

# The final battle? Latest chapter in Spartans, Rebels football feud may be its last

**By JAKE RYDER** The Grundy Register GRUNDY CENTER - Separated by nine miles of road on Iowa Highway 175, Reinbeck and Grundy Center's high school football programs have been locked in a rivalry that has be-

come one of the state's longest

and most persistent.

For 66 years, the Spartans and Rams battled for bragging rights in their southeastern corner of Grundy County. When the proud community of Gladbrook consolidated with Reinbeck for the 1987 season, the sides may have changed, but the intensity

came to town.

After 97 memorable years, this rivalry is expected to experience its first disruption as Gladbrook-Reinbeck prepares to drop down to 8-man football for the 2018 season. Even if it restarts down the road, it's unlikely both

times ever again.

But the last hurrah will not be without its share of fanfare, as both school districts have invited anyone who was a former player, coach or cheerleader in this long-standing tradition - whether Spartan, Ram or Rebel – to join

remained every time the Rebels teams will play 98 consecutive together on the field at Grundy

Center prior to Friday's game. A drone will fly overhead to take a photo of those who attend

the pre-game ceremony, captur-

ing the moment in the history books. Then, once the field is clear, the 98th chapter will be written.

"If you're talking straight football, it's a football game," G-R coach John Olson said. "It's a really good thing for our fans and both communities, and we want this to be a big deal for our fans, but then we want that to stop

# 86 years of service Three longtime firefighters retire from GCFD

GRUNDY CENTER - On Sunday night, over 50 people gathered at the Grundy Center Fire Department for a retirement party that sent off three longtime volunteer firefighters with a combined 83 years of service.

Kevin Kuester, who was a member of the department for 45 years; Dan Huffman, who was a member for 26 years; and Jessie Huisman, who was a member for 15 years, have each decided to retire from the department after a long history of service.

Grundy Center Fire Chief Nathan Kappel says that even though the department is losing three great men, he is thankful for everything they have done for the department and the community.

"Each of them have been strong leaders in the department, and all of them have been officers at one point or another, so even though we don't want to

lose them, we learned a lot from them," Kappel said. Kuester and Huffman, who

are both retired Grundy County REC employees, say they are looking forward to enjoying their full retirement.

"I'm looking forward to catching up on all the sleep," Kuester joked.

Huffman says he's looking forward to spending more time traveling, and camping, but that he still plans to drive the ambulance here and there, as he has for many years.

Huisman, who works in the IT Department at the courthouse and is a reserve officer with the Grundy Center Police Department, says he is looking forward to spending more time with his children.

"I have two younger kids, and as they're getting older they're more involved in different activities, so I want to be able to be there for those activities, and spend more time with them," he said.

Each of the retirees agreed

that what they will miss most about their time with the department is the comradery, and seeing the people that they have spent so many years serving with.

But Chief Kappel says he knows that if he ever needs a helping hand, any one of them wouldn't hesitate to answer the call.

The agreement between the retirees was unspoken.

"I think each of us joined the department in the first place to help people," Kuester said. 'You never know when it might be your house, or your family, and you always hope someone will be there when needed."

Chief Kappel says that just as one generation of volunteers move on, another comes in, but that the department will always be thankful for Kuester, Huffman and Huisman's countless years of service: "We want to thank them for all the time they have put into helping shape our department into what it is today.'

## Andersen named newest sheriff's deputy

The Grundy Register GRUNDY CENTER- A Dike native who excelled in sports at Aplington-Parkersburg High School and spent the last five years of his career at the State Training School in Eldora began work as a Grundy County sheriff's deputy last Monday.

Zach Andersen, now 31 and residing in Dike with his wife Heather and their young daughter, grew up there and attended school at D-NH until junior high before he transferred to A-P, where his father had been a star athlete. Andersen starred in multiple sports for the Falcons, most notably wrestling, and went on to compete collegiately at Morningside College in Sioux City, earning a degree in communications.

After a stint coaching wrestling at Ellsworth Community College in Iowa Falls and starting as a youth services worker at the State Training School, Andersen and his wife moved back to Dike, and recommendations from several friends and colleagues pushed him toward becoming a police officer.

"I don't know what it was,

but I started looking into law enforcement. And the more people I talked to, they're like 'oh yeah, you need to do that, you'd be great,' or 'oh, I could see you doing that," he said. "Not one person told me 'don't do that' or 'that's a bad idea'... I kind of think the world needs good police officers."

Like fellow new deputy

Cody Freese, who grew up in Stout, Andersen is already infinitely familiar with the territory of Grundy County. Unlike Freese, however, this is Andersen's first law enforcement job, and he's currently in the process of attending the Iowa Law Enforcement Academy.

# Mid-lowa selects Grundy County location for expansion

**By ROBERT MAHARRY** The Grundy Register HOLLAND- After meeting with the board of directors last week, Mid-Iowa Cooperative CEO Mike Kinley formally an-

nounced that the company has chosen a location in Grundy County just south of The Mill on Highway 14 for its latest expansion project, a large grain storage facility.



Construction on the elevator, with a projected holding capacity of 4,000,000 bushels for corn and soybeans, could cost up to \$14 million and will add to Mid-Iowa's portfolio of sites in eight communities-Beaman, Conrad (where the headquarters is located), Gladbrook, Green Mountain, Haverhill, Liscomb, Whitten and the Midway, which was constructed in 2012 north of Toledo and is currently the company's newest facility. According to Kinley, the decision represents a strategic attempt to better serve the Grundy Center, Dike and Parkersburg markets.


"When you go up to that area and look around that area, there are elevators, but a lot of producers have to do business directly with processors," he said. "In the fall, there's a great need for storage, so that was the reason we chose that (location). It's the greatest overall benefit to the producers."

Kinley went on to cite proximity to the agricultural hub of Iowa Falls and a proposed Prestage Farms pork processing plant in Wright County-along with the need for feed that will come with it—as other reasons for expanding to the north. The new facility is only expected to create three or four permanent jobs, but in keeping with an agreed upon development contract presented at last week's board of supervisors meeting, they will be required to pay at or above Grundy County's median wages.

"It's going to be a first class asset to the company, extremely efficient," Kinley said. "It represents a big investment that has an attractive long term (outlook)-not only payout to the company, but adding value back to the community as well."

Butler/Grundy Economic Development Alliance Director Jeff Kolb told The Grundy Register that the move is a win for both Mid-Iowa and residents of the county.

"If we can keep a compa-

But Andersen does see a strong carryover between his former line of work and his current one: at the training school-considered the "last resort" for troubled boys in Iowa—he forged relationships and fostered cooperation with some of the most hardened and angry inmates, and he believes that his calm demeanor and communication skills will translate well to county law enforcement.

"Most kids, if they hated everybody, they probably liked me a little bit, so that was kind of my niche," Andersen said. "I'm pretty good at building rewith dignity and respect."

Now, he's learning the lay of the land and the job duties on the fly, but Andersen has experienced veterans like Sheriff Rick Penning, Chief Deputy Tim Wolthoff and Deputies BJ Jorgenson and Kirk Dolleslager to guide him through the transition. According to Penning, the department doesn't typically hire non-certified officers, but Andersen's bona fides and Grundy County background made him a particularly appealing candidate to replace Ken Yeomans, who retired in May after 27 years of service.

"The local flavor, if you call

lationships and treating people it that, should make transition and training easier because (Andersen and Freese) know the county," Penning said. "We look forward to a new era."

> And despite the tumultuous state of affairs around the country, Andersen doesn't feel any trepidation about becoming a police officer. Effective law enforcement, in his view, is simply a matter of respect-both giving it and getting it.

> "I think with all the stuff going on, if you treat people well from the beginning, hopefully they'll reciprocate some of that," he said. "That'll make the job a whole lot easier."

when the game starts." In recent years, the Rebels have had the advantage in what has become known as the "Battle for the Bell," named after the traveling trophy awarded to the winner. G-R has won 16 of the last 19 meetings between the two teams, though the Spartans came razor-close to the Bell last season, falling 7-6 to the Rebels, who went on to finish an undefeated season as Class A state champions.

It's an easy game for both teams to get motivated for, especially to kick off a 2017 season where both are eager for a strong start.

"With all the pomp and circumstance behind it, it's going to be like a homecoming game," Grundy Center football coach Brent Thoren said. "We're just trying to keep our guys dialed in. ... There's plenty of motivation from both sides, and everybody's got something to prove."

#### From beginning to bell

The Grundy Center/Reinbeck rivalry may well have started in 1919 if it weren't for an unusual circumstance that wiped out a pair of November games between the Rams and the Spartans. The Grundy Republican reported on it in the Nov. 13, 1919 edition:

"No reason was given but we have a license to presume that Grundy Center had been warned against playing near the railroad track for fear of being run over by the cars. ... This leaves Reinbeck with no game scheduled for Thanksgiving, ... we will have no football with our turkey."

Reinbeck went on to win the first two meetings by 12-0 scores and while Grundy Center would tie Reinbeck in three of the first eight clashes, the Spartans wouldn't score a victory until 1928 in a 14-0 triumph. There are conflicting accounts of what the official series record is between the two teams, but according to the Grundy Register's records, along with compiling history from the Kling Memorial's Library digital archive of Grundy Center's newspapers, the series is currently tied 44-44-9, making Friday's game a rubber match generations in the making.

"We hear about it all the time,"

year has been in use since 2007. Olson noted that Bob Munson, who was Grundy Center's football coach at the time, found some old trophies that were sparingly used to denote the rivalry through the 50s and 60s and the two coaches eventually worked together to introduce the new bell trophy.

As of now, it sits on a shelf near the ceiling of Gladbrook-Reinbeck's weight training room, serving as inspiration for the Rebels in their quest for a fifth-consecutive win over the Spartans.

#### Lasting memories

Through the peaks and valleys of both football programs, this once-a-season meeting has remained a constant. Some years, though, it was a showstopper.

David Pike, Grundy Center alum, Grundy Register contributor and author of the Grundy Center Sports Hall of Fame's profiles, recounted one of the more memorable games.

The 1953 season came down to a matchup between the Spartans and Rams, with both teams undefeated entering the contest and the North Iowa Cedar League title on the line.

"According to Glen Van Fossen, one of Grundy's star players, there was a huge crowd of over 3,000 people on hand," Pike said, "leaving Reinbeck a ghost town during the game."

Van Fossen scored the decisive touchdown on an end-around in the final quarter of a 12-0 victory over Reinbeck, delivering the dagger in a game where Grundy Center's goal-line defense beat back Reinbeck on three separate occasions when the Rams were on Grundy's 1-yard line, according to the Grundy Register's account of the game.

Pike himself was part of the rivalry in the late 1960s, noting that "the rivalry seemed the most intense in football."

Ann Billerbeck, née Morrison, has been on both sides of the rivalry.

She was a cheerleader for Grundy Center, graduating in 1949, but then married Don Billerbeck, a multi-sport athlete for Reinbeck, in 1952.

watched her children compete in led, "my dad wasn't always on the rivalry in the late 60s to early /Us as Rams and again when grandchildren competed as Rebels. "I have people give me a hard time saying, 'You should be for Grundy!'," Billerbeck said. "And I still have very good friends at Grundy Center. But I still bleed blue when Grundy's playing my children or my grandchildren."

As competitive as the series has been, it has been marked by several stretches of dominance from one side or another, including G-R's current stretch of 16 wins in the last 20 years.

Grundy Center can boast the longest consecutive winning streak in this rivalry, though, besting the Rams and Rebels in 10 consecutive contests from 1979 to 1988 during the Spartans' run of three state championships in five seasons.

### One last chance

Grundy Center's senior class may have a chip on its shoulder after missing the playoffs in a 6-3 season last year.

But for the Spartan seniors, 2017 also represents a final opportunity to focus on scoring a big win over Gladbrook-Reinbeck to start the season. Grundy Center has been on the wrong end of 30-plus point margins by the Rebels in the last three meetings, but the Spartans were oh-so-close in last season's 7-6 nail-biter in Gladbrook.

Gage Murty hauled in a 40yard touchdown pass from Hunter Lott in the fourth quarter, answering a late score from Grundy Center's Bryce Flater as the Rebels were able to hold on after the game-winning point-after kick from Walker Thede.

'It's tough," Grundy Center's Tanner Appel said. "It just helps for next season when you keep that one point in the back of your head and it helps you go harder in everything you do."

Considering the number of graduates from the Rebels and Spartans alike after last season, Week 1 may prove to be very informative for both teams.

"It's a point of contention for some people, a point of motivation for some people," Thoren said. "It's definitely a great measuring stick for where we're at as a program."

Walker Thede, the son of Barry Thede, a 1997 graduate of G-R, is excited to raise the bell high one more time.

"I've grown up in a family that played a lot of football, and the adults that I talked to always talked about the games against Since then, Billerbeck's Grundy," Thede said, then chuckthe right side of those games, but it was still fun to hear about. It ramped up to my high school career and being able to play in them. ... It's one thing personally that I've been looking forward to the most."

# **School board spars** over librarian agreement

GRUNDY CENTER During a special Grundy Center Board of Education meeting on Monday night, board members were at odds with each other over a vote to approve a 28E sharing agreement with BCLUW for librarian services.

The ongoing dispute over librarian services began back in July, when former librarian Val Ehlers took another job, ending the 28E Sharing Agreement between Grundy Center and Gladbrook-Reinbeck for librarian services. As part of the agreement, Ehlers split her time 50/50 between Grundy Center and G-R.

After her resignation, both districts were left without a librarian, and G-R indicated that they would be leasing minimal librarian services from another district, and encouraged Grundy Center to look for librarian services elsewhere.

After receiving the information, Superintendent Jerry Schutz reached out to several surrounding districts, including AGWSR, Dike-New Hartford and BCLUW to see if any of the districts would be willing to enter a sharing agreement for librarian services.

None of the districts that were contacted showed interest in sharing, except for BCLUW,

whose school board voted unanimously earlier this month to approve a 28E Sharing Agreement with Grundy Center for librarian services.


As part of the agreement, the two districts would share a librarian and split the costs 50/50. BCLUW's current librarian is Mary Ascher, Grundy Center School Board president Brent Ascher's wife.

When the vote for the agreement went to the Grundy Center School Board last Wednesday, it failed after a 2-2 vote, with board members Bob Johanns and John Gordon voting against the agreement, and board members Chad Mackie and Ron Saak voting in favor. Mr. Ascher recused himself from the vote.

No discussion was held about the issue during the meeting last Wednesday, but when it was brought up again at the special meeting on Monday night, board member John Gordon vocalized his concerns about the librarian services agreement.

"I have concerns with this," Gordon said. "I agree we need a librarian, but I want to make sure we're doing business properly, because it seems like we're violating a lot of our policies. This meeting isn't about a librarian. It's about what we should be doing as a board, and are we following procedure?"

Gordon implied that by sign-



Schutz explained that the school's lawyer had looked at the board's policies and all Iowa codes, and advised that contracting a 28E Sharing Agreement for librarian services with BCLUW would not violate any codes or policies, particularly since it will not result in any financial gain for the librarian and because the school had reached out to other districts. The only one that happened to show interest was BCLUW.

"There isn't any financial gain for [the librarian] in this situation. If anything, it's more work for the same amount of money as before, because now she has two schools," Schutz said.

He added that Iowa Code requires every district to have librarian services, and with the start of the school year just days away, and the district left with no other options, the board had a tough choice to make.

Ascher added that he originally recused himself from the

# Supervisors approve family cemetery request

GRUNDY CENTER- The Grundy County Board of Supervisors voted unanimously to approve second and third readings of an ordinance change that will allow for the creation of a family cemetery on a property north of Wellsburg during its regular meeting on Monday morning.

The Trask family, of which two members were in attendance, made the request, and county attorney Erika Allen was not on hand to answer questions as she had another commitment at the courthouse. The supervisors initially discussed the matter last week and approved a first reading, and motions to pass a second reading and suspend the rules to adopt the ordinance-which reclassifies the land in question from A-1 to A-2-went off without a hitch.

County Engineer Gary Mauer reported that a low bid of

\$79,932 from PCI for bridge repair on C31 was compliant with the request, and it was approved unanimously. Work is expected to begin in October. The board also approved plans and specs for two bridge replacement projects, I-1 and A-5. It was reported that Penning Construction of Wellsburg had finished repairs on the cold storage building after it was damaged in a storm this summer.

The board voted to cost share with Hardin County on a side road repair project along Highway 175, and it will cost around \$5,000.

# **BCLUW board discusses** computers, fundraising changes

CONRAD- The BCLUW board of education approved the purchase of 46 laptop computers and pondered the future of some fundraisers that could be at odds with federal guidelines during Monday night's regular meeting.

At a special meeting on August 2, the board had originally discussed purchasing as many as 50 computers, but board member LJ Kopsa raised questions about fiscal responsibility and lower enrollment numbers in the elementary school.

"Are we just automatically saying we need x amount of computers?" Kopsa asked. "If we just leave them sitting around, we're burning up money."

The computers cost about \$315 apiece, and elementary principal Mitch Parker seemed to be fine with purchasing 46.

"A computer doesn't make it a great classroom, but it definitely adds to it," he said.

A motion to approve the purchase passed 6-0 (Mary Beth

rules that could even jeopardize cheerleading and Rachel Bachthe district's free and reduced lunch funding if not followed.

"We need to get away from ongoing regular daily sugar sales," he said. "We've got some ongoing things we really need to clamp down on."

No action was taken, but some board members were less than enthusiastic about the proposed changes, even jokingly suggesting that a "black market" for candy and sweets could emerge. Items like chocolate bars, suckers and bake sales could all be affected under the new rules.

Board member Brian Feldpausch also reported that it has been a struggle to find concession stand workers for events, but he did not agree with a proposal to start paying them as most often the revenue generated supports school projects and fundraisers.

In personnel news, the board approved hiring Deb Mull as a special education bus driver, Gina Dinsmore as a part time elementary custodian and Julie Katzer as a middle school aide while accepting the resignation 2017-2018. of Cara Skramovsky as a special education aide. The following volunteer coaches received approval: Callie Bergen in volleyball, Dave Willett in football, Morgan and Shelby Trinkle in



The Ben Behrends family live on the farm. The father and the children were all at home and in bed. None of them were injured when the bolt struck the house, though they were dazed for a time. The mother was in a Marshalltown hospital at the time. The fire started quickly, after the bolt struck. Mr. Behrends tried to use the telephone to call for help, but the phone was burned out. He got into his car to drive to the home of a neighbor. The place is on a dirt road. The car-skidded off. the slippery road and became stalled in Ritchie Industries in Conrad a ditch The man then went back to get a horse to ride to the home of neighbor. When he got there that phone was also out of commission. He had to go another mile before he got a phone that was working. He quickly called the Conrad Fire Department for help. For those of you who take umbrage with my political insights, none of this probably comes as any surprise. Typical snowflake! But the difference is that I find myself envious of the people who are gifted in these areas, and I know it isn't the other way around. I don't think of the paranoid, delusional blowhards in Virginia and Boston marching with Tiki torches and flaunting the iconography that both of my grandpas and millions of other American men and women fought tooth and nail to extinguish from the earth forever. The version of the country that they're attempting to reclaim is never coming back, and while they're entitled to express their opinions non-violently, we aren't required to accept them as legitimate. Several of these self-proclaimed tough guys have since posted crying videos about how their lives are ruined, they've lost their jobs and people they've never met have attacked them viciously for their beliefs. A nice dose of karma, if I do say so myself.

I don't think of a president who blames violence on "many sides" when the culprits are clear as day and seeks to "learn all of the facts first" but proceeds to spout off about Islamic terrorism within minutes of an attack halfway around the world just days later. Isn't it possible to claim that both ideologies are reprehensible and have no place in a modern civilized society?

But maybe that's asking too much of him. At this point, I'm not sure if we can do better. We got the world that we voted for, and we're reaping the consequences of a 241-year racial wound that never seems to heal being picked at until it bleeds by an opportunistic demagogue with no regard for civility or basic human decency.

As the last few weeks have shown us locally, death is indiscriminate, and sometimes it makes no sense at all. The death of Heather Heyer, however, should lead us all to question the kind of country and the kind of world we want to live in.

"The state requires a librarian, and if we don't have one, we have to close both libraries, which is a huge resource to kids and staff. I have since, through Jerry, got information from our attorney saying that I could have voted on motion [at the last meeting]."

Gordon then argued that the school might still be able to hire a new librarian for less money.

"I feel like we could find someone with same qualifications, or maybe not. It doesn't really matter, but to spend that amount of money on a librarian and only have them here part time doesn't do justice for the kids in my opinion," he said. "I have a real issue how we're going about business and spending money."

For Grundy Center's half of the 28E Agreement, the district will pay BCLUW \$45,000 a year for librarian services, which is 50 percent of the cost for the librarian's salary, beneson and hire them within days before school starts.

"When BCLUW agreed to share, we had a chance. It wasn't the perfect situation, but it's better than going without a librarian, because those services are vital to the kids," Schutz said. "The library isn't just a place to go once a week and check out a book. It's about learning how to research and interact with technology; it's a comprehensive program that supports the whole curriculum and teaches kids important skills that they're going to carry on with them."

At the end of the meeting, the board voted to approve the 28E Sharing Agreement for librarian services with BCLUW. The vote was 3-2, with board members Chad Mackie, Ron Saak and Ascher voting in favor, and Gordon and Bob Johanns voting not in favor.

The sharing agreement with BCLUW will be similar to the prior librarian services sharing

Ancient **Boundary** Stones "The grass withers and the

flowers fall, but the word of our God endures forever." Isaiah 40:8 NIV

here is a prohibition in the Book of Proverbs which tells us "Do not move an ancient boundary stone set up by your ancestors." (Proverbs 22:28 NIV) This may sound curious to modern ears, but it is just a straightforward warning against theft or encroachment on someone else's land. A few verses later the warning is repeated, with a bit more specificity: "Do not move an ancient boundary stone or encroach on the fields of the fatherless, for their Defender is strong; he will take up their case against you." (Proverbs 23:10-11 NIV) The ancient Israelites believed that the land belonged to God and was in a sense loaned to God's people for their use. Thus, they allowed the poor and sojourners to glean the fields (cf. Leviticus 19:9-10), and the original distribution of the land for each tribe and family was expected to be honored (cf. Leviticus 25). These rules and maxims are, in effect, a codification of God's justice and fairness. The "ancient boundary" stone" can also be taken metaphorically to apply to the ancient wisdom of the Bible. We do well to keep these ancient stones in place. Rules that have worked well for thousands of years should not be overturned lightly. Christopher Simon

# **Iowa Computer Science Work Group** looks at graduation requirements

Iowa's Computer Science Work Group met for their second meeting on Tuesday, August 15 in Des Moines to continue their work in creating a proposal for the future of computer science education.

Formed at the request of the Iowa state legislature, the task of the work group is ultimately to make a recommendation to the state this November about how the K-12 education system can better incorporate computer science in schools. This includes determining what students need to be learning about computers and how best to practically and effectively deploy computer science lessons.

"It's going very well," said Ryan Wise, director of the Iowa Department of Education. "This is a really talented, well informed group."

The work group, consisting of about 40 people, is comprised of a wide range of educators, administrators, computer industry professionals, and political leaders, each bringing their own expertise to the table. This allows the group to determine how to best educate students while also considering practical realities about deployment of these programs.

"Each person brings a unique contribution to the group," said Wise.

During their first meeting in May, the group discussed exactly what computer science should entail, hearing from Jennifer Zinth of the Education Commission of the States. They also looked at what other states have done for their own computer standards, such as Arkansas, who mandates that all high schools offer at least one computer science course and expects K-8 teachers to integrate computer science into their instruction.

"One of the issues that the Education Commission of the States has expertise in is computer science," said Wise. "It was incredibly helpful to have that

just computer literacy, but also coding, networking, and both hardware and software education

"The goals for today's meeting are first to fine tune and develop an understanding on computer science and second, begin to form our recommendations," said Wise.

The specific area of discussion revolved around if and how computer science should factor into high school graduation requirements. The group discussed three scenarios that could be implemented as a way to boost computer science interest in schools. The first scenario involved simply making sure that all students have access to computer science courses and then allowing local districts to determine their own graduation requirements. The second would be to implement a state-wide graduation requirement for STEM classes. The third would be allowing students to substitute computer science for a math or science unit requirement.

Each scenario has pros and cons regarding effectiveness and logistical reality. Mandating them as a graduation requirement would guarantee all students have exposure to computer science, but there were concerns that it would become an unfunded mandate. School districts across the state aren't yet properly equipped to provide computer science to every student. In addition to the technological requirements, making sure that teachers are sufficiently prepared to instruct computer science could be an even greater logistical challenge than providing the equipment.

fect enrollment in other electives such as family and consumer science, band, and business classes.

Providing courses that can challenge students at all levels is also a difficulty that must be addressed. If a school has to have a computer science requirement and can only fit one class on the schedule, that class may be too easy for the more tech savvy students.

"Some of my kids could walk in and test out of the course. Then what do we do?" said Larry Mandernach, guidance counselor at Valley High School.

Instead of making computer science specifically a graduation requirement, the group leaned towards allowing computer science to count towards a math or science requirement for those who elect to take the class.

"I think that's a nice way to bring that in," said Katie Hendrickson, the advocacy and policy manager of Code.org. As the work group wrapped up, attendees were encouraged about the progress they've made in hashing out their recommendations and were eager to start getting down to the finer details.

"I think a lot of today was reviewing baseline data from other states that have done this work," said Cobb. "I think it's good that we're able to see that as we figure out what we want to do." 'The next couple of meetings will

really be shifted towards being more specific," said Wise.

The work group will meet again on

September 13, where they will discuss teacher certification, setting core standards, and funding mechanisms for their proposal.

At their second meeting, the group began to get into more of the finer details of their proposal, hearing from Code.org's Mark Gruwell, Katie Hendrickson, and Pat Yongpradit about computer science in other states.

So far, only 10 states have computer science standards that set a framework for students across the K-12 range. These standards include not

"We're not having this conversation in a vacuum," said Mary Jane Cobb, Executive Director of the Iowa State Education Association. "We're dealing with the physical realities and the political realities of our state."

Another consideration for the group to consider is that there are only so many hours in the school day. A computer science requirement would af-

## Northey comments on Iowa Crop **Progress and Condition Report**

DES MOINES – Iowa Secretary of Agriculture Bill Northey today commented on the Iowa Crop Progress and Condition report released by the USDA National Agricultural Statistical Service. The report is released weekly from April through October.

"Most of the state has seen some needed rain in the past week, but unfortunately it may be too little and too late for parts of south central and southeast Iowa that have already seen significant crop damage due to drought. Hopefully the rains and cool weather are helping boost corn and bean yields in other parts of the state that have received some moisture throughout the growing season," Northey said.

The weekly report is also available on the Iowa Department of Agriculture and Land Stewardship's website at www. IowaAgriculture.gov or on US-DA's site at www.nass.usda. gov/ia. The report summary follows here:

### **CROP REPORT**

Much needed rain fell throughout the state of Iowa during the week ending August 20, 2017, according to the USDA, National Agricultural Statistics Service. Statewide there were 4.8 days suitable for fieldwork. Activities for the week included having and hauling grain.

Topsoil moisture levels im-

## proved to 19 percent very short, 31 percent short, 49 percent adequate and 1 percent surplus. Topsoil moisture levels in south central and southeast Iowa re-

mained over 90 percent short to very short. Subsoil moisture levels rated 22 percent very short, 34 percent short, 44 percent adequate and 0 percent surplus.

Seventy-eight percent of the corn crop was in or beyond the dough stage, one week behind last year. Twenty-one percent of the corn crop has reached the dent stage, one week behind last year and five days behind the 5-year average. Sixty-one percent of the corn crop was rated in good to excellent condition. Eighty-eight percent of sovbeans were setting pods, 4 days behind last year but equal to average. Soybean condition improved slightly to 58 percent good to excellent. Almost all the oat crop for grain or seed has been harvested.

The third cutting of alfalfa hay reached 73 percent complete, 8 days ahead of last year and 10 days ahead of average. Pasture condition improved to 19 percent very poor, 24 percent poor, 31 percent fair, 23 percent good and 3 percent excellent. Livestock conditions have been ideal with the cooler temperatures. However, available water supplies in ponds and creeks remains an issue for some producers and supplemental feeding has been required.


