Chillier temps don't put a damper on swimming season

GRUNDY COUNTY Since the beginning of this year's swimming season, the weather has proved to be an unpredictable factor for local aquatic centers. Temperatures swung from unseasonably hot to unseasonably chilly

in a matter of days, but local swimmers have proved to be resilient, showing out to swim despite the less-than-perfect conditions.

In Grundy Center, pool manager Heather Stumberg says attendance has been very good so far this year, despite chillier temperatures the last week or so.

"The first couple of week-

ends we were open it was just packed because it was so hot, and then last week things kind of slowed down a little because of the weather, but we've been pretty lucky so far," she said. "We've got a great pool, and I think we've had a really good amount of people coming in."

Stumberg says they've had to close the pool a few times so far due to cooler temps – the pool wont open if it's below 70 degrees – but other than that, they haven't run into any issues.

She added that they are planning some closings for upcoming holidays and festivals; during Felix Grundy Days, the pool will close early on Saturday, but will be open for normal hours on Friday and Sunday. They will also close early

on the Fourth of July, which falls on a Tuesday this year.

Other than those days, the pool will be open normal hours, from 1 to 8 p.m. Monday through Sunday, and people can still rent the pool for a private party from 8 to 9 p.m.

In Dike, the daily hours for the Dike Community Pool are 1 to 8:30 p.m. In the morning, swim team practice is held

from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m., and open swim is held from 1 to 5:30 p.m., with lap swim/lessons held from 5:30 to 6:30 p.m. If weather permits, there is usually a night swim from 6:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m.

Residents can also rent the pool for a private party from 8:30 to 10:30 p.m.

Supervisors GCHS gym addition project nears completion

GRUNDY CENTER- Consumer fireworks will be banned at all county parks, wildlife areas and preserves unless a special exception is made after the Grundy County Board of Supervisors voted to adopt a new ordinance that has been updated to reflect changes in state law on Monday morning.

There were no residents present to voice concerns, and a public hearing on the matter ended quickly. According to the ordinance, fireworks of any kind will also be prohibited anytime that a burn ban is in effect, and display fireworks in the unincorporated areas of the county will require a permit to use. Operators must be at least 18 years of age, and a violation of the ordinances will constitute a simple misdemeanor.

The board voted to suspend the rules and move to a third reading after initially approving the changes, and that vote passed 4-0 (Harlyn Riekena was absent).

Several appointments to boards and committees were approved during the meeting: Gary James was re-appointed to the Veteran's Affairs commission, Paul Cooley was re-appointed to the conservation board, Riekena was re-appointed to the Iowa Northland Regional Council of Governments (INRCOG) Regional Housing Council, and Stan Neff of rural Beaman was appointed to the Board of Adjustment.

County Engineer Gary Mauer reported that plans are progressing on the bridge repair project for C31, which is located northeast of Wellsburg,

The Grundy Register GRUNDY CENTER – After over a year of construction, the long-awaited practice gym at Grundy Center High School is finally nearing completion.

At last week's school board meeting, Superintendent Jerry Schutz reported that the project is currently running on time, and under budget. He said he's anticipating the crew will be finished with most of the work by mid-July, and that the gym will be ready for use in time for school this August.

"Right now, they're working on putting the finishing touches on everything," Schutz said. "They just finished laying the gym floor, now they're going to start sanding and painting and sealing it. That's really the last major thing they have to work on, besides smoothing the

roadway out back and doing the landscaping and that kind of thing.'

If the project is finished under budget, as is planned, Schutz says the school will use the extra money for infrastructure improvements in the areas of HVACC, electric, and water mains.

Once the gym is completed, Schutz says there will likely be a grand opening of sorts to help welcome community members to the facility, though there has been no formal event set so far.

"We're really excited to get this gym done and to start using it," Schutz said. "There's a little less seating space because it's just a practice gym, but [the way it's set up] makes it perfect for hosting tournaments and stuff like that, so we're hoping that's something we can do to get people in to see our facilities."

GCPD urges safety, responsibility over Fourth of July weekend

The Grundy Register GRUNDY CENTER - With the upcoming Fourth of July holiday, community members are busy planning their festivities – whether it's a barbecue, block party, camping trip, or just lighting off some celebratory fireworks. But whatever revelry the Fourth of July brings, the Grundy Center Police Department wants to urge citizens to practice safety and responsibility during their holiday fun.

"We anticipate it's going to be a pretty busy weekend, with a lot of fireworks complaints, and everything else," said Chief of Police Doug Frost. "But as long as people are getting permits and following city ordinances, there's not going to be too many issues with that."

Another focus during the holiday season is alcohol usage. 'We don't anticipate a lot of

drunk driving around here, but we'll definitely be looking for it, because it still happens," he said. "With an extended weekend and the nice weather, people are going to want to get out and celebrate, but a lot of peo-

ple around here are really good about not driving after they've had anything to drink. We see a lot more people out camping and staying where they're at instead of trying to drive home." "If you are drinking, it's best

er it's camping or staying at a friend or family member's house," Frost advised. "And if you really have to travel, always have a driver lined up. Don't get behind the wheel and hurt yourself, or someone else." Similar to Memorial Day weekend, the GCPD will be

taking part in a STEP (Special Traffic Enforcement Program) to help promote safety - especially on the roadways – during the busy holiday weekend.

From July 1 to July 4, officers will be on patrol, cracking down on seatbelt and speed violations, drunk driving, and other public safety concerns.

Another thing officers will be looking for is texting and driving. As of July 1, the new texting and driving laws will be enforced in Iowa. Prior to the new law being put in place, texting and driving was a secondary violation, meaning and officer would have to pull a person over for another violation, and ticket the person for texting and driving as a secondary violation.

Now, officers across the state will be able to pull a person over if they are seen texting and driving, and ticket them with a primary violation, and a hefty fine.

"It's really surprising how much texting and driving has gone up," Frost said. "I see a lot of it when I'm off duty; I'll be driving down Highway 20 and see someone texting, or I'll see someone pull up to a stop light, and they're texting."

"I always tell people to stay off the phone until they're out of the car, because it's just not worth it," he said. "If it's really that important, then pull over, stop the car, and make a call. But a lot of

er, and they don't realize they need to stop until they get that ticket. Then they start to take it more seriously.'

In the last 10 years alone, texting and driving accidents have nearly doubled in number, increasing from 667 accidents in 2006 to 1,230 accidents in 2016, according to the most recent data from the Iowa Department of Transportation.

Alcohol related accidents are on the rise as well.

Last year alone, over 7,000 Iowa drivers were arrested for drunk driving and charged with an OWI, and at least 84 people across Iowa were killed in alcohol-related traffic crashes, according to information from the Iowa DOT. Many of those fatal accidents occur around the holiday season, and over the last five years, the Fourth of July holiday has brought more fatal, alcohol crashes than any other holiday, according to the same data.

Frost says it's important for people to understand it's okay to have fun during the holiday season, as long as it's in a safe, responsible way. He urged people to be smart, aware of their surroundings, and to follow the laws, which are put in place to protect them, and keep everyone safe not only during the holiday season, but all year round.

Life on the prairie A visit to the Neal Smith Wildlife **Refuge and Prairie Learning Center**

I took a relaxing trip last Sunday. Well, perhaps relaxing is not the most accurate word to use with five grandkids ranging from 7 years to 6 months. Enjoyable is certainly accurate, however.

My wife and I, our three children and grandchildren visited the Neal Smith National Wildlife Refuge and Prairie Learning Center near Prairie City. It had been quite some time since we had visited this area. I recall Shannon commenting that she had been there last in 7th grade.

As we walked around the facility (we walked - two of the grandsons run more than they walk right now), more than once my daughter remarked "this is like up at the Grundy County Heritage Museum - did you steal this idea?"

Now, I don't like to hear one f my kids asking if I stole anything. Yes, there are many aspects of the learning center that provided inspirations as the Ag Hall exhibits in Morrison took shape.

acres of the Walnut Creek watershed and to provide a major environmental education facility focusing on prairie, oak savanna, and human interaction.

The refuge, bordering the southwest city limits of Prairie City, Iowa, began from a core 3,600 acres that was purchased from that electric utility company after that proposed nuclear power plant was rejected. Through the purchase of land from willing sellers, the refuge will eventually occupy over 44% of the Walnut Creek watershed!

The refuge has been designated a Fish and Wildlife Service Land Management and Research Demonstration Area. It facilitates development, testing, teaching, publishing, and demonstration of state-of-theart management techniques for fish, wildlife, and plant conservation.

The Prairie Learning Center facilities include a visitor center with classrooms, exhibit area, theater, and bookstore. Miles of paved trails radiate from the center, and an auto tour through the 740-acre bison/elk enclosure is open all year. Teacher workshops, birding, hunting, and nature watching are some of the outdoor activities featured for thousands of visitors each year. Our whole family enjoyed the visit – some for the very first time and others after quite some time. I enjoyed the roughly four mile trip into the refuge before arriving at the learning center. The hard-surface roadway and building was planned in such a way that it melts into the prairie landscape rather than protrude from it. We spent only a couple of hours there and that included the auto tour through the bison/ elk enclosure (they roam only about 800 of the almost 6,000 existing area). Whether you have never been or it's been a long time, I would highly recommend a visit to this place with our kids and/ or grandkids!



The Neal Smith National Wildife Refuge and Prairie Learning Center was created by an act of Congress in 1990, to re-construct tallgrass prairie and restore oak savanna on 8,654

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

10 Years Ago This Week - 2007 During the early morning hours of Friday, June 22, as Sara Wegmann laid in bed listening to the sound of hard rain against her house and the distant rumbling of thunder, she heard an extremely loud crack right outside her window. Wegmann's basset Dauber, whom she says is never afraid of storms, began barking insistently and running in circles. Fifteen minutes later and only because of Dauber's persistence, she went downstairs where she saw through the kitchen window the orange glow of fire coming from the corner of her garage roof. Around 3:15 a.m., Wegmann, her two-year-old son Ben and Dauber fled their house as flames engulfed their garage. A crew of fire-fighters arrived a few minutes later. According to GC Fire Chief Jerry Hoffman, the cause of the fire was a severe lightning strike to the corner of the garage. No one was injured and the fire was quickly under control, but not before causing about \$50,000 worth of damage. Because their garage didn't have any smoke alarms, there would have been no warning of the impending danger had it not been for Dauber. In fact, according to Hoffman, the fire would have been life-threatening less than 15 minutes after the Wegmanns were outside. "Had Dauber not persisted, our house would have been engulfed in flames," Sara Wegmann said. "Dauber was our only warning. Dauber saved our lives."



Grassley Q & A: **Backlogs Continue at the VA**

Question: What new action has Congress taken to fix systemic flaws at the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA)?

Answer: During the Obama administration, widely reported scandals involving wait times and delayed patient care at VA health facilities prompted a series of legislative reforms, including passage of a new Veterans Choice program to cut wait times and improve access to medical care. Congress added \$16 billion to build more facilities, hire more medical staff and allowed eligible veterans to seek services outside the VA medical system. New tools also were enacted to root out wrongdoing and mismanagement at the VA, the second largest bureaucracy in the federal government. It was imperative to purge wrongdoing that was weighing down the mission of the department. And yet, many of those implicated in the wait time scandal were still employed years after it was exposed despite the pledge by the newly appointed VA Secretary to clean house. This allowed a flawed mindset to fester and further corrode morale among the majority of the conscientious workforce at the VA. The Department of Veterans Affairs employs hundreds of thousands of medical staff and personnel to administer benefits and services to the more than 18 million veterans living in communities across the country. The VA operates 1,221 outpatient facilities, 144 hospitals and 300 veterans centers. For the millions of men and women who wore the uniform in service and sacrifice to our nation, it is the nation's sacred duty to deliver the benefits promised to these patriots and their families for their military service. Congress is working to ensure these promises are upheld, particularly as shortfalls at the VA continue to come to light. For starters, the president signed in April an extension and reform of the Choice program. And this summer Congress passed the Veterans Affairs Accountability and Whistleblower Protection Act to improve accountability procedures and to protect those who come forward to expose wrongdoing. These reforms are designed to make it easier to fire federal employees who violate the public trust in carrying out the VA's mission to serve veterans. Other measures include prohibiting bonuses and relocation expenses for those found guilty of wrongdoing or abuse and shortening the time frame to avert endless appeals for employee grievance proceedings. The patient wait time scandal underscores that even one bad apple can spoil the entire barrel. It is demoralizing to the thousands of public servants who work day in and day out to do right by veterans. Sweeping evidence under the bureaucratic rug only poisons the culture at the sprawling federal bureaucracy and puts the well-being of veterans at risk. Doctoring the books to cover up wrongdoing and gaming the scheduling system to hide patient backlogs are egregious abuses of the public trust. Our system of checks and balances is strengthened by the courage of whistleblowers who come forward with the truth to improve good government and public services.

"It's like a one-time code every time you use it, so it's just harder to duplicate that compared to a regular plain old debit card," Grineski says.

She does concede that the timing on the insert/removal process can be confusing, but Grineski adds that over 80 other countries have already fully converted to the EMV system. Well, if everyone else were jumping off of a bridge, would you do it too?

Okay, so that doesn't really apply here. But still, there has to be something more sinister going on, right? Are we headed into some futuristic, "Matrix" style world that simpletons like me will never be able to understand?

As it turns out, not really. A brochure that Rogers hands me about EMV recalls VCRs, cassettes, CDs and vinyl records (although hipsters may argue with you on the last item) followed by the inevitable punchline: old technologies become obsolete, and new ones replace them. She forgot about our appointment on Monday, but as always, she remains remarkably prepared.

"It's been coming for so long," Rogers says of the chip. "We are so far behind.'

By now, I've mostly been convinced, although Rogers gets a good dig in while I'm walking out the door.

You're just going to turn around and write a sarcastic article about why you hate chip cards, aren't you?" she asks me. "I can't wait to see it.'

She knows me too well.

This is the future, and all I can do is accept it. But there's still a catch: even with the improved encryption, hackers are finding ways to get around it, albeit less successfully, and obviously, the two types of cards are no different when it comes to online transactions as that requires the entry of a number.

Nothing is perfect, and the chip revolution is irreversible at this point. Before long, swiping a card will be as anachronistic as shopping at K-Mart, calling your friends on a landline phone or finding out about an engagement somewhere other than Facebook. I suppose that as a snarky columnist in the middle of nowhere, I'll just have to get over this minor inconvenience and realize how lucky I am in the grand scheme of things.

After work on Monday, I went to Brother's to grab some quick groceries, and after successfully remembering all four items on my list, I got ready for the big moment. Would I pull it off? Would I shudder under pressure? Could I successfully perform this banal transaction that no one else in the store would ever have any reason to remember?

\$22.76 was my total, and I did it. I held the chip in for just the right amount of time, and my card was accepted. It's a bold new world out there, but I now know that I can face each day and conquer it with an enthusiasm unknown to mankind.

In short, chip cards aren't so bad after all.

Question: What have you learned about wait times for veterans seeking treatment at Iowa's VA facilities?

Answer: Unfortunately, it appears my Senate office was provided inaccurate information from the Department of Veterans Affairs when I sought specific details about wait times that extended beyond 90 days for Iowa veterans seeking an appointment. It's upsetting to receive misleading information from a federal agency entrusted to serve Americans, most especially when the issue involves the health and welfare of veterans seeking medical care. Through many years of conducting oversight, I have learned that effective oversight requires tenacity and that transparency brings accountability. That's why I also work to strengthen whistleblower protections for those who put their livelihoods on the line to expose wrongdoing within the sprawling federal bureaucracy. In this particular case, a whistleblower provided information to my office that conflicted with information provided by the VA. Remarkably, and contrary to the VA's initial assertions, the data provided by the whistleblower revealed that hundreds of veterans in Iowa were waiting for an appointment between one and two years, which VA has since acknowledged is accurate. This is entirely unacceptable. Considering the dark cloud hanging over the VA since the scandal was exposed three years ago, it's even more remarkable VA staff would provide misleading and false information to my inquiry about backlogs for Iowa's two VA hospitals. While the VA maintains it was a misunderstanding, I clarified multiple times that I was seeking information on waits for appointments beyond 90 days, and you would think the VA would make a special effort to be fully transparent on this subject given its checkered past. It is abundantly clear that the VA needs to get out of a defensive posture and work to promote a culture of transparency and reform. Rest assured, I will continue working to conduct robust oversight and enact reforms that bring about effective changes needed to uphold the promises made to America's veterans.



First Christian Reformed Church to celebrate 150 years

Mid-America Publishing WELLSBURG - They are celebrating a century and a half at the First Christian Reformed Church just west of Wellsburg.

The church has lots of special events, including key ones on the weekend of July 8 and July 9.

The church, which also draws membership from Grundy and Hardin counties, is celebrating the 150th year anniversarv.

Programs will feature comments by former pastors on Saturday evening July 8th and Sunday July 9, the morning service will be led by the Executive Director of the Christian Reformed Church of North America who is from Grand Rapids, Michigan, and will be the special speaker. The afternoon Sunday will feature a quartet from Des Moines called Higher Power, who will present a program of gospel music.

Throughout the events there will be a wealth of food.

Researchers into the church story say it was wat back in the 19th Century Europe that living conditions spurred a group of people to move half way around the world to America, and then some of them to Grundy and Hardin Counties.

ship the congregation was first called the True Dutch Reformed Church of Steamboat Rock. Wellsburg hadn't been chartered as a city yet. For the first thirty-five years services were mostly in Dutch, then later a switch to the German language, though during World War One, the switch was made to English.

Still German appeared in the church until 1937. Snippets of "Platt" are still spoken today, researchers say.

Not all was contentment, they say. At one point disagreements among the faithful saw the church doors temporarily nailed shut on a Sunday morning in 1867.

The church reached its member peak in about 1967. On the celebration of its centennial the congregation decided to build a new church building replacing the 1888 fathering spot.

Now, on the occasion of the 150-year anniversary a couple of days of programs are promised.

"On the evening of Saturday, July 8, we will be looking back at what went on before. We will be hearing from former pastors telling about the time they led our congregation. Rev. Les Kuiper was here from September 1976 to July 1981, Rev. John Gorter September 1981 A young ministry student to November 1986. Pastor and Rev. Tom Vos February 1987 to be held after the service, which will provide opportunity for visiting and renewing memories with our speakers

On Sunday morning we will be honored to have as our speaker, Dr. Steven Timmermans from Grand Rapids, Michigan. Dr. Timmermans is Executive Director of the Christian Reformed Church in North America. Permits for a Display Fireworks Display may be granted to municipalities, fair associations, amusement parks, organizations or groups of individuals. Any applicant requesting a permit for a Fireworks Display shall have an operator eighteen (18) years of age or older who possesses a current and valid ATF permit as set forth by the Safe Explosives Act and is certified by a nationally-recognized fireworks safety organization such as the American Pyrotechnic Association or the Pyrotechnics Guild International, Inc. The representative signing the application on behalf of a municipality, fair association, amusement park, and/or organization or group of individuals shall be at least eighteen (18) years of age.

13.05 Display Fireworks Displays. Search for and Disposal of Unexploded Fireworks. The discharge of fireworks under a permit granted pursuant to this Ordinance will not be allowed before sunrise or after eleven o'clock (11:00) p.m. of the date of the Fireworks Display unless otherwise permitted by the Grundy County Board of Supervisors at the time the permit application is approved. Any Display Fireworks that remain unexploded after the Fireworks Display shall be immediately disposed of or removed for storage or disposal in a safe manner by the operator who, as soon as practicable after the conclusion of the Fireworks Display, shall make a complete and thorough search for any Display Fireworks or fuses, or parts thereof, which have not exploded or functioned.

Penalty, Violation of any of the 13.06 provisions of this Ordinance shall constitute a simple misdemeanor.

SECTION 4. REPEALER. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances heretofore enacted by the Board of Supervisors of Grundy County, Iowa, in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby expressly repealed

SECTION 5. SEPARABILITY OF PRO-VISIONS. It is the intention of the Board of Supervisors that each section, paragraph, sentence, clause and provision of this Ordinance is separable, and if any such provision is held unconstitutional or invalid for any reason, such decision shall not affect the remainder of this Ordinance or any part thereof other than that affected by such decision.

SECTION 6. EFFECTIVE DATE. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication as provided by law.

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

Iowa slowly easing into firework sales

The Iowa legislature may have made firework sales legal in the state, but three weeks into the first window of legal firework sales, the pyrotechnic novelties are still difficult to find.

While cities prepared for a flood of vendors taking advantage of the newly legalized firework sales, locations that sell even novelty second class fireworks are few and far between. However, this may change as the 4th of July nears and temporary vendors start setting up for the holiday weekend.

As of June 22, 614 licenses have been issued by the Iowa Fire Marshal to area retailers and temporary vendors. Licenses have been split nearly evenly between sellers dedicated primarily to fireworks and those simply adding them to their regular inventory.

Of the 300 primary fireworks licenses, most were issued to temporary structures that will sell a wide range of fireworks in tents or stands as Independence Day approaches.

"For the first year, the temp structures seem to be the way to go," said Vince Bellino, manager of Bellino Fireworks, who applied for 50 individual licenses to set up temporary locations across the state.

With a location in Omaha, NE, Bellino Fireworks has been in business for 35 years, frequently selling fireworks to Iowans just across the state line in the Council Bluffs area. Now that the state allows fireworks sales, Bellino is eager to take advantage of the newly opened opportunities to his east.

"We're very excited about the opportunity to expand our business in Iowa," said Bellino. "It really is a perfect fit for us to expand into."

Iowa's easing of fireworks restrictions did not come as a surprise to Bellino. In fact, it is something

ly set up permanent fireworks shops in the state, for now his company is easing into the new market with temporary stands. These stands will still sell a full range of Second Class and First Class fireworks, from novelty items like Champaign poppers and smoke bombs to larger artillery with 100g to 500g loads.

"We carry pretty much everything you can find at the national level," said Bellino.

While Bellino's company is providing the fireworks, the stands themselves will be locally run. Individuals or organizations can apply to staff the stands for a percentage of the sales. This includes non-profit groups looking for fundraising opportunities.

"There's no investment on their end," said Bellino, "They don't have to buy product from us or rent the tent. We provide everything they need to run the fireworks

"It's been a bit of a struggle," said

Bellino, who has to read the city ordinance for every potential temporary location to see where they can go and what they can do. Bellino says that the Des Moines area in particular has been difficult to work in, and his company has filed lawsuits against cities in the area that have restricted fireworks sales.

That whole Des Moines area has been really restrictive," said Bellino. "We're more than happy to work with the cities; it just seems like they're trying to put up a roadblock for us."

The cities around Des Moines are far from the only ones to restrict fireworks through city ordinance. While some communities are waiting to see how the law plays out before proposing any ordinance changes, others have been more proactive, requiring city issued permits to sell fireworks if not banning

amended their ordinance requiring that vendors looking to sell consumer fireworks must submit an application to the city fire marshal, which includes a site plan for the location and the appropriate state license. The fire marshal then forwards the application to a city review committee, that determines whether the request is in compliance with state and city code. At that point, the site must be inspected by the city fire marshal before approval is granted.

"Once that's done, then we'll get the fireworks in," said Florea.

Even without city restriction, not every retailer licensed to sell commercial fireworks will be utilizing that license either. Shopko in Hampton has been approved to sell fireworks by the state, however Assistant Manager Lori VanDyke says she has received no communication about stocking fireworks from the corporate office.

"I haven't heard anything on carrying anything other than our sparklers," said VanDyke.


Between the legal issues surrounding the state law and city ordinances and Iowa retailers taking a measured approach when it comes to stocking the new commodity, it looks like the state will be slowly easing its way through it's first year of commercial firework sales.

These restrictions aren't just an issue for out-of-state vendors to deal with, but for local retailers as well. For retailers selling a limited quantity of fireworks, the vast majority of licenses were issued to big box stores like Wal-Mart and Shopko or to pharmacies like Walgreen's and CVS, but while they may have the state issued license, that doesn't mean you'll find fireworks on the floor yet.

"We don't have any of it yet," said Troy Florea, Executive of Logistics at Target in Mason City.

Target's Mason City location is licensed to sell smaller Second Class novelty items; however, as of last week, store managers were still working with the city to get permission to sell the new product.

Earlier this month, Mason City

Keeping the standard

D-NH baseball taking pride in winning ways By JAKE RYDER

Mid-America Publishing DIKE – As the Dike-New Hartford baseball team re-enters the top five in the Class 2A rankings from the Iowa High School Baseball Coaches Association, the message delivered is that D-NH continues to be about reloading, not rebuilding.

"The last two years, we've won about 50 games," D-NH baseball head coach Sean Leonard said of the Wolverines' 19-win and 30-win seasons in the last two summers. "There's a standard at this point that they want to show people that they could have the torch passed to them and do the same thing. ... We rely on the seniors each year to lead us and they take pride in that."

Leading the way are seniors Trent Johnson and Ethan Weichers, who often find themselves in consecutive spots in the heart of D-NH's batting order. Through the end of last week, Johnson had a .469 batting average and seven doubles, both team-leading marks, while Weichers hits .397 with four doubles, a team-best 22 RBI, and six home runs, the third-highest total of any player in Class 2A.

"I've grown up with this senior class my whole life," Johnson said. "The bond really started in third and fourth grade playing competitively with each other. But everyone's a leader, no one's the main leader, we all lead by example and hold our younger guys accountable for what they do.'

"The Weichers added, seniors last year did a great job preparing us, and the new guys are stepping up and helping us win and that's just what we do, we keep winning."

It has taken more than six home runs to push D-NH to a 20-3 run so far this season, but Leonard can't deny the appeal of the longball when Weichers steps to the plate.

"Everyone feeds off that,


