of his experiences, Wolthoff, who's joining longtime coworkers Ken Yeomans, Nathan Stahl and Ron Tordoff in retirement, has gained insight into some of the darker corners of the modern world as well as a deep empathy and understanding for the people-good, bad and in-between-he's met along the way. Now, he has time to focus on being a dad and a grandpa and getting his parents' house on the market, but he's realistic: if he doesn't find another job within a few months, he'll probably go

The U.S. Weather Bureau Stationat Grundy Center recorded 41 degree reading both Sunday and Monday mornings, which is believed to be a record low for each date.

An official 34-hundreths of an inch of rain was recorded at the Weather Bureau Station on Saturday, but unofficial amounts o more than an inch reportedly fell in northern sections of the county.

Six consectutive days of dry weather prior to SAturday's rain enabled Grundy County farmers to finish planting corn, and soybean planting is now ewll underway.

However, filed wokr was intercupted once again this Wednesday morning by more rian. The high for the week was 88 degress last Thursday afternoon, and temperatures reached the 80's five out of the past eight days.

75 Years Ago This Week - 1944

Sergeant Donald Stull, son of Mr. and Mrs. C.W. Stull, returned home Tuesday evening from Italy where he had been serving with the 34th Division up to the 7th of April. He is the first Grundy man who served with the American army in Italy who has been permitted to come home under the new 1 % permonth rotation furlough plan. He left italy on the 7th April and after arriving in this country was sent to Jefferson Barracks, MO. He is to return there for further orders at the conclusion of his 21-day furlough. Sergeant Stull has had a very good taste of war since he enlisted with Co.H of the Iowa National Guard three years ago last January. He was sent to Camp Claiborne for his initial training. He was sent overseas two years and one month agao. He is with the 34th division. He was in the American invasion of Africa from start to finish and was among the first of the American firces to land in Italy. He lived two years in the danger zone and was not injured.

Letter to the editor:

In response to Mr. Keninger's complaint regarding the Secondary Road Department and roads at the meeting of the Board of Supervisors on May 28, 2019, which was reported in The Grundy Register on May 30, 2019, Mr. Keninger is correct in saying that the gravel roads are in rough condition. However, this is not due to inferior maintenance. Grundy County spends over \$2 million on its rock-surfaced roads (including snow removal), and the Road Department will receive \$1.75 million in property taxes in fiscal year 2019.

I have visited with surrounding county engineers, and they have said the same thing—rock surfaced roads are in tough condition. We had over 21 inches of rain last fall (saturating the soil) followed by 60 inches of snow this past winter (which broke an all-time record) and a colder than normal winter, all of which contributed to the poor conditions. This spring has been wet and cool and has not allowed the roads to dry out and firm up. It is difficult to blade roads when the conditions are too wet. The Grundy County Secondary Road Department exceeded the snow removal budget by over \$100,000. The rock that was hauled this past spring is now embedded in the soft roads and no longer visible. The county is required by law to stay within its budget which means that other line items in the budget must make up the difference. The current FY2019 Secondary Road budget had to be amended due to these increased costs.

Mr. Keninger failed to mention and the Grundy Register did not print that his road (130th Street) will receive 250 tons of road stone per mile this summer as reported by Supervisor Schildroth at that meeting. Grundy County has 93 miles of Farm to Market (FM) rock-surfaced roads, and beginning in fiscal year 2013, the board of supervisors authorized the road department to resurface FM rock-surfaced roads every year, putting those roads on a threeyear rotation. The other rock-surfaced roads (540 miles) received 100 tons per mile last year. This summer, this will be increased to 135 tons per mile (a 35 percent increase). A construction project had to be delayed in order to accomplish the increase in rock surfacing. The Grundy Register reported in the article that according to Mr. Keninger, he witnessed county employee(s) making personal purchases at Norby's Farm Fleet. This is not what Mr. Keninger said. He said he heard county employees talking about personal sprayer parts, of which no personal purchase(s) were made using county funds according to our records. The Secondary Road Department does own a lawn weed sprayer to spray weeds on yards around county shops. Parts were purchased for that weed sprayer last fall. The Grundy Register incorrectly reported this and should retract that statement. Just because a person says something does not mean it occurred. The Grundy Register should follow up on serious accusations before printing in the newspaper. We are doing the best we can to maintain the rock-surfaced roads in Grundy County while staying within the budget in a situation that is out of our control.

Iowa Crop Progress and Conditions Report

DES MOINES — Iowa Secretary of Agriculture Mike Naig today commented on the Iowa Crop Progress and Condition report released by the USDA National Agricultural Statistics Service. The report is released weekly from April through November.

"It has been another challenging week weather-wise for farmers across the state," said Secretary Naig. "With just 1.3 days suitable for fieldwork, the historic planting delays continue. The corn planting progress is now nearly three weeks behind the five-year average, and soybean planting progress is 18 days behind last year and the five-year average. This coming week is critical for farmers who are making tough planting decisions. If we can get a stretch of warm, dry days, farmers can make significant gains."

The weekly report is also available on the USDA's site at nass. usda.gov/ia.

Crop Report

Iowa farmers continue to battle wet field conditions as another week of heavy rainfall limited farmers to only 1.3 days suitable for fieldwork statewide during the week ending June 2, 2019, according to the USDA, National Agricultural Statistics Service. The lower third of Iowa had 0.5 day suitable for fieldwork or less for the second week in a row.

Topsoil moisture levels rated 0 percent very short, 0 percent

short, 50 percent adequate and 50 percent surplus. Subsoil moisture levels rated 0 percent very short, 0 percent short, 49 percent adequate and 51 percent surplus.

Eighty percent of the expected corn crop has been planted, nearly 3 weeks behind the 5-year average. This is the smallest amount of corn planted by June 2 since 1982 when 76 percent of the expected crop had been planted. There were comments that some of these expected corn acres may go to soybeans or prevented planting. Fifty-eight percent of the crop has emerged, 12 days behind last year and 13 days behind average.

Forty-one percent of the expected soybean crop has been planted, 18 days behind last year and average. This is the smallest percent of soybeans planted by June 2 since 1993 when just 39 percent of the expected crop had been planted. Seventeen percent of the crop has emerged, 2 weeks behind last year and 13 days behind average. Ninety-three percent of the expected oat crop has emerged, 8 days behind last year and 10 days behind average. Six percent of the crop has headed, 8 days behind average.

Only 4 percent of the State's first cutting of alfalfa hay has been completed, over two weeks behind average. Hay condition rated 60 percent good to excellent. Pasture condition decreased slightly to 62 percent good to excellent. Feedlots remain muddy.

Making waves New Hartford Splash Pad committee

unveils plans By MICHAELA KENDALL The Grundy Register

NEW HARTFORD - Even though a swimming pool isn't in the stars for New Hartford, an enthusiastic group of volunteers are working to bring a splash pad to town, where local families and kids can go to cool down on a hot, summer day.

Currently, the New Hartford Splash Pad committee has been in contact with an engineer who provided a potential design for a 60' by 45' splash pad that the committee hopes to construct at ackwaukee Park. The design shows a number of water features that are perfect for kids of all ages, spread out across a concrete pad. The nearby shelter and bathrooms make the park the perfect location for a summer splash pad, with the potential for a concession stand even. The committee estimated that the splash pad would cost around \$150,000 to build, and they hope to fundraise for the first half of the project cost and apply for grants to cover the remaining portion. Though there's still a long process ahead, the group is jumping in head first and will be debuting the project at their first fundraiser breakfast during Beaver Creek Days this weekend. The fundraiser breakfast, "Breakfast with a Mermaid," will be the group's first formal fundraiser, and they will also benefit from the Community Awards Dinner, which will donate the proceeds from the meal to the splash pad committee. New Hartford City Clerk Shawna Hagen - who is on the splash pad committee - says there's been a lot of excitement around the splash pad project, with more people jumping on board to get involved. "People are really excited about the opportunity to have something like this in town," she said. "We're a small community, so this is a big undertaking for us, but the hope is that it will add to all the great things our town already has. This will be a great thing our citizens will love, and it will hopefully bring more people to town as well, so that helps our overall goal of growing the community.' Hagen said the goal is to ultimately have the splash pad built by next summer, but that it will depend on how soon the committee gets the necessary funds put together.
