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Supervisors Mexican restaurant set to open in Grundy Center hear more

budget requests

GRUNDY CENTER- The Grundy County Board of Supervisors discussed a host of budget-related issues and heard another round of requests during its regular meeting on Monday morning, which clocked in at almost 2 ¹/₂ hours.

Among the presenters were the Grundy County Fair Board, Conservationist Kevin Williams, leaders from the Grundy County Memorial Hospital, County Auditor Rhonda Deters and representatives of the soil and water conservation district.

The fair board requested \$86,000 for the upcoming year, a \$37,000 increase from its current budget, primarily to construct a new 40x96' bucket calf barn as the poles on the current building have rotted, and possible upgrades to the grandstand were also mentioned. The board members reported that while overall 4-H numbers are down, the number of youngsters participating in Clover Kids has increased substantially.

Board Chairman Chuck Bakker opined that the \$37,000 figure was probably not reasonable, as Grundy County is already more generous to its fair than most similarly sized counties. The board later settled on **By MICHAELA KENDALL** The Grundy Register

"Everyone here is so nice and so friendly," he said. "It's totally different than Marshalltown, nobody really cares there, but here everybody says hi and smiles to each other. It feels like Mexico."

Grundy County Public Health hires new director

By MICHAELA KENDALL The Grundy Register GRUNDY CENTER - Last week, Grundy County Public Health announced the hiring of a new public health director, Cassie Frost, who fills the spot left vacant by former director Wendy Monaghan.

Frost comes to her position with a wealth of knowledge in the area of public health. Since 2010, she has worked for Unity Point at the Women's Health Clinic in Waterloo. While there, she provided healthcare education, family planning services and assistance with aid programs like WIC.

"I've always been interested in public health," Frost said. "And it's really funny that I ended up here because when I was doing my clinicals back in 2009, I followed Nancy Herron here at this office."

Since Unity Point is a partner of Grundy County Public Health – and since she has previously worked in the same office she is at now – the transition was pretty smooth for Frost, whose first day was last Mon-

day. "I'm kind of spending my first week getting the hang of things, but I've already got some ideas for gaps we can fill, and ways we can better serve the community," she said.



For those unfamiliar with what Grundy County Public Health does, Frost says she would describe her job simply as "providing services and resources to help people in the community in any way that we can."

Specific services the department offers range from conducting flu clinics to writing health grants to offering public education and more. Grundy County Public Health is also in charge of Home Care Aides throughout the county. These aides provide all manner of services, in-

cluding: assistance with bathing, skin care, shampoo, and light housekeeping, as well as wound care, medication management, diabetic monitoring and teaching, blood draws, health teaching, catheter care, IV therapy and more.

Frost says her department works closely with other health organizations such as the Grundy County Memorial Hospital, Unity Point, the Iowa Department of Public Health,

and other healthcare providers and public health departments around the state to make sure that any services not available in the county are available at a close proximity for any resident who might need them.

Another big part of GC Public Health is education and community involvement.

Katie Thornton-Lang, who works as a Public Health Educator for Grundy County Public Health, said that the department organizes an annual bike rodeo to teach children bike safety, and regularly conduct car seat safety education for new mothers. At the local schools, GC Public Health sets up informational speaking sessions that cover topics such as the dangers of tobacco, or playground safety, or how to stop the spread of germs and bacteria.

"We also focus a lot on community involvement," Thornton-Lang said. "We also have a medical re-

serve corps group of volunteers that help out whenever they are needed. A lot of the time, they will help out at different events we put on, and just at different events around the community."

Thornton-Lang said that no medical experience is required to volunteer, and that they are always looking for more people to join.

"We also want to encourage people to come to our meetings, because a lot of people don't realize they're open to the public," she said. "Anyone can come in and listen, or throw out ideas for what we can do better.'

For anyone interested, the Grundy County Board of Health meetings are held at the Hospital Education Room on the second Monday of every other month, at 7 a.m.

On Thursday, January 26, Grundy Center High School hosted a Regional Competition of the 2017 Iowa Academic Decathlon. Teams from eleven school districts traveled to Grundy Center to earn a chance to compete at the state competition in Cedar Rapids on March 3 and 4. The decathletes representing

Grundy Center-Dike New Hartford were more than up to the task and stormed to a second consecutive regional championship.

Each decathlon team is required to have competitors at each of three competition levels: Honors (3.75 - 4.00 GPA), Scholastic (3.00 -3.74 GPA) and Varsity (GPA below 3.00). The number one team for GC-DNH performed extremely well and set a school record by scoring 34,846 points. The team consisted of (Honors) Dylan Hen-


Senior Tiana Saak had the best individual score among our competitors. Her 7,210 points is a GC-DNH record. The previous record of 6,414 was held by Saak and was set at last year's competition. Tiana also set a school record for the most points scored on the literature test with 880.

Saak's performance was impressive, but the GC-DNH win was not a one person show. The team swept est score at each competition level. Saak took gold at Honors, senior Eli Harberts took gold at Scholastic (6,135 points), and junior Noah Boquet took gold at Varsity (5,254 points). The last time the Academic Decathlon team accomplished that particular feat was in 1988.

The GC-DNH Honors decathletes also scored a sweep, claiming all three Honors medals. Tiana Saak earned gold; Dylan Hendricks, silver and Jesper Holke-Farnam, bronze. Senior Kody Mullen was awarded the silver medal at the Varsity level.

County Engineer outlines bridge projects for coming year

GRUNDY COUNTY - County Engineer Gary Mauer says this year is going to be a big one in terms of bridge replacement and repair projects. He estimated that there are \$4.86 million worth of repairs in store for Grundy County over the next year to year and a half.

"It's definitely a bigger year than usual, and we have a lot more projects lined up right now because we've had favorable conditions with snow and ice," Mauer said.

Among the bridges scheduled for repair are: Bridge N-17 just outside of Conrad, Bridge N-25 just outside of Beaman, Bridge E-8 west of Wellsburg, Bridge I-1 north of Reinbeck. a bridge southwest of Reinbeck, Bridge B-21 west of Dike, a bridge in Dike, and Bridge A-5 northeast of Stout

Though a \$4.8 million price tag may seem like a lot, there will be help from federal aid dollars, Mauer said.

Three of the projects fall under the Iowa DOT for administering the federal aid bridge replacement funds that are allocated to Grundy County, and those projects will be funded with 80 percent federal aid dollars. These bridges (B-21, N-17, and N-25) have a combined project cost of \$1.57 million. These projects will be let after October of 2017, due to their federal funding status.

Of the other projects that don't fall under federal aid domain, funding comes from two main sources:

road use tax and property tax. These two sources make up the county's bridge replacement fund. Mauer estimates that from the fund, about \$1.6 million per year comes from property tax and about \$3.4 million comes from road use tax. In addition, Grundy County is allocated approximately \$350,000 per year for federal aid bridge replacement funds.

According to Mauer, the bridge replacement fund stays pretty steady in balance from year to year, even as projects become more plentiful and expensive.

With many bridges in Grundy County, and in Iowa, having been built in the early 1900s, the aging structures are decaying at a faster rate than they can be repaired, and there is often not enough funding to fix most of the needed repairs each year.

This is one of the biggest struggles for those involved in infrastructure both locally and across Iowa. Since the Federal Gas Tax of 1993, which has remained unchanged in rate since being passed, there hasn't been a new source of federal funding to provide a boost for infrastructure projects such as bridge repairs and replacements.

And according to Mauer, it's likely that this wont change.

"Right now we have to focus on doing the best we can with what we have," Mauer said.

In March, the County Board of Supervisors will finalize all bridge projects and budgets for the coming year.

Grundy Center Police Department warns citizens to take precautions

The Grundy Register GRUNDY CENTER - After a recent uptick in petty crimes, the Grundy Center Police Department hopes to remind citizens to take precautions, and be proactive.

"Grundy Center is a wonderfully safe community, but unfortunately, we still have things happen," said Captain Kyle Waugh of the GCPD. "Most of it's petty crimes, but we still want to remind people to be on

vehicles. Last summer, dozens of vehicles around the county had items stolen from them. In most cases, vehicles were left unlocked.

Waugh said that crimes like these are totally preventable as long as citizens are proactive.

He suggested the following tips for residents to avoid being the victim of a crime:

• Never leave your keys in your vehicle, and avoid leaving your vehicle unlocked and running – even if you are just running into the store. · Do not leave ID, wallets, checkbooks, jewelry, or other valuables in open view, and take all valuables out of your vehicle before leaving it unattended. • Always lock the doors to your home when you are gone. Make sure windows are locked as well.

According to Havens, the hospital currently employs 202 people, including 149 Grundy County residents, and pays over \$9 million in direct wages, generating over \$1 million in retail sales and sales taxes. GCMH serves 80 percent of the residents in the primary service area (Grundy Center, Reinbeck, Holland and Wellsburg) and 45 percent of residents in the secondary area (Dike, Stout, Steamboat Rock, Beaman, Conrad). Visits to the Orthopedic and cardiology clinics as well as the emergency department have all increased substantially in recent years.

Future plans include tearing down the nursing home facility once Western Home takes over, and adding three additional exam rooms, a procedure room and a women's health suite.

Although the report was mostly positive, Bakker commented that he believes the county should gradually reduce its contribution to the hospital because it is privately owned and generates revenue on its own.

"Over the last 25 years, with everything the taxpayers of Grundy County have done for the hospital, I feel that they should be weaned off some of the grant money," Bakker said.

As in past years, the hospital board is requesting a \$263,000 grant from the county. The supervisors did not discuss reducing that figure later in the meeting. This year will mark the 65th anniversary of the GCMH.

Williams was brief in his presentation, and he reported that his tax asking is actually down \$1,600 from last year. He plans to purchase a new plow truck with a dump box sometime in the near future. The board discussed increasing camping fees but in the end decided against it. The soil and water representatives re-

quested the same amount in funding (\$4,000) as they received last year.

Deters also kept her presentation brief, noting that budget numbers fluctuate based on the elections being held each year. She mentioned the possibility of a Republican sponsored "Election Integrity" bill, which would require a photo identification for all voters, electronic poll books across the state and random post-election audits for 50 to 80 precincts throughout the state in February of the following year. Deters said that some county auditors are opposed to the additional audits but added that Grundy County has been proactive in updating its system to ensure that its practices are up to date.

"We're not in a position where we're going to have our hand played for us," she said. "We had time to do this without being under the gun."

A motion to approve the resolution of support for the Grundy Center Main Street project passed 4-1, with Harlyn Riekena opposed. Assistant County Engineer Steve Cox reported that completion on the annex building is running slightly behind schedule and received approval to sign the final paperwork for the Buffalo anch box culvert project.

The board did not take action on setting a date for a hearing on a zoning change in regards to the area around the airport west of Grundy Center.

"We are just trying to put (Blaine) into the right economical position that will allow him to succeed and get a good start," she said.

Brenda Gomez, who operated the Maria's food truck in Conrad that opened last July, said that because of some unforeseen issues and other obligations, a brick and mortar restaurant is no longer in the plans. She did add, however, that the food truck would still probably be open at least a few days a week in the spring and summer.

"It just isn't a great time right now," Gomez said. "We just don't have the staff to open up right now in Conrad."

Maria's recently opened a restaurant in State Center and has run food trucks there as well as in Albion in addition to Conrad and the main location on State Street in Marshalltown.

At press time, Shiner Development Owner Dan Shine had not responded to multiple requests for comment.

10 Years Ago This Week - 2007 The Grundy County Memorial Hospital (GCMH) generates 139 jobs that add \$6,110,741 to Grundy County's economy, according to a study by the Iowa Hospital Association. In addition, GCMH employees by themselves spend \$900,874 on retail sales and contribute \$45,044 in state sales tax revenue. "Everyone recognizes that a hospital is a positive element in any community, but this study truly quantifies that impact," said Pamela Delagardelle, CEO, GCMH. "A well-supported system of community hospitals provides quality care for individuals and quality of life for the entire community." The IHA study examined the jobs, income, retail sales and sales tax produced by hospitals and the rest of the state's health care sector. The study was compiled with software that other industries have used to determine the economic impact of those industries. The study found that Iowa hospitals directly employ 70,320 people and create another 80,174 jobs outside the healthcare sector. As an income source, hospitals provide \$3.1 billion in salaries and benefits and generate almost another \$2.2 billion through other jobs that depend on hospital.

Last week the Grundy Soil and Water Conservation District, together with NRCS (Natural Resources Conservation Service) and FS A (Farm Service Agency) celebrated the retirement of Soil Conservation Aide Paul Sells. Paul had served in the Grundy County office for over 10 years, helping to survey, layout, design, and review conservation practices that reduced soil erosion and improved water quality.

75 Years Ago This Week - 1942

The date for the beginning of sugar rationing has not been set definitely, but it is expected it will be placed in operation within a week. Where, and from what source the rationing cards will be issued has not yet been announced. It is expected that 12 ounces, or three-fourths of a pound, of sugar will be allotted 'to each person per week, which will be three pounds a month. During the last war each person was allowed but 2 pounds of sugar per month. Three pounds of sugar per person is believed to be enough to supply ordinary needs and the rationing program is not going to impose any hardship. Many of the grocery stores have had a rationing plan of their own in effect for several months. The y have sold only limited quantities of sugar to one customer. T h e same customer could buy sugar at a dozen or more stores and accumulate an excessive supply. No t much of that has been done. For a short time after the w a r started in Europe there was a sugar scare and many families stocked up heavily. After this scare subsided sugar prices went down again and those who bought heavily regretted It. Sugar at local grocery stores is selling around 7 cents a pound. I t is not believed the price will be permitted to go much higher, During the last war sugar prices were pushed up to 30 cents a pound. Officers made a raid on seven places of business In Grundy Center and one place in Morrison Tuesday night looking for illegal merchandise and gambling devices. They found evidence in all but two of the places and took it with them, and consigned it in the office of the Mayor. They found and confiscated at this place a nickel slot machine, contain mc \$11.30 in cash, two punchboards and two quarts of liquor. The slot machine is a Columbia, valued at \$100. It belonged to the owner of the place. This raid was made as a result of frequent complaints by Morrison people filed with county officials.

so many of these birds all together. To say there were 100 would not be exaggerating. In college and later working at Red Rock, I received training at estimating numbers of animals for wildlife research. However, I could not put that knowledge to work as sadly I was cutting it too close for that Dr. appointment.

The open water has attracted several other species of waterfowl, including some that are quite uncommon at least for mid-winter. Upon returning home, I found reports of large numbers of these swans over at Ada Hayden Park in Ames and upwards of as many as 200 swans were wintering on Beemer's Pond near Webster City at the junction of Hwy 17 and Hwy 20.

These magnificent snow white birds are easily twice the size of the giant Canada geese that I was expecting to be seeing. These swans have wingspans up to eight feet. They also are among the world's heaviest flying birds reaching weights of over 30 pounds. To get that much bird into the air takes some distance. They literally run across the water to reach flying speed, and require longer open approaches when they glide in to land at these watery airports. Like the wintering geese, these birds are living on corn from area fields.

And to think, they were teetering on the edge of extinction before 1950. Just going by the numbers of birds reported at the areas I listed here, there are more trumpeter swans in central Iowa right now than existed in the United States when I was born in 1956. According to Jack Musgrove's 1943 book, Waterfowl In Iowa, there were only 69 birds remaining in the lower 48 states as residents of Red Rock Lakes National Wildlife Refuge in Montana. Estimates were that including swans in northwest Canada and Alaska, there were proba-

bly no more than 1500!

The return of wild trumpeter swans to Iowa and the nation is one of modern conservation's major success stories. The birds once nested across much of Canada and the northern US. Like so many other iconic North American wildlife species, habitat loss and unregulated hunting in the 1800s nearly wiped them out. Jim Dinsmore's book, A Country S Full Of Game, records the last wild nesting in Iowa taking place in 1883.

So what happened? Careful harvesting of eggs from wild pairs and captive breeding programs in several states began in the 1980s and 1990s. In Iowa it was 1993. The Iowa DNR's reintroduction program was phased out in 2011 due to the successful establishment of wild nesting pairs on wetlands scattered around the state.

On our way home Sunday afternoon, I swung by the lake to show the swans to my wife. Sadly there were none. Out in the fields feeding already? Perhaps. Back over to Ames? They quite possibly could be the same birds. A trip to Ames is no big deal for us and even less of a problem for swans. I can tell you that my next several trips to Marshalltown will have me driving by way of Sand Lake to see if they are still around.





D-NH teacher is presented with STEM award

DIKE - Over the past decade, the need for STEM-related skills and expertise has grown rapidly. In fact, the Iowa Governor's STEM Advisory Council predicts that over the next 10 years, the number of STEM-related jobs will increase by 16 percent in our state alone.

To meet this demand, the expectation usually falls on teachers to get students interested in STEM during school and beyond; and while STEM hasn't always been the most glamorous career path to young students, more and more educators are finding ways to make STEM exciting and interesting for young people.

In order to recognize Iowa teachers for their outstanding achievement in STEM teaching, the Iowa Governor's STEM Advisory Council and Kemin Industries came together to create the I.O.W.A STEM Teacher Award.

Each year, a select few Iowa

teachers are bestowed the award, and this year one of the awardees was Dike-New Hartford High School's very own science teacher: Chelsie Slaba.

Last Wednesday, Slaba was presented the award during a surprise ceremony in her classroom.

"When I found out I got the award I was shocked," Slaba said. "I'm the new teacher, I've only been here for three years, so I never thought in a million years I would get this award. It's very humbling, I just can't believe it."

But despite being relatively new to D-NH, Slaba wasted no time doing anything she possibly could to get students inspired about STEM. First she started the Robotics Team, a club that gets students involved in STEM outside of class, and then she signed up to sponsor the Outdoor Adventure and Science Club. In addition, she added a 'Science Survey' course. During the class, students were able to get hands-on experience when they

partnered with the University of out the 'why' behind things, that's Kansas to gather monarchs for migration research.

her classes - Slaba has aimed to expose every student in the school to STEM during the Science Career Investigation event she hosts every May. During the event, Slaba brings in speakers from various STEM-related careers to show students the wide variety of opportunities available to them after graduation.

"It's really neat because even though we're kind of a smaller school, we're still able to do a lot of cool stuff here," Slaba said.

She said that she always tries to ignite an interest in students about STEM by letting them come up with their own 'Big Questions.' Students use their 'Big Questions' to organize and conduct their own experiments.

"I just try to get them interested in asking questions, and once they have a hunger for really finding doing demos.

when I come in and use my teaching to answer those questions for And it's not just the students in them," she said. "And if I don't have the answer, I find someone who does, and I bring them into the classroom to answer that question."

> For example, Slaba said, one student was interested in finding out the science behind tattoos.

> "I don't know much about the science behind tattoos, so I had a tattoo artist come in and explain the organic chemistry behind it to the students and they loved it," she said.

> Slaba hopes to use the money she received with the award (\$1,500 for classroom use) to further push her STEM teaching. Though she's not sure yet, she says she's considering purchasing interactive learning materials, such as science kits complete with lasers, or interactive seating with whiteboards, or even an iPad Mini for



Grassley Q & A: Balanced Budget Amendment

Question: Why are you co-sponsoring an amendment requiring Congress to pass a balanced budget?

Answer: The founders authorized a federal amendment process with Article V of the U.S. Constitution to give future generations a stake in our system of self-government. Arguably, the future of our republic is at stake with regard to unsustainable federal spending. Now, amending our founding charter is a serious undertaking for good reason: to withstand the whims of time and establish a framework for consensus among a heterogeneous population varied by regional, cultural and political ideology. As for my advocacy for a Balanced Budget Amendment, it's widely known that the United States of America is awash in a sea of red ink. And yet, forging a path to protect future generations from the riptide of unsustainable debt has proven elusive, even though it is a priority for fiscal conservatives like myself. Through oversight and legislative avenues, I have worked to make government live within its means just like U.S. households, family farms and businesses do to stay afloat. However, fiscal discipline is not a priority for Big Spenders who believe that government knows best, no matter the cost to taxpayers. Keep in mind that nearly every state has enacted a balanced budget amendment to restore fiscal discipline in their ledgers. And the sky has not fallen over any of their state capitals. What's good for the goose is good for the gander. As President Trump said in his inaugural address, now is the hour of action. Remember that the president, lawmakers and federal judges take an oath to uphold the Constitution. So, adopting a Balanced Budget Amendment that requires Congress to each year pass a budget that balances would stop lawmakers from kicking the fiscal can down the road into perpetuity. Importantly, our system of checks and balances would apply, just as it has for more than two centuries, to ensure fidelity to the rule of law and to uphold government "of, by and for the people."

Question: What is the fiscal outlook for the federal government

Answer: According to the nonpartisan Congressional Budget Office, debt held by the public stands at 77 percent of the nation's economic output. What's worse, the debt is projected to surge to 89 percent of GDP in 10 years, the highest level since World War II. It's time to put the brakes on the nation's tax-spend-and borrow binge. As a share of the economy, debts and deficits are driving America in the wrong direction. The debt held by the public is on pace to rise from \$14.2 trillion to \$24.9 trillion in the next decade. Add in the federal I.O.U.s and the nation's debt is marching toward \$20 trillion. Under current law, federal spending tied to our aging population, rising health costs and climbing interest payments will keep deficits going in the wrong direction

as far as the eye can see. Don't forget, those obligations also shrink the revenue available for other government programs and public services, such as defense and national security, agriculture, infrastructure, medical research and more. Uncle Sam is projected to collect \$3.4 trillion in 2017. Congress ought to be able to pass a budget without borrowing even more with that amount of money coming into the federal coffers.

Question: How would the proposed Balanced Budget Amendment work?

Answer: It would require Congress to spend no more than it collects during any fiscal year, and it would limit spending to 18 percent of the gross national product. That's the 40-year historical average of total federal receipts. It provides for an emergency safety valve, for national crises, by allowing Congress to only run a deficit, raise taxes, or increase the debt limit if agreed to by twothirds of both the House and Senate. Furthermore, the amendment gives standing to any member of Congress to seek judicial enforcement of the balanced budget requirement as long as the federal lawmaker receives authorization by a petition signed by one-third of either the House or the Senate. The amendment would become effective in the second fiscal year after ratification. Only 27 constitutional amendments have been adopted in our nation's 240-year history. Considering the sweeping fiscal instability of our country, the time has come to add a 28th amendment. For that to happen, our proposed amendment must earn a two-thirds majority vote in both houses of Congress. Then, at least three-fourths of the state legislatures (38 of 50) are required to ratify it. Amending our founding charter to require a binding balanced budget every year would help steer America back on the road to prosperity. When the federal government spends beyond its means year after year, future generations are put on the hook and saddled with debt they didn't create. We have a moral obligation to our children and grandchildren to afford them the opportunity to pursue happiness and prosperity without anchoring their dreams with a \$60,000 per person debt burden. Thomas Jefferson, one of the authors of the Declaration of Independence and U.S. president, wrote: "We must not let our rulers load us with perpetual debt." I agree. The federal government cannot tax, spend and borrow its way to prosperity. There is no better time for Congress to pass this amendment and get America's fiscal house in order once and for all.





The showdown between the top two teams in the NICL East got off to a slow start, as they were tied at 4-4 midway through the first quarter. D-NH (13-3, 10-1) grabbed some momentum when senior Broden Coulter scored on a breakaway lay-up, and star senior Ben Latusek, who finished with 22 points, scored inside to make it 8-4 in favor of the Wolverines. Both offenses then went cold, however, and an inside bucket from A-P's Carter Cuvelier was the only field goal for the rest of the opening frame. The Wolverines led the Falcons (12-3, 8-3) 8-7 at the horn.

D-NH extended its lead to six at 18-12 after a Connor Blough lay-in midway through the second and got a spark off the bench from sophomore Cade Fuller to push the lead to 23-14. By halftime, it was 26-16.

The Wolverines seemed to have all the momentum in the third after a Blough dunk and buckets from and Oberhauser led the Falcons

Latusek and Fuller pushed the lead to 17, and a Fuller 3-pointer made it 45-27, the largest margin of the night. The Falcons fought back with five quick points late in the quarter, though, and a Chase Kling trey brought the lead back to just 13 heading into the final frame.

"I think we settled down a little bit in the second and third quarters and ran some offense a little better," D-NH coach Greg Moore said.

D-NH kept its lead around 15 points until A-P went on a 10-0 run, buoyed by a supportive road crowd and a ferocious full court press, as Cade Alberts and Dylan Ellis each hit a three, and Alec Oberhauser capped it off with two free throws to make the score 52-47. The Falcons would not get any closer, however, as Fuller and then Latusek hit free throws to push the lead back to eight, and a desperation three attempt from Alberts fell short. Latusek hit two more free throws, and the Wolverines rode out the hard earned home victory.

"I thought we competed and played hard. Our guys never quit," A-P coach Aaron Thomas said. "We can't get down like that. We've got to finish at the rim a little bit better."

The star players for each team came to play: Latusek finished with 22 points and 15 rebounds,

with 18 points and eight boards. Fuller poured in 14 off the bench, and junior Coby Hoff added 10 for A-P. D-NH shot 50 percent from the floor (21-of-42), while the Falcons shot just 31 percent (16-of-51).

The loss ended a nine-game winning streak for the Falcons, and the Wolverines won their fifth straight while extending their lead in the conference race to two full games.

"The rivalry is big... both teams played extremely hard," Moore said. "It's big for our kids."
