## Capacity crowd gathers for Grundy Road meeting

DIKE- More than 50 area residents filed in to the Dike Community Hall for an informational meeting regarding the controversial plan to pave five miles of a gravel road along the Grundy-Black Hawk County line last Wednesday night.

As Grundy County Engineer Gary Mauer, Black Hawk County Engineer Cathy Nicholas and her assistant engineer Ryan Brennan explained to the Boards of Supervisors of both counties and a standing room only crowd, the impetus for the proposal is a substantial increase in traffic over a 35-year period. The northern portion of the road, which runs south from Highway 20 about five miles east of Dike, is now traveled by over 350 vehicles per day (including semi truck drivers

Home tour to showcase

GRUNDY CENTER - From prairie-style gems to Victorian masterpieces - the architectural history of Grundy Center is rich and filled with stories. Those stories and that history will be on display during the Historic Home Tour on Thursday afternoon.

The tour - which is being hosted by the Grundy Center Chamber Main Street, Grundy Center Historical Society and the local P.E.O. - will be held on Thursday, May 30 from 4:30 to 6:30 p.m. and will showcase four historic homes in Grundy Center in honor of National Historic Preservation Month in May.

Tour-goers will meet at the Grundy Center Historical Society Museum (610 7th Street) where they will be transported by trolley to each of the homes. Once at the homes, they will be met by knowledgeable volunteers who will provide historical facts and interesting stories about the home.

Tickets are needed for the tour, and are available at the Grundy Center City Hall and online from www.GrundyCenterCMS.com - proceeds will benefit the P.E.O. and Chamber-Main Street organization.

Lisa Bienfang, Grundy Center Chamber-Main Street Director, says the organization is excited about the opportunity to help showcase Grundy Center's architectural history in honor of Historic Preservation Month - with historic preservation being an important part of the Chamber-Main Street mission.

"We're grateful for the opportunity to collaborate with Chapter AR P.E.O. and the Grundy Center Historical Society on this event," she said. "They were instrumental in coordinating docents and researching the homes to help tell compelling stories about people who lived in our community. ## The last hurrah

Beaman High School alums reunite for the final time

BEAMAN- When members of the final graduating class at Beaman High School received their diplomas in 1958, most of the current administrators and staff at what's now BCLUW hadn't yet been born. But even as the town of under 200 residents endured multiple consolidations in the ensuing decades, the reunions were always can't miss events, attracting Wildcat alumni from across the country and packing the Beaman Memorial Hall to the brim.

As the youngest graduates are now closing in on 80 years of age, organizer Patty (Ashton) Reuter, a 1959 graduate of the first Beaman-Conrad class who now lives in East Moline, Illinois, made the difficult decision to hold the final reunion on Sunday with around 45 guests in attendance. During a subsequent interview, she lamented that back in the 1950s, the reunions

would draw upwards of 250 guests, but those days have long since passed as the school itself drifts further into history and more alums die each year—25 of them have passed since the 2014 reunion.

The three oldest guests, Doris Colin, Veryl Hammond and Jim Rattray, were all honored with a few lighthearted comments about how young they still feel, and the group enjoyed a meal together before congregating for one final group photo.

Since the last event in 2014, three of Reuter's most active fellow planners—Charlotte (Barfels) Zern, Lois (Lynch) Skramovsky and Leo Kopsa, who served as the president of the banquet—have all passed away.

"Several people said, 'Oh, we don't want it to be the final one,' but like somebody said yesterday, 'Well, do you want to plan it?'" Reuter said. "It's not easy."

Even in its heyday, graduating classes at Beaman were usually between 10 and 20 students, and the 1958 class had just seven members—Marsha Anderson, Sharon Cain Ziesman, the late John Lucas, the late Jerry Gard, Elmer St. Clair, Richard Stewart and Larry Wescott. Through the students, the former students and teachers have remained proud of their small school, their achievements in extracurricular activities and their longstanding traditions.

"It was a wonderful place," Reuter said.

And in the years since she's left, Reuter—along with her aforementioned planning partners who stayed in the area—has relished the opportunity to get the gang back together. When asked why she had taken on such a big role, a nearby attendee summed it up succinctly.

"She always told people where to go," he said.

## GC Council discusses new welcome signs

**GRUNDY CENTER** - In an effort to welcome visitors and highlight the town, the Grundy Center City Council is currently looking into purchasing new welcome signs, which would be installed on the north, east and west sides of town to greet those coming into Grundy Center.

Last spring, the council voted to remove the aging, wooden signs that were previously located on the north and east edges of town while looking into replacing them with more modern, updated signs.

During their meeting last week, City Clerk Kristy Sawyer presented some possible options and prices to the council. The prices for each sign ranged from \$20,000 to \$40,000 each. Higher end options would include an electronic message board, with additional options such as landscaping and lighting.

There was talk of doing the project in phases, since the council would like up to three signs - which could cost over \$100,000 for the whole project, especially if the council goes with higher-end signs with a message board.

Council members agreed that the signs need to be looked into more.

"We'd like to have some nice signs to get people downtown and hopefully spur some business," Sawyer said. "The old

ones were very worn and dated so it's time for an upgrade."

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## Road frustrations return to the forefront at supervisors meeting

GRUNDY CENTER- A familiar discussion on the state of Grundy County's gravel roads dominated the most recent Board of Supervisors meeting Tuesday morning when a concerned resident suggested shifting the secondary roads crew's priorities and suspending service on roads without homes.

Jon Keninger, who lives between Wellsburg and Ackley in the northwest corner of the county, explained that his frustration is "growing larger every day" and blamed the condition of the roads on what he considers inferior maintenance.

In listing his grievances, Keninger, who added that he travels a five county area for work, alleged that he had witnessed Secondary Roads employees making personal purchases at Norby's and driving 25 miles per hour near the Iowa Select Mill Site, and he questioned why the supervisors have received raises if they only work

"three to four hours per week."

"I feel that we have poor workmanship in this county, and I travel this county a lot," Keninger said.

He went on to suggest turning all gravel roads without homes into Level Bs with no regular service—citing Franklin County as an example—but Board Chairman Mark Schildroth pushed back against the idea because of the farmers who have fields along those roads.

"I'm not sure that's going to go over well," he said. "All I can say is we're trying."

Schildroth also took umbrage with a recent assertion in a letter to the editor that any sort of favoritism was at play in determining which roads got rock and how often they got it. Fellow Supervisors Chuck Bakker and Jim Ross argued that in light of the weather and the frost boils around the state, roads have simply been more difficult to maintain than ever before.

"I don't think we've ever experienced anything quite like

this," Ross said.

The board did not take any official action. County Assessor John Freese stopped by to present a slideshow on upcoming changes to agricultural property tax laws—specifically, a provision capping overall increases at three percent. He made sure to note, however, that individual property tax bills can still go up even when assessed valuation goes down.

Earlier in the meeting, Schildroth reported that some Reinbeck area farmers have been putting down rock themselves along gravel roads and commended them for their efforts.

"They decided to be proactive and ask for forgiveness later," he said. "I applaud them for being proactive."

Sheriff Rick Penning introduced two new deputies, Justin Fox and Andrew Stanley, both of Grundy Center and both 28 years old, and their hiring received unanimous approval. Fox previously worked for the Grundy Center Police Depart-

ment.

The board approved a plan that would move district court to Gladbrook-Reinbeck High School in the event of an emergency that rendered the courthouse unusable and opted to move forward with a plan for a handicap accessible ramp at the new annex building.

**IN OTHER BUSINESS,** the board:

- Approved the use of the courthouse grounds for the Grundy County Bible Reading Marathon and, in a separate motion, for the Felix Grundy Festival Planning Committee.

- Presented service awards to BJ Jorgenson, Cole Anderson and William Beyer.

- Approved a resolution setting a hearing on the vacation of a portion of Westbrook Street east of Highway 57.

- Approved utility permit applications from Northern Natural Gas and Interstate Power and Light.

for large national corporations like Target and J.B. Hunt), more than double the number in the 1980s. The middle third of the road is up to about 160 vehicles per day, and the southern third, which intersects with D-35 (Zaneta Road), sees about 120 vehicles.

Under the current 28E agreement (the road is equally owned by both counties), Black Hawk County is responsible for maintenance and upkeep, and according to Nicholas, crews are placing about 500 tons of rock on Grundy Road annually at a cost of about \$40,000 a year. The county average for gravel roads is 300 tons per mile.

In addition to paving five miles of asphalt, the plan calls for re-grading and new culverts, and it will require the purchase of right-of-way along with reimbursement for affected landowners. The projected total cost is \$8 million, with Grundy and Black Hawk Counties sharing the burden equally.

The officials opened the meeting up for questions about 15 minutes in and heard opinions from across the spectrum: residents who live on the road overwhelmingly supported the pavement conversion, while

others felt that the money could be better used elsewhere amidst some of the worst gravel conditions in the state's history.

"(Four million dollars) would get a lot of these gravel roads in much better shape when the maintainer goes by, and he does his best. But you've got a row of powder with no rock in it," said Nate Stewart, who lives north of Dike.

Nearby landowners inquired about whether the path would account for the Zion Lutheran Church and liquid propane tanks along the road and how it might affect water drainage. And one overarching reality loomed for some of the older attendees at the meeting: paving the road has been mentioned for nearly a half century, and so far, it's never actually happened.

"In 1973, we built along that road, and they told us to move it back 26 feet because there was going to be a hard surface road," one man said, drawing laughs from the audience. "I've been looking for it for 45 years."

Grundy County Supervisor Mark Schildroth, who represents the Reinbeck area, shared a similar story of buying a farm around the same time and being told that he may need

to move his fence lines back before long. Nicholas did note, however, that past proposals have never moved as far as the current one, and it's in the five-year plan for both counties.

If the opposition has its way, the third attempt to pave the road in the last 45 years may still wind up unsuccessful. The Boards of Supervisors in both counties have voted to move forward with the project, but they will still need to approve any bonding referendum.

According to Grundy County Auditor Rhonda Deters, the board has the power to bond for "essential county purposes" without a ballot measure, including "capital projects for the construction, reconstruction, improvement, repair, or equipping of bridges, roads, and culverts if such capital projects assist in economic development which creates jobs and wealth, if such capital projects relate to damage caused by a disaster," or "if such capital projects are designed to prevent or mitigate future disasters."

A public hearing with advance notice will still be required. Written and oral comments will be allowed at the hearing, which has not yet been scheduled, and the matter will

be put to a vote of the board. If the proposal is approved, a resident or property owner in the county can appeal the decision to the district court and await an opinion on whether the supervisors have exceeded their authority as outlined in the state and county codes.

With the retirement of former Grundy County Supervisor Harlyn Riekema of District 2 (Wellsburg and Holland), his replacement, Heidi Nederhoff, could sway the board's position on any future votes. Supervisors Jim Ross (Beaman-Conrad) and Barb Smith (Grundy Center) are both staunch opponents of the project, while Schildroth and Chuck Bakker (Dike) support it.

During a subsequent interview, Mauer told The Grundy Register that despite initial concerns about a "torches and pitchforks" mentality, he believed that the meeting went well and provided valuable information to the public.

"I thought it went smoother than I was thinking (it would)," he said. "It went a lot better."

The meeting was originally scheduled at the Zion Lutheran Church on Grundy Road, but it was relocated due to projected weather and road conditions.

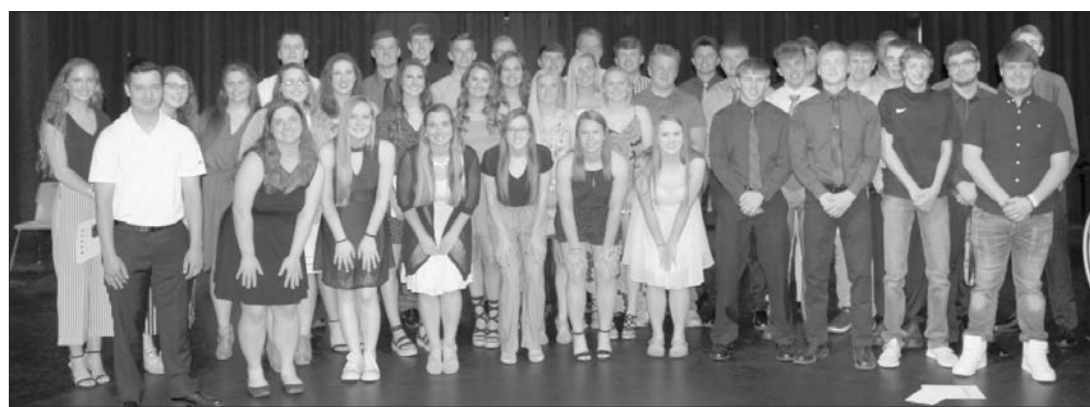

## Fallen heroes honored and remembered at Beaman, Conrad services

**BEAMAN, CONRAD-** Although weather conditions threw a wrench in the plans for several local Memorial Day observances on Monday, they couldn't keep residents from honoring area natives from honoring fallen service members in Beaman and Conrad.

The Conrad service, which was moved to the BCLUW High School auditorium from the Conrad cemetery, kicked off with an invocation from Pastor Gene Kubli and a patriotic reading of "In Flanders Fields" by Deidra Green before Dan Shine of the local American Legion post read the name of every deceased veteran from Conrad dating back to the War of 1812.

Rachel Bachman, a 2010 BCLUW graduate and current teacher with the district, delivered the keynote address about the valor of soldiers and the sacrifices they have made in the line of duty.

"Soldiers are warriors. Their bravery can only be matched by few others," she said. "We have easily one of the best, if not the best military operations in the world. We don't settle. We seek the exceptional. Some have made the ultimate sacrifice fighting for our country, but there isn't a single soldier who hasn't sacrificed something."

Bachman spoke of the "dash" between a person's birth and death, and how, for soldiers and veterans, that dash is full of "commitment, bravery and sacrifice." She later paraphrased a Memorial Day speech from former President Barack Obama

hailing fallen soldiers who "laid down their lives, so that we could live ours."

In closing, she asked audience members to challenge themselves in honor of the service members who have lost their lives and uphold the values that they fought to protect. Bachman reflected on her grandmother's final years, her own cancer diagnosis and how she found the resolve to battle through them.

"We all have the potential to be heroes, whether we claim the title of citizen or soldier. Think of those who served, who have loved and continue to love," she said. "Let's use their lives as inspiration to also be someone worth knowing."

The famous afternoon celebration in Beaman, now in its 137th year, was held outside despite howling winds, and it featured an award presentation for Citizen of the Year Carrie Smith, an improvisational piece from Logan Backoff and Cole Scafferi and special music from Beaman's own Emily Baker. USDA Director for Rural Development Grant Menke, the husband of Beaman native Susie (Miller) Menke, was the keynote speaker.

Menke, a native of Calumet in O'Brien County, shared stories of his grandfather's 25 bomber missions during World War II in the European theater and the way he described the experiences to Menke as a child.

"We flew the course as briefed," he recalled his grandfather saying. "We flew the course as briefed."

He praised Beaman for its

longstanding commitment to honoring veterans and urged everyone in the audience to make every day a day of remembrance, to "search, share and celebrate." He also touted the "Wolf Creek Cooking: Good Cooks of Beaman" cookbook for both its recipes and its historical facts about the community.

For example, among fourth class post offices, Beaman was first in the nation for war bonds sold during WWII, and in 1981, a recently freed survivor of the Iran hostage crisis spoke at the Memorial Day celebration.

Like Bachman, Menke implored attendees to serve their communities in a variety of ways, whether in the military, through running for local office, volunteering to coach a youth sports team or helping the needy.

"Serving means stepping up

and doing your part, sacrificing your time, your treasure and your energy, putting the needs of others in your community before yourself, not waiting or expecting someone else to do the job and not seeking or recognition for doing it," he said. "Here in Beaman, I know I'm preaching to the choir."

He concluded with his own reflections on a recent trip to the WWII Museum in New Orleans and a plaque that summed up his feelings on the heroism of the service members who fought in that conflict.

"At the core, the American soldier knew the difference between right and wrong, and they didn't want to live in a world in which wrong prevailed," he said. "So they fought, and won."

The BCLUW High School band provided patriotic music for both services.

10 Years Ago This Week - 2009

As the one-year anniversary of the devastating floods and tornadoes that struck Iowa last May and June nears, disaster assistance approved for residents and governments in Grundy County has reached \$488,581, according to the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and State of Iowa disaster recovery officials. This total details funding through FEMA's Individual Assistance and Public Assistance programs, and U.S. Small Business Administration disaster loans. FEMA Housing Assistance has approved 49 households in Grundy County for \$80,561. Housing Assistance provides rental assistance grants to eligible homeowners and renters who cannot or should not live in their disaster-damaged homes and grants to homeowners to make an owner-occupied structure livable.

All vehicles are welcome at Grundy County's third annual Ride for Soldiers Benefit Poker Run. The event will begin at 11 a.m. on Saturday, June 13, at Scotty's Saloon in Grundy Center (806 G Ave.) with a 21 gun salute offered by the Grundy Center Honor Guard, members of AMVETS and the American Legion. A prayer will follow. Then it's off to Dike, Reinbeck, Gladbrook, Beaman, Ackley, Steamboat Rock, Eldora, Traer and Lincoln. Riders need to be back in Grundy Center at Scotty's by 6 p.m.

25 Years Ago This Week - 1994

Commencement exercises at Grundy County's five public high schools will be held Sunday afternoon, May 29. A total of 267 seniors are candidates for diplomas from the five schools, including 53 at Gladbrook-Reinbeck, 40 at Grundy Center, 91 at Dike-New Hartford, 33 at Wellsburg Steamboat Rock, and 50 from BCLUW.

Grundy County's first D.A.R.E. classes held graduations across the county during the past week. Graduation exercises took place in Grundy Center, Dike, Reinbeck, Union (BCLUW), and Steamboat Rock (W/SR). Serving as master of ceremonies at all five graduations was Deputy Ron Tordoff, Grundy County D.A.R.E. Officer. Associate District Court Judge Tom Bower spoke to each of the graduating classes on how proud the community was of these students, and to always remember the support system taught with the program. Deputy Tordoff expressed appreciation to each of the school districts, the teachers and parents, the Sheriff's Dept., and to the communities for the success of the program's first year in Grundy County.

50 Years Ago This Week - 1969

Seven cars of a 15-car Rock Island freight train derailed a mile east of Grundy Center at 2:15 p.m. Sunday - leading to a brief scare after it was learned one of the damaged cars was loaded with anhydrous ammonia. A Rock Island official told The Grundy Register the accident was the result of a soft roadbed that cause the rails to give way under the weight of the passing train. More than a hundred yards of track was torn up. The spokesperson said it will take at least a week to remove the cars, repair the roadbed and replace rails and ties.

Grundy County will be without a Civil Defense director beginning next Monday, date the present director's recent resignation goes into affect. Dean Wiarda, of Grundy Center, quit the post effective June 1 after the Grundy County Board of Supervisors denied his request for a raise. Wiarda receives \$22 per diem - half paid by the federal government, the other half by the county. He asked for 30 per diem. In 1968, Wiarda received a salary of \$1,341, plus another \$365.56 in mileage and expenses. At their meeting Monday the supervisors took no action on naming a successor, though they discussed with Wiarda arrangements for storing the director's Civil Defense equipment and records.

75 Years Ago This Week - 1944

Two men had a narrow escape from death last Wednesday afternoon when their truck and trailer loaded with hogs collided with a car going in the opposite direction. The truck left the highway and dropped into a creek with four feet of water. Those in the truck were Henry Arnolds, 73, of Webster City and his nephew Francis Shields, who was driving. After the collision, the truck careened off the paving and plunged through the north side of a culvert into a ditch which was filled with water by the recent rains.

Winson Wallace has returned from north Africa, where she has been doing recreational work with the American Red Cross for the past year. She is visiting her grandfather, B. F. Shumway, and other relatives in Reinbeck. Miss Wallace, a graduate of the Reinbeck high school and of Iowa State Teachers college, taught at Fayette and Primghar before taking the position with the Red Cross.

Jens Peter Jensen from Reinbeck was taken to the county farm on Saturday. He died there Sunday afternoon following two strokes, that followed each other quite closely. He, was 70 years old. He was a native of Denmark. He came to America 50 years ago and to Reinbeck 40 years ago. The only relative in this country he was known to have is a nephew, Walter Thompson, from Nelson, Illinois.

A Sewage Disposal Plant is another major post-war project that Grundy Center will have to meet. Unlike the sewer extension project explained in the last issue of The Register, which may be built or be deferred indefinitely, subject to the demands of the people whom the sewer project would serve and to the judgment of the city council, the disposal plant is a mandatory project. The state board of health has for several years called the attention of the city council to the inadequacy of our present sewage disposal facilities and it has demanded that something be done about it. The matter has been postponed, but the time has arrived when the state insists that definite action be taken. In response to the demand of the state board of health, the Grundy city council has had plans prepared for a sewage disposal plant that would meet requirements. The plans were made by the Stanley Engineering Company and they have been submitted to the city council. The estimated cost of the plant would be \$57,500.



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Grassley Q & A:  
Memorial Day

**Question: What reflections do you have for Iowans on this Memorial Day?**

Answer: For as long as I can remember, Memorial Day has been a day for families, friends and neighbors to share collective grief and gratitude for the profound sacrifice our hometown heroes made to keep us safe. From a young age, I recall local members of veteran service organizations participating in the Presentation of Colors, watching a Rifle Salute to the Fallen and listening to the majestic notes of Taps in solemn observance of our fallen heroes. Close-knit communities across America observe the national day of mourning with patriotic music, flag memorials, gravesite ceremonies and neighborhood parades to honor and remember those who died in service to our nation. Since the American Revolution, hundreds of thousands of men and women in uniform have died at home and around the world in service to our country, defending the cherished blessings of freedom and liberty from one generation to the next. They have taken up arms to uphold peace and prosperity, defeat tyranny and protect our values and way of life. As a nation, we are called to honor these brave patriots and share in the sorrow of loved ones left behind. For them and all those called to serve in the Armed Forces, we owe a debt of gratitude. To be sure, President Abraham Lincoln cut to the heart of the matter and called upon the living to advance the cause "for which they gave the last full measure of devotion." It is our duty as Americans to carry out the mission our 16th president shared with historic clarity on November 19, 1863. From the scarred battlefields in Gettysburg, Pennsylvania, the president's message - delivered in just ten sentences - guides us in our annual observance of Memorial Day. We must stay resolved so those who die in service to our country "shall not have died in vain ... and that government of the people, by the people, and for the people, shall not perish from the earth."

**Question: Who belongs to a Gold Star Family?**

Answer: For the hundreds of thousands of men and women who lost their lives in service to our nation, tens of millions of Americans are left behind. The parents, spouses, children, grandparents, siblings and loved ones of a service member who died on active duty are known as Gold Star families. In addition to those lost in combat, thousands of service members die in non-hostile circumstances, including military training or accidents. No matter the circumstances of their loved one's death, Gold Star families experience the immeasurable loss of no reunification or joyous homecoming with a loved one who put on the uniform in service to our country. On Memorial Day, Americans are called to pay tribute to the service and sacrifice of America's fallen heroes. Let us also recognize the sacrifice of those left behind. As chairman of the tax-writing Senate Finance Committee, I supported efforts to fix a flaw in the 2017 tax law that unintentionally created a tax burden on children receiving military survivor benefits. The U.S. Senate approved passage of bipartisan legislation to fix a glitch that raised taxes on benefits provided to the children of deceased service members. The Senate continues to work with the House of Representatives to get a final product to the president's desk. When signed into law, this legislation would apply retroactively to tax years starting in 2018, and Gold Star families would be able to amend any tax returns they have already filed for last year. On this Memorial Day and every other day of the year, our nation's Gold Star families shoulder a tremendous loss. They don't deserve an added tax burden. Their loved one in uniform already paid the ultimate price while in service to our country.

Iowa Crop Progress  
and Conditions Report

Week of May 13-19, 2019

DES MOINES - Iowa Secretary of Agriculture Mike Naig today commented on the Iowa Crop Progress and Condition report released by the USDA National Agricultural Statistics Service. The report is released weekly from April through November.

"The weather challenges continued as many parts of the state received heavy rainfall late last week. Statewide we averaged 1.8" of rain, with some locations reporting more than 4" over the last seven days," said Secretary Naig. "Despite the wet conditions, farmers in northern and east central Iowa made notable gains, planting about one-quarter of their corn crop last week. We know farmers are anxious for a window of dry weather to wrap up in the fields."

Crop Report

Iowa farmers worked hard to make planting progress with drier conditions during the early part of the week ending May 19, 2019, according to the USDA National Agricultural Statistics Service. However, heavy rain fell late in the week which limited farmers to 2.7 days suitable for fieldwork statewide.

Topsoil moisture levels rated 0 percent very short, 0 percent short, 59 percent adequate and 41 percent surplus. Subsoil moisture levels rated 0 percent very short, 1 percent short, 58 percent adequate and 41 percent surplus.

Iowa corn growers have 70 percent of the expected crop planted, 5 days behind last year and 9 days behind the 5-year average. This is the smallest percent of corn planted by May 19 since 1995 when just 53 percent of the expected crop had been planted. Even with limited days suitable for fieldwork, farmers in the northern districts and east central Iowa managed to plant at least a quarter of their expected corn crop this past week. Northeast Iowa planted the highest percentage of corn as they planted 43 percent of their expected crop.

Twenty percent of the crop has emerged, over a week behind last year and average. Twenty-seven percent of the expected soybean crop has been planted, 8 days behind last year and 9 days behind average. Three percent of the crop has emerged, 6 days behind average. Nearly all the expected oat crop has been planted with 76 percent emerged, 2 days behind last year and 1 week behind average.

There were scattered reports for the first cutting of alfalfa hay. Hay condition rated 62 percent good to excellent. Pasture condition improved slightly to 63 percent good to excellent. Warmer temperatures early in the week helped pastures grow, allowing cattle farmers to move more cattle out to graze.

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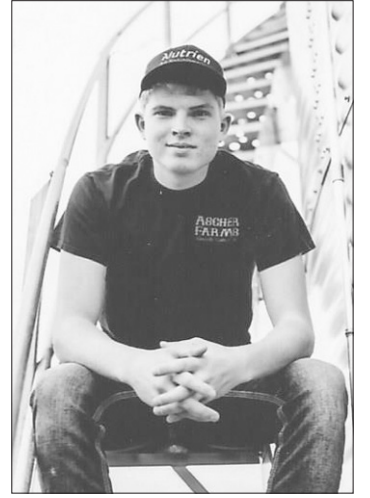


**W. Dwight & Lorraine A. Stone Estate agriculture scholarships awarded**

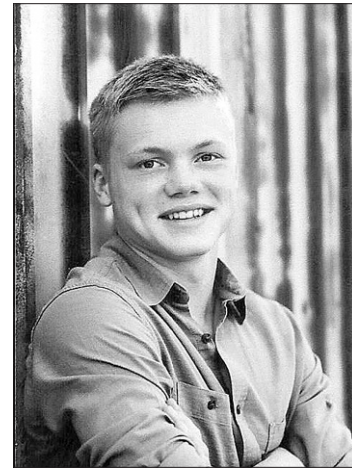

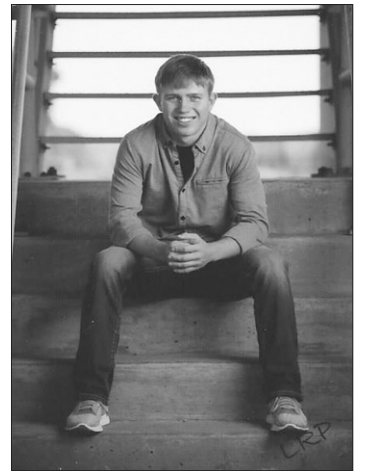

*"Go to the ant, you sluggard; consider its ways and be wise! It has no commander, no overseer or ruler, yet it stores its provisions in summer and gathers its food at harvest."*  
Proverbs 6:6-8 NIV



Being proactive entails creating or controlling a situation by causing something to happen rather than waiting for it to happen and then reacting to it. In this context, "proactive" is usually contrasted with "reactive," and we are often open to the criticism that we should be more proactive. Knowing that your car is having problems, the proactive response would be to make the repairs ahead of time rather than waiting for your car to break down on the side of the road. When thinking about the future, it is common for us to worry about events that may or may not happen, and thus we are often "pro-anxious," when we might be proactive. Anxiety can serve a useful purpose in our lives; it has been aptly described as an alarm which warns us of danger. When we have legitimate anxieties, it is like the

smoke alarm telling us that something is burning, but when we have anxiety over nothing, that is like the false alarm when nothing is on fire. When the anxieties are real, it is best to be proactive. When there is nothing we can do about the situation, the biblical advice to "not worry about tomorrow" is appropriate. When there is something we can and should do, we should follow the advice given in Proverbs, and be like the ant who stores up its food for the winter.

**INDUSTRIAL ARTS CURRICULUM REPORT:** Mr. Brett Purvis gave the curriculum report. There are 8 students in Advanced Construction, which is a 4 credit class, 2 classes with 9 students in one and 15 in the other of Intro to Building Trades, 6 students in Architect Drafting and 9 students in Power and Energy. In Advanced Construction, students are introduced to career options in the industrial arts, working with local businesses or homeowners to implement hands on training. Students are trained on tool and equipment safety, material usage, project planning and accountability of completed projects. The classes have helped with the greenhouse construction, high school set design for the plays, various businesses and local homeowners. In Intro to Building Trades, students learn to safely operate various woodworking tools and machines. Students also learn about tool safety and complete a small project. In Architectural Drafting, there is an in depth study of house plans and drawings with emphasis on details to a homebuyer, contractor, or to provide a record of a building. Students use the CAD applications for house plans. In the Power and Energy class, the course is divided into two, nine week periods with the first spent understanding the operations of a small engine and the second section deals with acquainting the students with electricity, the production of energy, and the development of carbon dioxide cars, and making a passive solar heat collector.

NEWTON – Dennis Dirks can't say for sure what would have happened on the final day of the Class 1A state golf tournament.

All the Grundy Center golf coach knows is what his group of seniors accomplished, particularly in the stretch of the last three seasons.

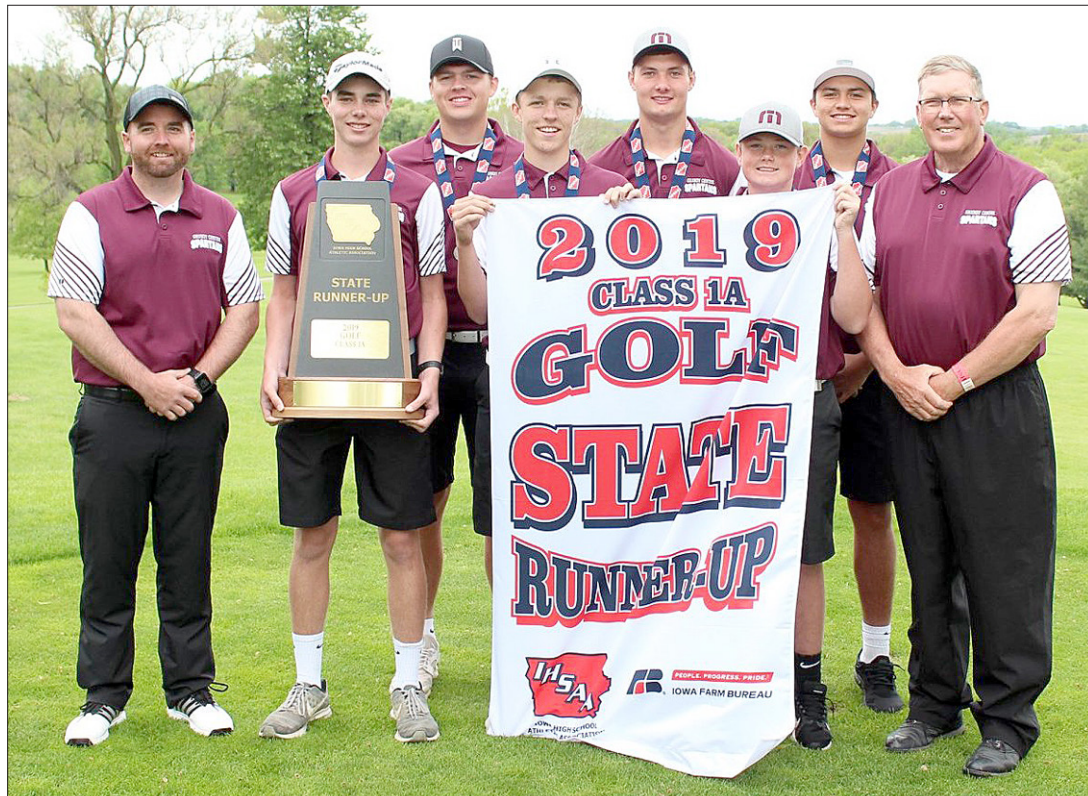
Heavy rains flooded parts of Westwood Golf Course on Friday morning ahead of the second round of action, and the decision was made to end the tournament after 18 holes and not have a make-up for the final round.

As a result, Grundy Center's second-place team total of 325 after the first round became the final tally, three strokes shy of state champions Harris-Lake Park.

Ashton Martens, a Grundy Center freshman, shot a 79 and finished tied for eighth place individually. Fellow first-year Spartan Dexter Whitehill carded an 80, followed by seniors Andy Cox and Matthew Sternhagen turning in an 82 and 84, respectively. Tanner Appel contributed a 90 and Travis Kuester shot 95 as they, too, finished their high school golf careers.

"This group of seniors, none of whom played a varsity meet as freshmen, each were responsible for orchestrating yet another outstanding season," Dirks said. "Capturing conference, sectional and district titles served as a true reflection of the accomplishments of this group. ... Many schools never earn the opportunity to play [at state], yet this group has walked away with a fourth-place finish, a state title, along with this year's second-place trophy."

Sternhagen had a feeling that this decision was coming when the team arrived and saw one of the bunkers on the course filled with water,

in addition to flooded spots around greens and over the course. The course was deemed unplayable, and similar decisions were made at the Class 2A and 3A sites. With the shortened 4A tournament last fall, all four classes only played 18 holes at the state tournament this season.

"It's tough knowing the opportunity we had," Sternhagen said. "Harris-Lake Park is a great team and we knew it'd be close if we got the opportunity to play. The hardest thing is now everyone is doing the 'What ifs,' whether it's shaving strokes here, saving a few there, everyone going through their round wondering if I lost

this or that. That's really tough, too."

Harris-Lake Park also led after the first day last season, though it was with a 345, a score that with this year's competition only been good enough for fourth place. Bishop Garrigan finished in third this year with a 344.

Dirks added that the Spartans have come a long way since a practice round at Westwood 50 days ago. That group shot 357 in that practice round, one stroke worse than their first-day total last year.

"We talked about goals coming in here today and they hoped to post four scores under 85. We reached that goal,"

Dirks said.

Sternhagen, who wasn't out for golf until Andy Cox convinced him and Tanner Appel to come out and play for the Spartans, credited Cox with helping him fall in love with the sport all over again.

"We tied individually after last year and I remember saying that we had to get down to the state tournament to see who gets the bragging rights," Sternhagen said. "He got the bragging rights on me. He's the kind of guy that you can call up whenever and he'll be there for me."

"Tanner Appel, I've been playing sports with him since we were little kids and he's the

type of guy that never gives up. He took an 8 on hole 11 and I looked back at where he was at on the next hole and he was right there in the middle of the fairway. I've also played a lot of sports with Travis Kuester and he's a Holland boy like Cox and I. We've had our fair share of good times in Holland."

Sternhagen also recognized Jackson Waltner, another senior who didn't play varsity this year but strictly played golf and is a good friend of Sternhagen's off the course.

"He's a great kid, we play a lot of pool at the bowling alley. Someone you don't hear about but he deserves recognition," Sternhagen said.

Cox is excited to see where Spartan golf goes after the rapid growth of Martens and Whitehill into star players for

Grundy Center.

"Those two freshmen have come a long way and they'll be ready to go again next year," Cox said. "It's a different feeling knowing we're done playing golf. ... We all helped the freshmen fill into their shoes and get used to the idea of playing varsity golf for the team rather than just playing rounds for themselves."

The cupboard will hardly be bare as Grundy Center golf will likely try to reload and be right back in the hunt next spring. The seniors have certainly left behind a blueprint on how to get it done.

"Our achievements this year were truly the result of a complete team effort and I know for a fact that these four seniors are going to be hard to replace," Dirks said.

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
