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A monumental loss

D-NH mourns death of beloved special education teacher

DIKE- Even as he spent his final days lying on a hospital bed in Iowa City, Court Koch could only think of his students.

The 31-year-old Dike-New Hartford high school special education teacher passed away early Sunday due to pneumonia and complications with a rare blood disease known as thrombotic thrombocytopenic purpura (TTP), and since then, tributes have poured in. Koch will be remembered by co-workers, family members and friends as a dedicated educator, husband and new father—his daughter, Emery, is just 13 months old.

“He cared about his students and what was in their best interests more than anything else,” D-NH High School Principal Irv Laube said. “He found a way to connect to his kids. He would push them, even to the point where they might get upset with him, but in the end, they came to understand that Court only wanted what was best for them.”

Court, who grew up in the West Marshall district, previously taught at Marshalltown before moving northeast in 2014 when his wife Lynette took a new job in Waverly. He quickly became a member of the Wolverine family and wanted to spend the rest of his career at D-NH.

“Once he landed here, it just became home. It was just a natural fit for him and his personality, and who was,” Laube said. “Just that fun-loving spirit, not afraid to have fun with his students.”

Ashtyn Dietiker, a Dike native and current fellow teacher, was one of Koch’s colleagues in the special education department, and during an interview Monday, she recalled the way he took her under his wing when she joined the staff 2 ½ years ago.

“Even though I was familiar with the school and teachers, (Koch) still helped me out tremendously, just kind of (with) learning new strategies and how he did things in his room,”

Dietiker said. “He gave really good advice, and he always was willing to answer any question I had at any time during the school day.”

Laube spent a good chunk of his day with Koch last Friday at

the University of Iowa Hospital, and although he couldn’t speak, he smiled and used headshakes to ask about his kids and how they were doing.

The district is dealing with its second tragic loss of the

school year after the passing of 11-year-old Hudson Hayes in December, and grief counseling will be offered. Students and staff are also coming together to share pictures and memories of Koch. As Laube explained, there’s no single way to deal with a situation like this, but communication is key.

“You have to find somebody you can talk to. You have to be open about your feelings and not be ashamed of how you’re feeling—or being sad, being angry or going through that grief process,” Laube said on Monday afternoon.

And even in the darkest of times, the principal still finds glimmers of hope.

“We’ve got some great students. I had a young man who came up and gave me a big hug today and said ‘I’m here for you,’” he said. “So we also have students who are reaching and helping us as staff to get through this. That’s what family is. We’re all in this together, and we’re going to help each other get through this.”

GC woman charged with assault, felony burglary

GRUNDY CENTER- A Grundy Center woman is facing felony charges over allegations that she broke into a residence in town and assaulted the occupant.

According to a criminal complaint, 34-year-old Theresa Stearns kicked down the door at a residence in Grundy Center on Tuesday, April 30, and delivered “several blows causing injuries to the hand, neck and face” of a female victim. The filing does not indicate, however, that Stearns stole any items after entering the house.

Grundy Center Police Officer Alissa Loew arrested Stearns on May 1, and an initial hearing is scheduled for May 10. First Degree Burglary is a Class B Felony, and Assault Causing Bodily Injury or Mental Illness is a serious misdemeanor. A no-contact order has been issued between Stearns and the alleged victim.

Supervisors approve two new hospital board members

GRUNDY CENTER- Rick Smith and Melody Hoy officially became the two newest members of the Grundy County Memorial Hospital on Monday morning after the board of supervisors voted to approve their confirmations.

Smith, a Grundy Center native who is now back in his hometown, is the vice president of Grundy Center Chamber-Main Street and a member of GCMH’s foundation board. Because he is the son of Grundy County Supervisor Barb Smith, she abstained from voting, and his appointment was approved by a 4-0 measure.

Hoy grew up in Grundy County and is now the semi-retired former owner of the Eldora Pharmacy. Her confirmation received unanimous approval.

Sheriff Rick Penning reported that he has interviewed a handful of deputy candidates to replace Nathan Stahl and Chief Deputy Tim Wolthoff, and the

gether with the other local business owners here.”

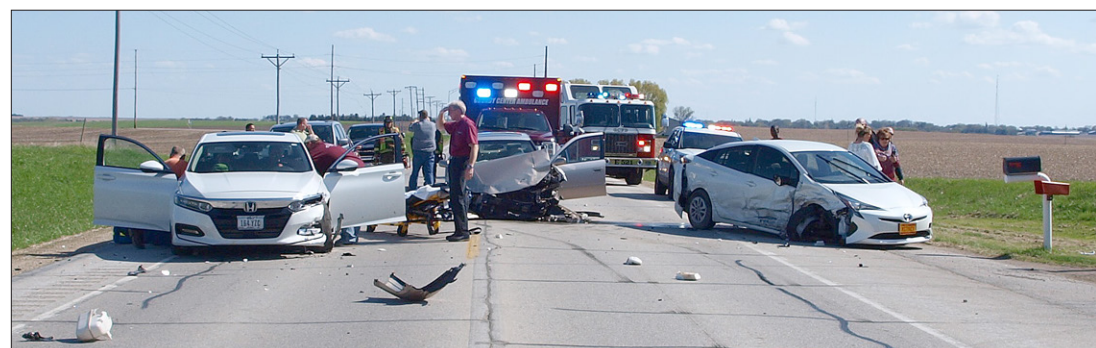
Stolzman will be offering photography services by appointment, and will also have

One person hospitalized after three-car crash north of Grundy Center

GRUNDY CENTER - One person was injured in a three-car crash just outside of Grundy Center on Saturday afternoon.

The crash occurred around

4 p.m. on Saturday, May 4, on Highway 14 approximately two miles north of Grundy Center.

According to the Grundy County Sheriff’s Office, a Toyota Prius driven by 45-year-old Daniel Spooner of Sibley was

headed northbound on Highway 14 and made a left turn in front of a southbound Toyota Camry driven by 20-year-old Diamond Jones of Cedar Falls.

Remembering Brock

Niebuhr reflects on the life of her late husband and the pain of his absence

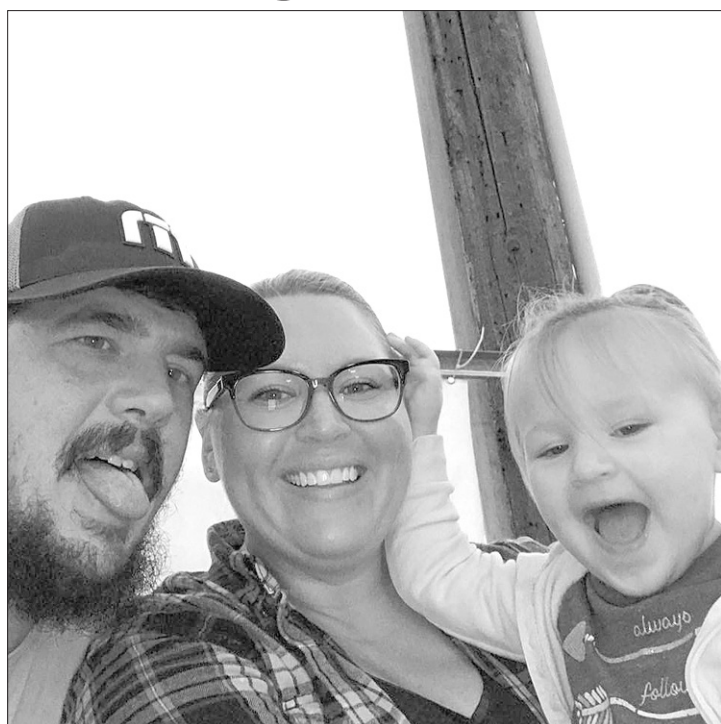
DIKE- There are no easy days for Lauren Niebuhr. She can fight it for a minute, two, maybe even five, but before long, he's back on her mind.

"I'm constantly thinking about it. I constantly replay what happened in my head with the information I have. It's difficult," she said last week. "I think about if there was anything I would've said

Lauren's husband Brock died under bizarre circumstances on March 22, and his father Daniel is awaiting a trial on charges that he murdered his son while he was sitting on a couch at Daniel's residence in Fairbank. She had her doubts about whether he should visit his father amidst concerns about his mental state, but Brock—selfless to the end—wanted to help. In the immediate aftermath of the tragedy and the chaos of the legal proceedings, Lauren, who still lives in the Dike home where she and Brock were raising their daughter Amella, never got a chance to talk about the kind of man he was.

"Brock was a family man. He loved his family more than anything, and his friends. His friends were like his family," Lauren said.

Before parenthood, Lauren and Brock were self-described "party animals": they loved concerts, traveling, golfing and having a good time. The day she was born, however, everything

changed.

"Once we had Amella, it was totally different. She was his everything," she said. "It was just a complete change."

He worked as a business analyst for Ocwen in Waterloo, and she worked from home for Principal Financial Group. About three years ago, they moved to Dike, where his mother already lived. They had settled in and grown up when the unthinkable happened five days after Amella's third birthday.

Lauren has received an outpouring of support—both locally and from around the country through a GoFundMe that's raised over \$15,000—and every little bit has helped. But it doesn't make the day-to-day or the difficulty of explaining why Amella won't see her father again any easier.

"Every single day, it's a chal-

lenge. She asks about him, and I try to explain that he's in heaven," Lauren said. "And she says 'What's he doing up there?'"

Parenting without him is difficult, she added, because of how much he did and how much he loved Amella. Lauren is still waiting for him to walk in the door one of these days, arms open wide, with a smile on his face and a big hug for his wife and his daughter.

"I still sometime catch myself thinking 'I should text Brock about this' or 'He's going to be home in a few hours.' Or if I go to the grocery store, I think about 'What does he need for his lunches?'" she asked. "It (takes) everything to get by day to day, but at the same time I have my daughter, who has Brock's eyes. Every time I look at her eyes, I see him. So that helps."

DOT agrees to lower speed limit in downtown GC

GRUNDY CENTER - With the recent discussions of a DOT-proposed three lane conversion in Grundy Center - and many community members voicing opposition to a conversion - the Grundy Center City Council sent a letter to the DOT to inquire about other options to slow down speed through town, including lowering the speed limit and installing flashing, pedestrian activated beacons at key crosswalks in town.

During the council meeting on Monday night, City Clerk Kristy Sawyer read a letter of response from the DOT, which stated that the DOT would approve lowering the speed limit to 25 mph through downtown Grundy Center, and they would approve the installation of flashing crosswalk beacons at 8th, 10th and/or 12th Street - but that the city would be responsible for paying for the beacons.

In addition, the letter once again reiterated the benefits of a three lane conversion, and encouraged the council to reach out to other Iowa communities to learn about the conversion firsthand.

"Based on the high accident rates in the uptown area, the department has proposed lowering the speed limit to 25 mph instead of the 30 mph recommended in the report," the letter read. "[The DOT] will put up the new speed limit signs as soon as the City passes an ordinance. The City will have the lead with the Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacons at 8th, 10th, and 12th Streets. The crash rates in the uptown area are higher than we would expect for Grundy Center. While the reduced speed limit should help, we do not anticipate the reduction by itself will significantly reduce crash rates in the uptown area. We encourage the city council to consider the four-lane to three-lane conversion for all its safety benefits, both for the pedestrians and the vehicle traffic. Based on previous experiences

across the state, we believe the conversion will reduce the accident rates in Grundy Center."

Sawyer said from a previous discussion with the DOT, the estimated cost of one flashing beacon was about \$15,000 plus wiring. For three different beacons at three different locations, the cost would be \$45,000 plus wiring.

She added that the DOT had said that if the city did the three lane conversion, the flashing beacons could be included in the project (which would be paid for by the DOT through a grant), but if the city chooses not to do the conversion, there are other grants available the city could apply for to help cover the costs.

Council member Chad Hamann said he believed the beacons were a good idea, and that the city could even wait to install one or two of them until later, with priority being given to the 12th Street cross walk.

The council members agreed that the lower speed limit and flashing beacons at the crosswalks should help slow down traffic and make G Ave. safer, and that they would like to pursue those options and find out more information on the beacons.

In an effort to get the opinion of emergency responders in town, Mayor Al Kiewiet invited representatives from the Grundy Center Fire and Ambulance departments to give their thoughts on how a conversion would affect emergency responders, and whether they think flashing beacons and a lower speed limit would help.

Both GC Ambulance Chief Dwight Gliem and GC Fire Chief Nathan Kappel voiced strong opposition to a three lane conversion, and said that they believed a lower speed limit and flashing beacons would be a better option for slowing down traffic.

"I've been in EMS for 19 years, in small towns and big cities, and I'm going to be honest - if you go from four lanes to

three lanes it's going to be detrimental to downtown when it comes to emergency services," Gliem said. "People won't pull over; they'll either stop in their lane or in the middle turning lane, and it'll create a bottleneck in traffic. Going to a three lane is probably the worst thing for an ambulance. If you slow the speed down I think that will help, and I think the flashing lights will help too. It would be a lot better than going to three lanes."

Fire Chief Nathan Kappel agreed with Gliem that a three lane would not be good for his crew at the fire department.

"Personally, I have to agree with Dwight," Kappel said. "The three lane will create too much congestion. You can't expect a normal driver to know the right move, and how to pull over the right way, and they may just stop right in the lanes."

Kappel said he made an observation the other day, at the stoplight intersection of G Ave. and 6th Street.

"There were 11 cars stopped at the light; seven vehicles in one lane and four in the second one," he said. "If you've got 11 vehicles lined up in one lane or even a semi, it may block where we need to turn into with the fire truck. Granted there are different high traffic times, but it's still a concern."

GC Police Chief Doug Frost also expressed that he didn't believe a three lane conversion would be the best option for town.

"I'm not a huge fan of the three lane, I'd rather see the speed limit changed," he said. "I'd also like to see a beacon at 12th Street for sure, and at 8th and 10th Street, too; it'd be great to get all three."

The council agreed to find out more information on the flashing beacons, and they voted to hold a public hearing for an ordinance to lower the speed limit on G Ave. during their next meeting on May 20.

German-Iowan author visits Reinbeck

REINBECK - Growing up in Nazi Germany, author Karl Schaper experienced firsthand the terrors of Adolf Hitler's reign and the tragedies of war. It's these experiences that he shares in his new book "Three Towers of Home."

Schaper reflected on these experiences - and his journey to becoming a U.S. citizen and moving to Iowa - during an author talk and book discussion at Westview Estates in Reinbeck on Friday afternoon.

At just 10 years old, Schaper was ordered into Hitler's Nazi Youth program in 1942.

"Every young boy who was not Jewish was ordered to be in it, and they said it was like Boy Scouts," Schaper said. "We were sworn in and had to recite an oath to Hitler sort of like [Americans would say the Pledge of Allegiance.]"

Schaper - who hails from a small village in northern Germany - says he was chosen as a group leader for the local boys in his Nazi Youth program because he was physically strong, smart enough to follow orders but not smart enough to question things, and because he was one of the few boys left in town that hadn't already gone off to join the war.

During his time in the Nazi Youth, Schaper's job was to be a lookout for enemy bomber planes. If he saw a plane, he was ordered to alert the town by riding a bike up and down through the streets while sounding the

alarm. If a plane were to crash, he was ordered to report it immediately, and write down how many survivors he saw leave the plane.

Schaper recounted what a powerful grip Hitler had on his people.

"They had brainwashed us, and it was especially easy to do with the young boys because their brains could be easily molded and shaped into what you wanted it to be," Schaper said. "The propaganda was terrible. The whole time they were telling us the war was going great and we were winning. We weren't allowed to listen to any foreign radio stations; if they found out you had, you would be shot."

One night, Schaper remembers listening to an English radio station that gave a true account of the war - and the fact that it was not going well for Germany - and he realized then the extent of the lies and propaganda.

Schaper said neither he nor his family, nor anyone in town really knew what was happening to the Jewish people in their community. They had been taken off by train, never to be seen again. They were not told where the Jewish people and families had been taken to, but some people said Hitler was setting up their own communities for them, away from the German people.

It wasn't until later that he learned the truth about the concentration camps and the full details of the worst genocide the

world has ever seen.

Schaper says during his time in the Nazi Youth, he was being primed to attend the Adolf Hitler School, where he would have been trained and drafted into Hitler's army - but that he was very lucky that the war ended before he was old enough to have to attend the school, and to join the army.

"I was so glad when it was over," he said. "So many lives were lost and horrible things were done."

After the war, Schaper's journey took him away from his homeland and over to America.

Through a friend of a friend, he was invited to stay in Iowa with an America family in the 1950s, where he enjoyed life on the farm milking cows and helping with chores in exchange for room and board.

Eventually, he met an Iowa woman and married her, becoming a U.S. citizen. He's been in Iowa ever since, and currently lives in Nora Springs, near Mason City.

Though he left his homeland far away, Schaper - ever the storyteller - brings readers there to experience it for themselves through his book "Three Towers of Home." His book is loosely based on his life growing up in Nazi Germany, and the struggles that came with it. Schaper's book is available at the Reinbeck Public Library. Raymond Freeman

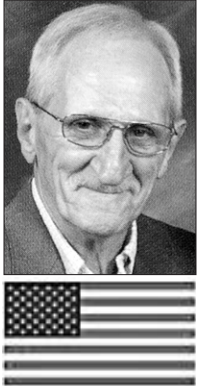

Coming to terms

Renowned journalist and Beaman native writes her most personal piece yet

(Editor's note: Due to a major error in the premise of this story that ran last week, we are re-running it—corrected—in its entirety.)

NEW YORK CITY- Andy Kopsa knew it was coming for five months, but that didn't make the reality that her father Leo had passed last September as she sat by his side any easier to swallow.

Kopsa, a rural Beaman native and BCLUW alum who has made a name for herself as a freelance journalist reporting from places like Uganda, Cameroon and Cambodia, did what writers do in the aftermath: she wrote about it.

In painstaking detail, she recounted doing everything in her power to make Leo comfortable in his final days, meeting with the priest one last time and receiving a text from "dad's" cell phone months later that turned out to be one of her nephews.

The resulting essay, titled "There Are No Five Stages of Grief," was published in *The New York Times* on February 28, and it challenges conventional notions of the grieving process while chronicling Kopsa's journey back to Iowa for her father's final days and the wreckage she witnessed in Marshalltown just a few months after the infamous EF-3 tornado ripped through the downtown area. Even today, she concedes that she hasn't fully accepted his passing or made peace with it.

"I'm not far enough out from my dad's death. I'm not, so I can't really speak to any sort of catharsis or coping mechanism," she said. "There's no one thing that's ever going to be cathartic. There's no one thing that's ever going to be therapeutic. There's no one thing that's ever going to be a coping mechanism. There just isn't."

Leo, a stoic and reserved Grundy County farmer to his core, was a beloved figure in the area: a devoted father, grandfather, husband, veteran and a man of God, and his wife Helen, owned the *Conrad Record* and served on the county board of supervisors—in Andy's words, she's "a very strange combination" of her parents.

And she makes one thing clear: of his four children, only one (LJ, a farmer who owns a construction company and serves on the BCLUW school board) has

stayed in the area, but Leo always supported all of them wholeheartedly.

"He's proud of all of us even though his three girls scattered to the wind," she said, noting that one sister lives in London and another is in Minneapolis. "He was a quietly proud guy, and he would brag on you at the (Beaman) Tap."

During her career, which has included bylines in magazines like *The Atlantic*, *Playboy* and *Time* and others in addition to the *Times*, Kopsa has become a leading American voice on modern Cambodia in the aftermath of the clandestine U.S. bombing campaign during the Vietnam War, the murderous Khmer Rouge regime, and the modern government's repressive efforts to shut down the free press as the country teeters on the edge of dictatorship. She's also interviewed Ugandan leader Simon Lokodo, one of the most vehemently anti-gay politicians in the world, about his efforts to criminalize homosexuality and even condone the killings of LGBT people in the African nation.

Nonetheless, she's always kept a close eye on her home state, and her dad would point her to stories of women in agriculture in the farming magazines he subscribed to. Some of the first investigative stories she dug into sprung out of the famous Iowa caucuses circa 2006 and federal funding for a group here, and she later returned to interview a convicted child molester named Stewart Smith—whom she'd known when they were both kids—in a Tama jail.

"Iowa is exactly who I am. I just happen to live here (in New York). I didn't take a little piece. I took all of it," she said. "That's where I would be in a heartbeat if I could be... It's what made me who I am. It's like my mom always says: you can take the girl out of the farm, but you can't take the farm out of the girl."

Kopsa doesn't have any concrete plans or assignments in Iowa in the near future, but it's a safe bet that she'll be paying close attention to the upcoming caucus—and more particularly, how it's covered.

"The national news media is interested in the horse race. Iowans are interested in the actual policies that impact farmers or health care. They're actually interested and educated in policy and can ask those questions," she said. "But people just don't, and the national media tends not to."

As the 2020 election cycle unfolds and important stories emerge at a breakneck pace around the globe, Kopsa will continue to seek them out with inspiration from her heroes, both journalistic (Joan Didion, specifically her essay Salvador, and Rekha Basu) and real-life (her parents). And she'll always carry the lessons of work ethic she picked up on the farm, even if she doesn't have her dad around to talk her up back home.

"It's a job. Honestly, farming is more dangerous than what I do," she said. "My brother is as passionate about farming as I am about doing what I do. LJ would probably get a finger lopped off and go back out the next day."

10 Years Ago This Week - 2009

A major construction project will soon be in full swing at the Grundy County Industrial Park. A ground-breaking ceremony was held for Hawkeye Community College's "Western Outreach Center" Thursday, April 23 at the industrial site a half mile south of Highway 20 on Highway 14. The 6,100 square-foot, six-classroom facility is scheduled for completion Aug. 1 - just in time for fall classes. On Tuesday Cardinal Construction Inc. began leveling land in preparation for construction. Construction should begin by the end of the week.

A sewer system can now be constructed in the City of Stout. A special election was held in Stout on Tuesday, and voters overwhelmingly approved the sewer system with a vote of 71 for and five against. A simple majority was needed. Stout officials can now approve a 40-year sewer franchise with Central Iowa Water Association. Construction and operation of the system, and billing to Stout residents would be handled by Central Iowa Water. On April 22, representatives with the United States Department of Agriculture presented Stout city clerk Celane Hauser with a check for \$1.3 million - which included a \$552,000 grant and a \$535,000 loan. Stout also received a \$217,000 grant from the Iowa Department of Economic Development. "I'm pleased," Hauser said. "It's pretty exciting we got it passed and we can finally move forward."

25 Years Ago This Week - 1994

"Grundy Center must plan now for the improvement in the community water quality," according to a water study recently completed for the Grundy Center City Council. Fox Engineering of Ames was contracted last February to do an engineering evaluation of water supply and treatment alternatives available to the city to comply with existing and proposed Iowa DNR and national EPA regulations and standards. The firm found there was a sufficient supply of water for the city, but sulfates and hardness levels were very high. "The quality of water is both good and bad. It is good from the standpoint that it is bacterially safe and contains no unnatural contaminants that are thought to be dangerous. On the other hand, the water is very hard and has very high total dissolved solids and sulfates. This factor has forced many residents to invest in installation and operation of home treatment systems. The expense has been significant and the resulting water quality is still not good because the home-treatment systems exchange sodium for the hardness. Improved water quality would be better for the health of the citizens and would reduce home water system operation and maintenance cost."

On Thursday, April 19, the fourth and fifth graders at the Grundy Center Elementary School were fingerprinted by the Boy Scouts. Grundy County Deputy Ron Tordoff was there to assist and supervise.

50 Years Ago This Week - 1969

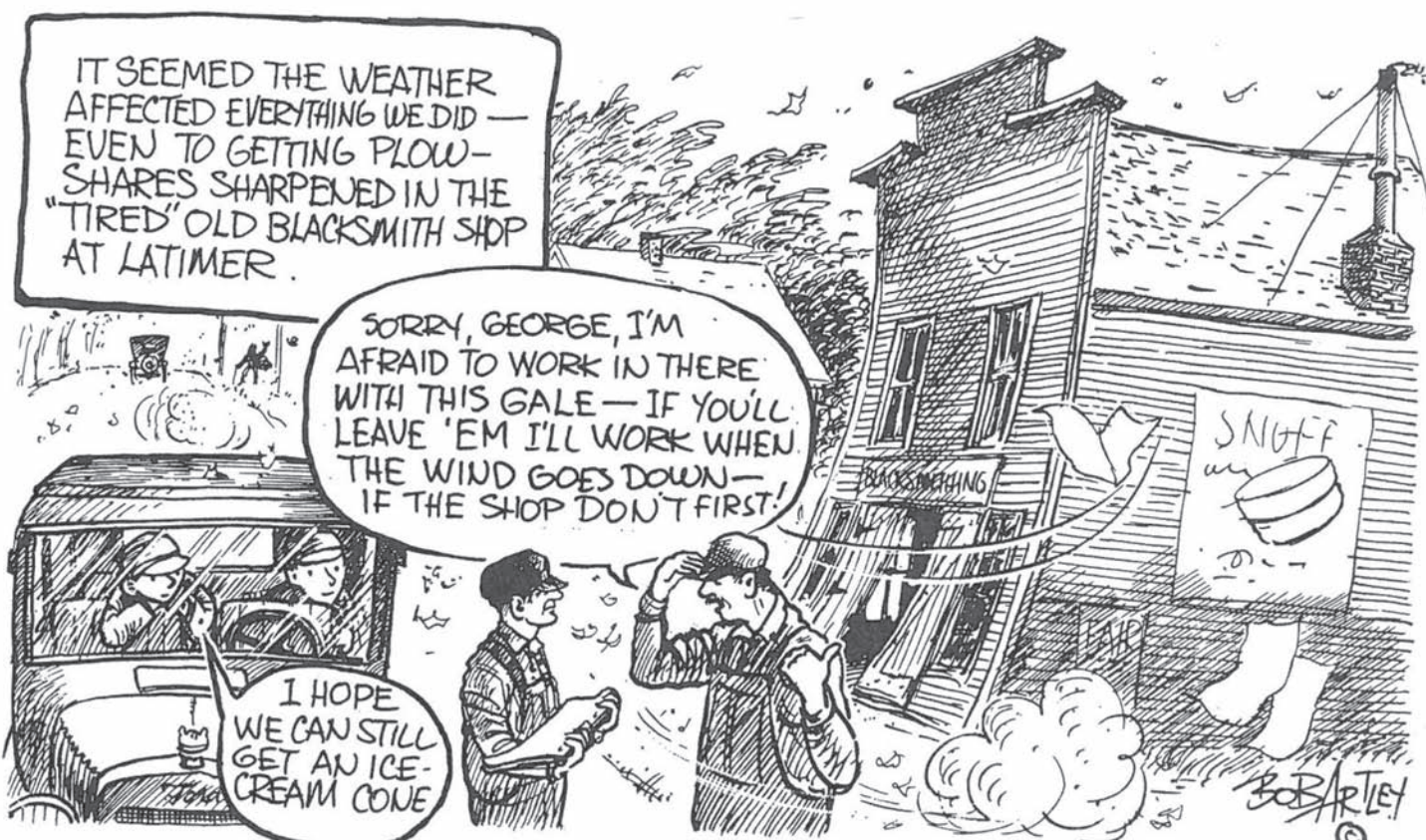
The defendants in a \$796,575 civil suit — largest ever filed in the office of Grundy County Clerk of Court—have moved to have the suit dismissed. Attorneys for the two defendants, Grundy County and Grundy County Sheriff Dick Kern, filed a motion Friday asking the court to dismiss the suit filed here April 18 by Louis Murphy of Dike. Murphy is seeking judgment of \$496,575 against Sheriff Kern and the county for alleged actual damages, plus another \$300,000 in punitive damages arising from the sale of a herd of cattle on the Murphy farm near Dike last January. Representing the county and sheriff are County Attorney Don Kliebenstein and Assistant County Attorney T. J. Heronimus, and Mosier, Thomas, Beatty, Dutton & Braun of Waterloo. The two law firms filed preliminary appearance notices last Wednesday and Thursday, then followed up with the dismissal motion Friday. Tenth Judicial District Judge Peter Van Metre has taken the matter under advisement.

75 Years Ago This Week - 1944

When Eugene Huisman from Wellsburg leaves next Tuesday to be inducted into the Navy, his mother, Mrs. Ellen Huisman of Wellsburg, will have five sons in the armed service. The four sons who are now in the service are in all parts of the world. Herbert is in the Aleutian Islands, Eldon is in the South Pacific, Lester is at the front in Italy, and Ralph is in a training camp at Fort Ord, Cal.

There has been much interest of late in Grundy Center in bowling, as a sport and many of the bowling fans are urging that bowling alleys be established here to meet the demand. The matter has been referred to the Grundy Community club and the club has appointed a committee to feel out public sentiment. This committee is calling a meeting to be held at the courthouse Friday evening where the proposal will be up for consideration. 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My Three Cents Worth

Read it and sleep

One of my favorite pastimes when any big news story breaks is gauging the way people react to it, especially when it involves the release of a publicly available document they couldn't be bothered to read themselves. In this regard, the Mueller Report is the granddaddy of 'em all—a 400-page summary of two years and \$30 million worth of work—and yet, I feel like I could've hired a group of high school kids to investigate the 2016 election and arrived at roughly the same conclusion.

Because I'm a glutton for punishment and I may be teetering on the brink of insanity, I decided to read the whole thing over three weeks. My take? The report is shocking in its banality. The entire second half mulls

over the question of whether tweets constitute obstruction of justice and then punts on answering it—all while summarizing pretty much every story the *New York Times* and the *Washington Post* published about the Trump-Russia ordeal.

It exonerates Trump on the issue of collusion but documents his myriad attempts to fire Mueller, steer the investigation in his own direction and ensure that his friends would stay off the hook. It explains that Julian Assange and Wikileaks preferred the president as a candidate due to concerns that a hawkish Hillary Clinton would push for more wars with bipartisan support and that a divided Congress might temper Trump's worst impulses—while noting that the hacking organization shamelessly exploited conspiracy theories about the death of Seth Rich to shift blame for the release of Clinton's emails.

It lays out clearly that Trump and Michael Cohen were still pursuing a skyscraper in Moscow well into 2016 but adds that conversations surrounding it were limited and unproductive. It makes an incriminating case against Michael Flynn for communicating with a Russian official about sanctions while Obama was still in office and documents the way Trump tried time and again to stop James Comey from investigating Flynn further.

It reveals, as I've hypothesized before, that Don Jr. attempted to collude and failed when he was duped into a meeting aimed at persuading the campaign into a commitment to lift Magnitsky Act sanctions that mostly affect rich Russian oligarchs who have assets in other countries.

In a farcical twist that perhaps best sums up the irony of the entire report, it includes a line from Putin about how the Russian government was struggling to get a hold of the higher ups in the Trump campaign after the election and did not know who to contact. The report states that while several individuals associated with Trump participated in hijinks and shenanigans and made overtures toward the Russians, any overarching Manchurian candidate conspiracies were fever dream fantasies from the get-go.

It's hard to parse Trump's motivations beyond enriching himself and promoting himself, and maybe he does just want to get along with Russia. A new Cold War mindset won't do any of us any good, and the asset theory rings hollow as the U.S. and Russia sit on opposite sides of the conflicts in Venezuela, Syria, Iran and Ukraine.

In short, the Mueller Report is whatever you want it to be. If you're ready to argue that it's a complete vindication of Trump, you'll find passages to make that case for you. If you still believe he's a shady sleazeball who's incapable of telling the truth and must've cheated somehow, there's a section for you. And if you think that the redactions are hiding some grander misdeeds from the public, you've got plenty of black lines to choose from.

By the nature of its inconclusiveness, it welcomes the endless circus we're now set to endure, with contempt votes (I still can't figure out why Barr is the new boogeyman in all of this), more subpoenas and an undying zeal to turn this into Watergate, somehow, some way.

It doesn't cast the Democrats in a particularly favorable light, but then again, the GOP did the same on Lewinsky, Benghazi and Clinton's e-mails. Everything is partisan, and we're foolish to pretend otherwise.

And it leaves us to wonder why we spent two years waiting for a report that largely functioned as a recitation of things we already knew in painfully insipid language.

Was it worth reading all the way through? Not really. Next time, I'll go with the Starr Report and the Warren Report: maybe they'll actually have some interesting information in there somewhere.

First, it is clear throughout the Bible that someone who exploits the poor is committing a serious sin for which the Lord will exact punishment: "Do not exploit the poor because they are poor and do not crush the needy in court, for the Lord will take up their case and will exact life for life." (Proverbs 22:22-23 NIV) Secondly, and perhaps more important, we are told that our charity and generosity must be



done willingly and with an eye to helping our fellow man: "Suppose a brother or a sister is without clothes and daily food. If one of you says to them, 'Go in peace; keep warm and well fed,' but does nothing about their physical needs, what good is it?" (James 2:15-16 NIV) And finally, remember that love is an action, and not simply an emotion. We are commanded to love, and we do this through our everyday actions with the people we meet. —Christopher Simon

To All Property Owners: That pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 317 of the Code of Iowa, it is hereby ordered: That each owner and each person in the possession or control of any land in Grundy County shall cut, burn or otherwise destroy all noxious weeds thereon, as defined in this Chapter, at such time each year in such a manner as shall prevent said weeds from blooming or coming to maturity, and shall keep said land free from such growth or any other weeds, as shall render the street or highways adjoining said lands unsafe for public travel. Noxious weeds shall be cut or otherwise destroyed on or before the following dates and as often thereafter as is necessary to prevent seed production: CUTTING DATES: Group 1 - June 10, 2019, Leafy Spurge, Perennial Peppergrass, Sour Dock, Smooth Dock, Sheep Sorrel, Palmer amaranth, and Buckhorn. Group 2 - June 10, 2019, Canadian Thistle, Russian Knapweed, Buckhorn, Musk Thistle and Wild Mustard. Group 3 - July 20, 2019, Horse Nettle, Perennial Sow Thistle, Quack Grass, Butter Print, Puncture Vine, Cocklebur, Bull Thistle, and all other biennial thistles.

That each person and owner in possession or control of any lands in Grundy County infested with any primary noxious weeds including Quack Grass, Perennial Sow Thistle, Canadian Thistle, Field Bindweed, Musk Thistle, Horse Nettle, Leafy Spurge, Perennial Peppergrass, Russian Knapweed, Palmer amaranth shall adopt a program of weed destruction described by the Weed Commissioner to destroy and will immediately keep under control such infestation of said primary noxious weeds.

That all weeds between fence lines of county roads may be controlled by the adjoining property owners or operators to prevent seed production. If Grundy County receives a request not to spray the road right-of-way or such area is posted "DO NOT SPRAY" by a legible sign, control of weeds in this area becomes the responsibility of the adjoining landowner. That mowing roadside vegetation on the rights-of-way on any primary highway or secondary road prior to July 15 is prohibited except as provided in Iowa Code Section 314.17.

That burning of debris in the rights-of-way on any primary highway or secondary road is prohibited.

That if the owner or person in possession or control of any land in Grundy County fails to comply with the foregoing orders, the Weed Commissioner shall cause this to be done and the expenses of said work including costs of serving notice and other costs, if any, will be assessed against the land and owners thereof.

That the County Auditor be and is hereby directed to cause notice of the making and entering of the foregoing order by publication in each of the two newspapers of Grundy County on or about May 9, 2019.

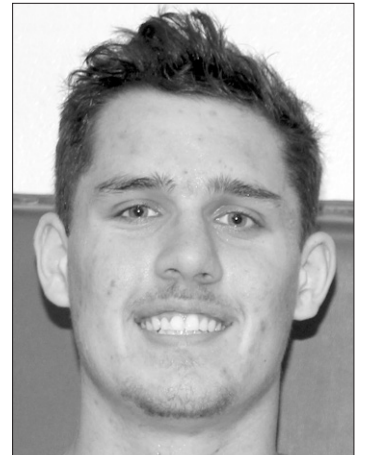

Jungling initially was the winner of the 800-, 1,500- and 3,000-meter running events and was the anchor leg of the winning 4x400 relay. She was voted the girls MVP of the NICKL East meet as a result.

A-P girls head coach Alex Pollock explained that there was no indication from the two starters running the meet in Denver that Jungling and the Falcons were breaking any rules when she lined up to take the baton in the 4x400.

Earlier in the night, Jungling was to be the anchor runner in the distance medley but was informed by the starters that her team had been disqualified for running outside of their lane in the third leg of the race. Pollock said that the starters approached Jungling and said that if she did not touch the baton in the distance medley, she would be free to participate in another event. She agreed to step off the track,

and A-P athletic director Jason Berkey followed up with the starters after the race to get assurance that Jungling would not be docked an event toward her maximum total of four events in which she could participate.

Following that reassurance, Pollock substituted her in for the anchor leg of the 4x400, which the Falcons won.

Denver's AD issued an email to NICKL East athletic directors on Friday morning informing all that Jungling had been disqualified, based on a track and field rule that states when a competitor is checked in for an event, that event is considered to count toward a runner's maximum of four, regardless of whether or not they go on to participate.

"After talking with the Girls Union several times throughout the day, despite the fact that we were all told Sophia's eligibility was fine by the two starters at the meet, the conclusion was made that we would indeed be disqualified," Pollock said in a written statement.

The penalty for the rule infraction is disqualification of the runner and forfeiture of all team points for events they participated in, docking A-P a total of 40 team points. Jesup's Amanda Treptow was upgraded to a gold in the 800 and the J-Hawks' Natalie O'Connor became the winner of the 1,500 and 3,000-meter runs. D-NH's 4x400 team also moved up to first.

ELDORA – The trophy case for Grundy Center boys track and field got a lot bigger this season.

The Spartans added a big one last Thursday, earning the NICL West team title at Eldora.

Grundy Center scored 170 points and the BCLUW boys were the runners-up with 136 points in a meet dominated by the Spartans and Comets, two 1A teams expected to score considerable points at the state meet later this month. AGWSR scored 49 points in sixth place and the Gladbrook-Reinbeck boys got 13 points for seventh place.

The day belonged to the Spartans this time around, though, a victory that GC head coach Chris Conger has had in his sights in each of the four seasons he's been head coach.

"We've had teams that can win track meets but just hadn't gotten [the league title] done," Conger said, "mostly at the hands of pretty good teams in our conference. The stars aligned and we had some good events, some kids stepped up in spots and we came together at the right time."

Leading the way was Will Grames, the NICL West boys meet MVP after winning four individual golds for the Spartans. He won the long jump with a leap of 20 feet, 9.5 inches, won the 100-meter dash in 11.12 seconds, the 200 in 22.65 and the 400 in 52.01.

Conger, named NICL West boys Coach of the Year at the end of the meet, likened Grames putting up 40 points to the team total to similar star-making performances in other team sports.

"You have to have your stars show up," Conger said. "We were fortunate enough this year to have some stars that can win races. We wanted to come together and win a conference championship, the guys have bought into that – we had guys fighting for fourth and fifth on Thursday, knowing there were points on the line. That's huge for your team."

The Spartans added gold in the shot put as Payton McMartin launched a best mark of 45 feet, 2.25 inches. Derek Ciddio won the high jump after clearing the bar at 5-8, and Ciddio was also the anchor of the winning 4x800 relay team, following Jensen Clapp, Soren Cleveland and Mitchell Munson in 8:36.67. The Spartans also closed the night with a 4x400 relay win in 3:33.29, team of Logan Knaack, Matt Jansen, Clapp and Caleb Kuiper.

Conger credited the field events with taking such a large step forward to contribute to an already strong group of Spartan runners. He singled out Wes Willis' growth in field events as an example. Willis contributed a pair of fourth-place finishes behind discus runner-up Matthew Sternhagen and shot put champ McMartin.

"We were going to win this conference because our field events show up big," Conger said. "These guys aren't typical track guys – Wes Willis never threw anything in junior high, last year only threw maybe 80 feet. ... That's what we emphasize – we may not need you this year, but if you take the time to learn something, develop that skill, you can step in and not lose a beat. ... McMartin was behind two throwers last year in Josh Kuiper and Jordan Hook and now he's a top-10 thrower. ... Your turn is coming, you just have to continue to develop and when that time comes, you'll be ready."

The Comet boys won seven events: Jack Garber helped BCLUW to a sweep of the hurdle events with wins in the 110 and 400 hurdles as well as the anchor leg of the winning shuttle hurdle quartet, joining Coby Willett, Kody Kruse and Neifer Ralston. Caleb Silver got the distance double of the 1,600 and 3,200 and Ruben Montoya locked down gold in the 800. BCLUW also scored first in the 4x100 relay, with Ben Paper, Carson Hoffman, Joe Mason

"We may not score as many points as we did Thursday, but the events we are gonna emphasize should be good," Conger said. "We do have to think of that Des Moines opportunity and where we want to sit in that. ... It was a feel good story last year sending 11 events down there, but we left last year saying that next year we have to score down there."

COMETS EKE PAST GRUNDY CENTER, WEST MARSHALL: The BCLUW girls track and field team had just enough depth in the right places to finish a nose ahead of two other strong girls teams in the NICL West race.

The Comets scored 119 points, three ahead of Grundy Center and only 3.5 ahead of West Marshall in third. AGWSR finished fifth with 71 points and G-R took seventh with four points.

"After the first couple of meets this season, we realized we could put something together," BCLUW girls coach Dustin Grothoff said. "It helped us out to double up in a lot of individual events. ... With very little kids out this year, it took every-

body. We even ran a 4x8 that we never ran before just to get points."

Grothoff was named NICL West girls Coach of the Year in his first season at the helm. The Comets won the shuttle hurdle relay, with Kiersten Kruse, Payton Pekarek, Lizzie Garber and Olivia Hughes running 1:09.34 for gold. Kaylee Grant, Kruse, Pekarek and Hughes won the 4x100 in 54.42.

The Comets scored double team points in six events and finished no worse than fifth in the relay races on Thursday.

"We're pumped for districts," Grothoff said. "We'll see a very different lineup for a different cause, but they're excited."

AGWSR's Aubrie Fisher shared NICL West girls MVP honors with East Marshall's Melinda Puumala. Fisher won the 800, 1,500 and 3,000-meter running events and was the anchor on the winning distance medley relay team. Fisher finishes her high school career with 12 gold medals at the league meet.

The Spartans got to the runner-up spot in part due to four gold medals: Kyah Luhning in the long jump, Hailey Wallis in the 200 and 400-meter running events and Paiton Wallis, Brooke Flater, Sarah Lindeman and Hailey Wallis teaming up for a win in the 4x400 to close out the night.
