"I think everyone's really excited; it's been a long time coming," he said "Now, we have a lot more space which is one of the biggest things. We've got everything under one roof, where before we had things in different buildings, so this improves our response time and makes everything run a lot smoother."

The new super steel structure is approximately 13,000 sq. ft. in size, and is located at

GC council approves new welcome signs

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

Grundy County Bow 3D Shoot

August already, how can that be? The older I get the faster summer seem to go by. The beginning of August, as an avid whitetail hunter, marks the time to set cameras, check stands, seed fall food plots, and polish up on the archery skills. Shooting a bow is a bit different than shooting a gun. Marksmanship with archery equipment is only achieved by continuous practice. Many things go into being accurate with a bow; anchor point, form, and yardage identification play a part in placing your arrow where you are aiming. With hunting seasons just a couple months away, the time to practice is now.

Again this year, the Grundy County Conservation is putting on a great 40 target 3D bow shoot just north of Morrison on the Black Hawk Creek Wildlife Area. Cost is 10 dollars for an adult and 5 dollars for youth. You can hone your skills on a 40 targets course, featuring lifelike targets and real life hunting scenes. Come join us August 10th or 11th. Registration starts at 7:30AM and continues to

12:30PM which is the closing time to start around the course. The course leads through a woodland section with many different species of animals to take a shot at, and then takes your out into a prairie setting with more open game species. It is so much fun to walk around the course and see what animal you are taking a shot at next. For many people, including myself, this may be their only opportunity to take a shot at a bison or caribou. We do offer a practice range to check you sighting before you head out to take a shot at leopard or mountain lion.

Grab your bow and a few arrows and come join us. It is a great activity for the whole family. An amazing activity to introduce a young person to the outdoors and a shooting sport. My kids look forward to it every year, and love walking around the course and taking a shot at an animal they have never seen. Come on out Saturday, August 10th or Sunday, August 11th for some great entertainment for the whole family. And at the same time sharpen your skills for this upcoming fall.

Hunter safety course on August 15

The Grundy County Conservation Board is holding a Hunter Education course on Thursday, August 15 at the Grundy County Heritage Museum in Morrison. The entire 10 hour course will take place beginning at 8AM. Pre-registration is required and participants are expected to bring a sack lunch. In fact, that is the only thing that they need to bring. The course is offered free of charge. The day finishes at the Izaac Walton League clubhouse in Reinbeck at 6:00 p.m.

New for us this year is that registration is entirely online. You need to go to the Iowa DNR website to register for our class. Here's how: Go to www.iowadnr.gov. Click on "Hunting". Then find "Hunter Education" (left hand side of screen), click on that scroll down until you see "Hunter Education-Register Now" click on it. And it will take you to Iowa Hunter Education Classroom Course, click on "View Upcoming Events". Scroll down to find Aug. 15 and find the class offered at the Grundy County Heritage Center and click "View Event", and then "Register Now."

Some of my fondest memories are hunting related. I can remember shooting my first pheasant like it was yesterday. It was with my father and brother. Every pheasant opener was spent together walking first our farm and then the neighboring ones. I can remember what gun I was using. It was my Dad's 12 gauge. I had been carrying my bolt action .410 for a couple of years by then. That year, Dad agreed I could carry his and he mine. I was convinced that it would make the difference. When the cackling pheasant entered the air, it was a snap shot that probably left far too much lead shot in

the bird – but it fell! It was mine! That day I also remember that my little .410 dropped a couple of birds under Dad's use.

Hunting is obviously very important to me and is something I couldn't wait to pass down to my own kids. Each one took the Hunter Safety Course when they reached the age even though they had been walking along with me far ahead of that. There was no Hunter Education requirement when I was 12. My hunter education happened at my Dad's and an uncle's sides.

And that mentoring by an experienced hunter is still vitally important when it can happen. But now, in addition, the Hunter Education Course is the law for anyone born after 1972. You are required to take a Hunter Education Course in order to hunt on your own in Iowa. You are allowed to hunt with a licensed adult until you are 18, but after that you are required to have passed a hunter education course in order to go hunting. Hunter Education courses teach safe handling of firearms. There is also information on proper care of game after the harvest. Participants learn the game laws and many of the reasons behind those. And each one has that opportunity to shoot a few rounds with rifle and shotgun at monitored range environment.

Kids must be 11 to take the course but there is no limit to how old you can be to take it. Many dads take the course again with their child. And if you're not interested in hunting but your child is, it would be an even better reason to take the course with them. Hunter safety isn't just a class you take. Hunter Safety sets the foundation for safe hunting the rest of your life.



25 Years Ago This Week - 1994



Grassley Q & A: Salute to Whistleblowers

Question: Why does Congress recognize National Whistleblower Appreciation Day on July 30?

Answer: It's an appropriate coincidence National Whistleblower Appreciation Day occurs in the same month as America's Independence Day. On July 4, 1776, the nation's Founders declared freedom from tyranny and the sovereign right of the American people to pursue life, liberty and self-government. Just two years later, the Continental Congress passed historic legislation honoring the bravery and courage of the new nation's first whistleblowers. Sailors aboard the warship Warren came to Congress to report wrongdoing by their commanding officer. The 18th century resolution declared it the duty of every citizen "to give the earliest information to Congress or other proper authority of any misconduct, frauds, or misdemeanors." The words ring as true today in the 21st century as they did in 1778. As founder of the Senate Whistleblower Protection Caucus, I am committed to carrying forward the proclamation adopted by the nation's Founders.

My advocacy for truth tellers began four decades ago when I launched what has become a decades-long crusade to root out waste, fraud and abuse in the federal government. My 1986 updates to the False Claims Act empower private citizens to come forward and sue corrupt contractors on behalf of the taxpayer. The U.S. Justice Department says my amendments are the federal government's #1 anti-fraud tool in its arsenal, recouping nearly \$60 billion to the Federal Treasury and averting untold billions from waste, fraud and abuse. Likewise, whistleblower programs at the Securities and Exchange Commission and the Internal Revenue Service have recovered billions more dollars, giving these federal agencies effective tools to root out corruption that otherwise would go undetected. In my ongoing efforts to support and encourage those who risk their reputations and put their livelihoods on the line to report misconduct, I'm honored to champion and strengthen protections for whistleblowers. From food, drug and aviation safety, to tax dollars lost to wasteful spending in defense, health care, veterans or farm programs, Congress would be unable to find and root out wrongdoing across the sprawling federal bureaucracy without brave patriots who come forward to tell the truth. Our system of self-government is as strong as an engaged and informed citizenry. Americans have a civic duty to use their voice to blow the whistle on corruption that jeopardizes the integrity of financial systems, puts public safety at risk and rips off the taxpaying public.

75 Years Ago This Week - 1944

Lloyd Glass, living about three miles southeast of Beaman, has an unusually long police record. He is only 38 years old, but there are few men in this section of the state who have been arrested, fined and jailed so often. His last arrest occurred in Marshalltown on July 27th. The charge filed against him at that time was for drunken driving. He gave a check for \$1000 as an appearance Bond and he was released by Marshalltown authorities. Date for his hearing on his latest charge has not been set. He was fined \$300 in costs in a Grundy county court for illegal possession of liquor. That was on Nov. 1st, 1931. Seven years later he was picked up here again by officers for failure to pay all of the \$300 fine. When last arrested, Marshalltown officers asked the FBI for Glass' past record. The list as given and published in the Marshalltown paper includes an arrest for intoxication in 1935, another for the same thing in 1938, for which he was fined \$10 and costs and the same charge and fine in 1939, the report shows. In 1940 he was arrested In Marshall county for illegal possession of a pheasant. On this charge he was fined \$100 and costs. In 1941 he was again arrested for intoxication, for which he was assessed a fine of \$10 and costs. Glass admitted that in 1930 he was arrested in Gladbrook for drunken driving and was fined \$100 and costs, according to the report. On a similar charge he was again arrested and fined \$300 and costs in Grundy county. In 1935 he was arrested by the Albert Lea, Minn., sheriff for intoxication and served five days in jail. At El Centro, Calif., in 1936, he was arrested by police for drunkenness and served three days in jail. The police department of Nampa, Idaho, arrested Glass in 1937 for intoxication and again in 1941 on the same charge. He was fined \$25 and costs on each count. At Pendleton, Ore., 1941, Glass was arrested for Indecent exposure for which he drew a 90-day jail term, and again was arrested at Pendleton the same year for intoxication. He served 15 days in jail and paid a \$15 fine, the report shows.

Question: What drives your commitment to strengthen whistleblower protections?

Answer: One of the fundamental responsibilities of every federal lawmaker is constitutional oversight. As a prolific and outspoken watchdog against waste. I devote considerable time and resources to focus on holding government accountable to the people. Just since the start of the 116th Congress, I've sent more than 100 oversight letters to federal agencies to answer concerns about migrant abuse, defense contracting, foreign threats to taxpayer-funded research, improper Medicaid payments, drug pricing, government surveillance of U.S. citizens, whistleblower policies and more. Transparency brings accountability. Reprisals and retributions are common tactics used in the public and private sectors to intimidate and silence whistleblowers from reporting the truth. As long as I'm in the U.S. Senate, I will continue working to empower whistleblowers and strengthen legal protections that give them a platform to tell the truth and due process for unfair retaliation by federal agencies.





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

Grundy Center (14-13, 7-5 NICL West)

The Spartans battled to their first winning season in over a decade, a major turnaround from last season's 2-19 overall record.

Grundy Center tied with Gladbrook-Reinbeck for second in the NICL West behind undefeated champions West Marshall. The Spartans started the season 3-5 before a four-game winning streak kept Grundy Center floating around the .500 mark for most of the season.

AMES – The next three weeks will be crucial for Ben Latusek. The Dike-New Hartford

grad, now in his redshirt sophomore season with Iowa State University's football team, spent most of last season figuring out how to best contribute to head coach Matt Campbell's offense after transitioning from being a defensive lineman.

In mid-July, Latusek was listed on the pre-fall camp depth chart as a second-string player at the 'F' position and was on the field for second-team snaps at that position during spring practices.

But the tight end/'F' positions are competitive at Iowa State this year, and Latusek knows he'll have to prove himself to get a chance anywhere on the field. The season starts at Jack Trice Stadium on Aug. 31 against the University of Northern Iowa.

"We're all ready to get going with fall camp," Latusek said at ISU's Media Day last week. "We're ready to prove it and do whatever needs to be done by me or anyone in the tight end room. We'll do special teams, work on the offensive side of the ball, we're just excited to get going here.'

The Cyclones are looking to replace Sam Seonbuchner at the 'F' position. Seonbuchner caught five passes for 45 yards and a touchdown last season, playing in all 13 games for the second consecutive season.

Chase Allen and Charlie Kolar are returning starters at tight end, and 6-foot-7 junior Dylan Soehner brings back the most experience at the F position.

Where the depth chart goes from there depends on Latusek and the Cyclones in the tight end room, led by tight ends coach and recruiting coordinator Alex Golesh.

Former All-Big 12 quarterback Kyle Kempt was also recently hired as a quality control assistant for the offense.

"We feel like we've got expe-

being moved over from defensive line to the offensive side was going to be a possibility when he came into the Cyclone program as a walk-on.

'We made the switch last fall after camp and I've just taken it in stride," Latusek said. "I've gotten a lot of help from the veterans on this team and coaches helping me out a ton getting into that role."

Golesh praised Latusek's maturity in understanding this new role and how it fits in the Cyclones offense.

"Over the winter, he did a good job transforming his body, ... he's taken a lot of pride in perfecting his craft this spring," Golesh said. "The next three weeks for Ben are really big can he be a guy who can help us in short-yardage situations, in every-down situations? He has the next three weeks to help us answer those questions."

Tom Manning, returning to Iowa State as offensive coordinator this season, sees a "pleasant progression" in Latusek's move to the offensive skill position.

"He has some physical-ness to him, he's skilled as a blocker and we're happy with his progression," Manning said. "He's worked at it diligently starting with spring practice and through the summer and we're excited to see what he can continue to do."

ISU is 8-5 in each of the last two seasons, ending last year's campaign in the Alamo Bowl with a 28-26 loss to Washington State.

David Montgomery and Hakeem Butler are perhaps the two most high-profile graduates from last year's team. The Cyclones return six starters on the offensive line and overall return plenty of experience, especially on defense.

"We have to find ways to move the ball consistently," Manning said. "We have to do a great job of paying attention to the details and not skipping the steps of the process Coach Campbell sets out for us."

Listed at 6-foot-6 and 283 pounds on the roster, Skovgard knows there's room yet to grow.

"I'm just trying to get better every day, whether it's lifting, going through the playbook," Skovgard said. "Just knowing what's going on during the week this year will help a lot with scheduling and recovery and things like that. "This is a great team. I want to gain a little more weight and get comfortable in this position. ... This season should be really fun, and I'm excited for it."

Three area players 1st team all-state

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The Grundy Register AGWSR's Taryan Bar-

rick and MaKenna Kuper and BCLUW's Bailey Ashton earned first-team recognition on the Class 1A all-state softball teams released by the Iowa Girls Coaches Association last week.

Barrick allowed 10 earned runs in 92 and two-third innings pitched this summer, striking out 154 batters compared to 24 walks.

Kuper hit 11 home runs this season with a .423 batting average, adding four doubles, 25 runs batted in and 11 stolen bases. She had an on-base percentage of .545 and slugged .897.

Ashton was one of the top pitchers in 1A, allowing 32 earned runs in 164 innings pitched with 176 strikeouts and 38 walks, submitting a 1.37 ERA and a 20-5 overall record.
