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### **Speculation** swirls around potential **Grassley** appointment By ROBERT MAHARRY

The Grundy Register DES MOINES- Will Pat Grassley be Iowa's next Secre-

tary of Agriculture? A lot of people seem to think so.

The Republican State Rep-



whose district includes southern Butler, northern Hardin and all of Grundy County, is the presumptive favorite to move into the role if current secretary Bill Northey accepts a newly created position—Undersecretary for Farm Production and Conservation—at the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA), but so far, he's been mum on the rumors: at press time, Grassley had not responded to multiple requests for comment. And those close to Northey say they aren't expecting the federal appointment to happen overnight.

"It's still likely months out. If (Northey) would be confirmed, the governor would have the opportunity to appoint somebody," said Dustin Vande Hoef, the communications director for Secretary Northey. "He's definitely open to (the position) and will consider it."

Grassley, a farmer by trade and a graduate of Dike-New Hartford High School, is the grandson of U.S. Senator Chuck Grassley (R-Iowa), and both

The Grundy Register GRUNDY COUNTY- The legalization of consumer fireworks in Iowa has been a long time coming, and with Republican Governor Terry Branstad's signing of Senate File 489 last week, the days of driving across state lines to obtain them may

Although local governmental agencies now have the authority to restrict fireworks usage further than what state law allows, only one of the five most populous communities in Grundy County has indicated any interest in doing so thus far.


"We're relatively We're usually kind of lenient around the Fourth of July with stuff," Grundy County Sheriff Rick Penning said. "Fireworks have not been a big issue."

The law allows residents (an age requirement is not specified) to purchase and possess "first and second-class consumer fireworks"-which include aerial shell kits and reloadable tubes, chasers, helicopter and aerial spinners, firecrackers, mine and ets, Roman candles, sky rockets and bottle rockets, multiple tube devices, cone fountains, cylindrical fountains, flitter sparklers, ground and handheld sparkling devices, ground spinners, illuminating torches, toy smoke devices, wheels, and wire or dipped sparklers-between June 1 and July 8, and again between December 10

Wellsburg City Clerk Wendy Lage told The Grundy Register that the council there is considering prohibiting the use of consumer fireworks within city limits, but a final decision has not been made. The community holds an annual fireworks show during its Wellsburg Daze celebration each June, and that

## Zinkula wins silver medal at world science fair

GRUNDY CENTER – Earlier this month, sophomore Reegan Zinkula became the first ever Grundy Center High School student to attend the International Sustainable World Engineering, Energy, and Environment Project Olympiad, or, ISWEEEP, held in Houston,

Texas. Zinkula was invited to showcase at the prestigious event after capturing the attention of judges at the ISU State Science and Technology Fair in Ames last month.

The project that impressed judges so highly? A prototype pit fan designed to harness wind power and convert it into a renewable energy source - an idea Zinkula came up with for a science fair project when she was in 8th grade.

The idea, Zinkula said, is simple: every hog confinement has a pit fan, which provides much-needed ventilation for the animals living in the facility, as well as the humans working inside of it. But, instead of using up energy to run those fans endlessly, why not let the fans create their own energy?

"If the renewable energy is right there, why not harness it?" Zinkula said.

And that's what she set out to do three years ago, when she designed her first plans for the pit fan renewable energy source.

Zinkula's fan operates much like a regular wind turbine, which uses blades to capture the power of the wind, which is

### Local residents visit remote area of Mexico with FRB

The Grundy Register CONRAD- Living in America, it's easy to lose perspective on just how good we really have it: if we're hungry, we can go to the grocery store. If we're cold, we can turn on the heater, and if we're hot, we can turn on the air conditioning. Conrad First Presbyterian Church Pastor Kerry Carson and member Ryan Callaway recently spent a week in the southern Mexican state of Chiapas learning about food production and the work that the Food Resource Bank (FRB) is doing to help increase food se-

"You're always reminded when you step outside the borders of the United States that we are the unusual ones. We live unlike most of the rest of the world, and so it was really good

curity in the developing region.

to get reminded that most of the world lives very simply and differently than we do," Carson said. "What you take away from a trip like this is the hope that you see because they're beginning to make some progress."

Carson, Callaway and other members of the FRB delegation travelled to the villages of San Jose la Nueva, El Llano Alto, Juan de Grijalva, El Bosque, El Chanal and La Siberia while staying in San Cristobal de las Casas during the trip, and the residents there are now beginning to grow garden sized plots of crops to be used for both their own sustenance and resale for a profit. Families are often divided as men will relocate to other areas to find work (some even illegally immigrate to the U.S.)

in order to send money back, and one of the goals of FRB is to help create a local infrastructure that helps keeps more families together.

The trip was Callaway's first with the FRB, and it was eye opening, to say the least.

"You can see worldwide issues on TV, and you can hear or listen to firsthand testimonials from many people that have traveled and seen poverty and hunger in the world. But until

you experience and lay your own eyes on it, you will never understand," Callaway said. "FRB does work and does good in the world, not with handouts, but with education and tools to enrich and sustain food security."

The Chiapas region, located near the Guatemalan border on southern tip of the country, is deeply embedded in Mayan culture (the native language is still prevalent there), and it has experienced serious upheaval over

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the last few decades as the leftist Zapatista uprising pitted poor, indigenous farmers against the Mexican federal government. To this day, it remains one of the poorest, underdeveloped and culturally isolated states in all of Mexico.

"Communication was not easy, but we were some of the only folks who got the chance to be exposed to that," Carson said

While the native religion and Christianity are different in practice, Carson added that they fit together beautifully: the Mayan religion is very focused on nature and the four cardinal points of the compass—the sky, the earth, the wind and the sun.

"By entering into the Mayan side of that spirituality, we gained a lot of respect from them," Carson said. "We're reading the same Bible and all."

The FRB is a nonprofit organization that calls itself "a Christian response to hunger" and works to promote food stability in underdeveloped countries. It celebrated reaching more than 1,000,000 people in 2014

## Edwards appointed as chairperson of national mathematics panel

GRUNDY CENTER – Dr.
Clay Edwards, who has taught
math at Grundy Center Middle
School for the last 11 years,
was recently honored by the
National Council of Teachers of Mathematics (NCTM)
when he was appointed as the
chairperson of the organization's Math Teaching in Middle School editorial panel.

Edwards has served on the panel for the last two years, but he will be transitioning into his new leadership role for his third and final year of a three-year term.

His new role will see him taking on more duties with the editorial panel, which reviews educational manuscripts pertaining to middle school math instruction.

Superintendent Jerry Schutz said he is extremely proud of Edwards for his appointment as chair of the national council, adding that it sheds a positive light on what Edwards is doing in Grundy Center.

"It's a tremendous honor not only for Mr. Edwards, but for Grundy Center, for him to be leading this editorial board on a national council," Schutz said. "He's not only an outstanding colleague and professional to his fellow employees, but he's a fantastic teacher. He's had a very strong influence on our entire math program here and our middle school students have done phenomenally under his tutelage, and I know he'll bring that same strong influence to

his work on the panel."

Schutz said that Edwards' creativity and skill in teaching math in a new and novel way is what really makes him stand out as an educator.

When asked what he thinks makes him stand out as a math teacher, Edwards answered that he believes it's his non-traditional approach to teaching.

"My classroom is a little different than most teachers' classrooms," Edwards said. "We focus a lot on self-paced instruction. I don't sit up front and lecture. Most of my focus is going around the room and individually working with students on what they need help with."

Edwards said that over the years, he has found out the traditional method of teaching doesn't always work the best.

"Some students move faster than others and they have to wait around for everyone else to finish up before the class moves on. For others, the

traditional pace is too fast for them, and they need time to go back and relook at a couple of problems," he said. "I try not to make it about how much time we spend learning, but about how well they understand it."

Another thing Edwards stresses is the importance of improvement.

'Everything they turn in, I give them feedback on, and then they can go back and correct and fix things," he said. "In a normal class, you get a grade and that's it. But if I give someone 70 percent, there's still 30 percent they don't know, so we always go back and correct things. This really gives the kids a chance to see how they're getting better at things, but it is hard work to go through and give that level of feedback to every student. That's why I'm here at 5:45 or 6 every morning and I don't leave until 4:30 or 5. It takes a long time, but it's worth it."

But it's not just student improvement; Edwards said he also focuses a lot on improving himself as a teacher.

"I think it's important to keep learning and continuing to find a better way to do things," he said. "Just like I want the students to improve, I want to improve too."

Edwards said he looks forward to continuing his improvement as an educator through his leadership role with the NCTM's Math Teaching in Middle School Editorial Panel.

event would continue as previously scheduled.

"At this point, I think (council members) want to restrict them in town, but we don't know what that will look like vet," Lage said.

City officials in Grundy Center, Reinbeck, Dike and Conrad have not discussed any regulations beyond the state law.

Grundy Center City Clerk Kristy Sawyer said the topic hasn't come up yet with the city council, and she doesn't believe the city will enact a ban or restrict usage.

"Fireworks really aren't an issue here," Sawyer said. "We have very few people applying for [fireworks] permits. I don't think we've had any [applications] since I've been here, and that's just about five years."

Luke Osterhaus, a member of the Dike city council, said he and the other Dike council members informally discussed the new law, and that it's his understanding the city of Dike is not planning any restrictions

"I would say that we're happy there's a little more liberty as far as fireworks go and being able to utilize those, but it's our wish that members of the community would still respect the responsibility as far as being safe and respecting things like noise ordinances for the other folks that live in town," Osterhaus said.

He added that the city usually doesn't get many applications for fireworks use, except for Flashing Thunder Fireworks, a Mitchell-based company that puts on the annual fireworks show at Dike's Watermelon Days event.

"We really haven't had any problems in the past, and we don't anticipate any in the future," Osterhaus said. "Personally, my approach is that we should enjoy the freedoms we have and celebrate the fact that we got one back we didn't have before."

Grundy County Democratic Party Chairwoman Tracy Freese, who also lives in Dike and is seen as a potential state house candidate in 2018, has a different view on the matter.

"As usual, Republicans into that profit motive and bringing in transients from out of state so that our children can be threatened—for profits," she said. "When you take into account that health professionals, police officers and firefighters are standing up against this bill and saying it would put children at further risk of injuries, no, I would not have voted for this."

Freese added that she would lobby both the city and the county for stringent restrictions on fireworks usage and would work to ensure that anyone selling them has the proper permits. The city councils in nearby Waterloo and Cedar Falls have pondered bans on city property and even outright bans within city limits during meetings this

"The fireworks situation is geared at children," she said. "I don't know that Republicans really had a big concern about who's going to be using these fireworks.'

The county's board of supervisors, currently comprised of five Republicans, informally agreed that it would not place any additional restrictions on fireworks use and would no longer require permit applications (on the advice of County Attorney Erika Allen) during Monday morning's regular meeting.

"I don't think we have anything necessary to do anymore. The only thing we could do is ban them in Grundy County, and I don't think that would be very popular," Supervisor Harlyn Riekena, who represents the Wellsburg area, said. "Maybe the cities want to do something, but I sure don't see anything countywide."

According to County Auditor Rhonda Deters, she has received a total of 111 permit applications (which are then sent to the supervisors for approval) since 2011, and not one has ever been rejected. The applications, however, only cover the rural and unincorporated areas of the county, and any requests made within city limits are handled by their respective jurisdictions.

"The county doesn't receive any money for them. There was no charge for the permit, so it's not like we're losing revenue. It's just a change in procedure, really," Deters said.

Rick Smith of Grundy Center, who is the son of Grundy County Supervisor Barb Smith and works in the fireworks are far more concerned about boon for the state as companies seek to expand into a new mar-

> "Fireworks is a highly profitable business. It's probably at

least a 100 percent markup business on average," he said.

With his type 54 license to display commercial fireworks, Smith has an extensive background in the field, and while he does worry about safety, he believes

Iowans can handle their newfound freedom: the state will join all of its neighbors except for Illinois in legalizing some form of fireworks with the change.

"My concern is the average person who buys multiple firework cakes or mortars but does not have the experience to light them safely," Smith said. "I would prefer that fireworks remain legal the whole calendar year, but I think that there's an easy compromise out there that can be reached."

Fireworks will only be permitted between 9:00 a.m. and 10:00 p.m. with exceptions on the weekend of the Fourth of July (allowed until 11:00 p.m. on the fourth and the Saturdays and Sundays immediately preceding and following it) and New Year's Eve (allowed until 12:30 a.m. on the immediately following day and allowed until 11:00 p.m. on the Saturdays and Sundays immediately preceding and following the holiday), and Penning evinced consternation about the time frame regulations, suggesting that the law could be improved. Most of all, he warned residents to be smart when using explosives.

"The main goal is just the safety for everybody regardless of what the law is. We want everybody to use common sense,"

Using fireworks outside of the allotted timeframe is still punishable as a simple misdemeanor with a fine of at least \$250, and sellers are required to pay an annual fee of \$1,000 for a permanent building that devotes more than 50 percent of its floor space to the sale or display of consumer fireworks, \$500 for a temporary structure that does the same, \$400 for retailers that devote less than 50 percent of their floor space to displaying or selling fireworks and fees of either \$100 or \$400 for community groups that sell them.

cy study estimated that fireworks would generate \$17.8 million in state revenue for fiscal year 2017 and \$24.8 million in FY2018.

And just like she felt a calling to join TC, Voss says she now feels that she has served

"Just like I felt called to be here by the Lord, God really did impress on my heart that it was time to step down and let other leadership take over," she said. are still involved in their family operation outside of New Hartford. The representative has long been rumored to be next in line for his 83-year-old grandfather's seat when he steps down, and the elder Grassley responded to a request for comment by correctly noting that any decision to appoint a secretary of agriculture would come from

the governor. The governor (presumably Kim Reynolds by the time a nomination is made) has the authority to make such an appointment, and the position, which is full-time and pays an annual salary of \$103,212, would be on the ballot again in 2018. Grundy County Republican Party Chairman Brian Andersen of Reinbeck told The Grundy Register that Grassley would be a perfect fit for the job.

"I think, in general, my first reactions on both counts (referring to Grassley and Northey) would be 'sorry to see them go," Andersen said. "Pat has an excellent background of being on a local family farm. He'd be very well suited to that position, and we'd support him 100 per-

A change could also bode for an interesting congressional race in House district 50 come next fall: former state representative Annette Sweeney (R-Alden), who lost to Grassley in a 2012 primary that came about as a result of redistricting, could emerge as a leading candidate in the solidly Republican district.

"We just have a lot of chess pieces that have to move, so I'm not sure what's going to happen," Sweeney said in a phone

According to Sweeney, district 50 would be politically similar to the area she formerly represented, which was comprised of all of Hardin County and western Marshall County, with its conservative leanings and agricultural focus. Although she has not been in contact with Bruce Rastetter, the Hubbard-based Republican donor and former president of the Board of Regents who is seen as a kingmaker in Iowa politics. Sweeney noted that the two have a longstanding personal friendship dating back to their days in the same Sunday school

Sources say that 34-year-old businesswoman Tracy Freese of Dike, the new chair of the Grundy County Democrats, is likely to enter the fray. Freese confirmed that she has been approached, but Grassley's potential appointment has no bearing on her decision of whether or not to run.

Grassley defeated Democratic challenger Doris Fritz of Grundy Center by over 40 percentage points in each of the last two elections. He was first elected to the state house in 2006 and is currently the chairman of the appropriations committee. He served as the chairman of the agriculture committee from 2013 to 2016.

## Supervisors increase easement payments for Conrad bridge

GRUNDY CENTER- After some discussion, the Grundy County Board of Supervisors voted to increase the easement payments to landowners by approximately \$3,000 per acre for the bridge replacement project just west of Conrad during its regular meeting on Monday morning.

The board had originally agreed to pay \$8,498 per acre for just less than two affected acres on the \$710,000 bridge replacement, but a nearby farm sold at auction for \$11,500 per acre, prompting an increased request from the landowners. One of them, JoAnn Klein, also wishes to be compensated for her trees that are destroyed by the project, and assistant county engineer Steve Cox lamented that he had had very little contact with the Rays, one of the land-owning families who now live in California.

"I don't like paying any more, but I don't think we have a choice," Supervisor Jim Ross, who represents the area in question, said.

The bridge, which has been closed due to flooding since 2013 and is jointly owned by the city of Conrad and the county, will be funded primarily through a Federal Emergency

Management Agency (FEMA) program, with the county covering the remaining \$142,000.

Supervisor Harlyn Riekena, however, did not believe that the county should cave to the landowners' demands, noting that none of the land surrounding the bridge is farmed and that they had already gone through this process once. 'We passed a resolution.

Let's stick with it," he said.

If the landowners were to reject an offer, the county would be forced to either pursue condemnation or abandon the project altogether, and Cox did say that Klein, the Conrad family and the Hooper family all seemed to want a bridge. A motion to pay an extra \$6,000 for land and \$3,000 for trees eventually carried by a 4-1 vote, with Riekena the lone "nay."

County Engineer Gary Mauer presented two bids for tandem axle trucks, and the county accepted the low bid of \$95,225 from Don's Truck Sales of Fairbank for a Freightliner 114SD. Mauer also reported that Petersen Contractors Inc. would begin work on farm-to-market resurfacing sometime this week.

Regional Coordinator of Disability Services Todd Rickert spoke to the board about utility payments in the new annex building, and it was determined

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that County Social Services will occupy 28 percent of the new facility. Thus, it will pay 28 percent of the utility costs, and Grundy County will cover the remaining expense. He went on to mention that he would like to obtain an automated external defibrillator (AED) for the new building.

County Attorney Erika Allen has advised the board that it would no longer need to issue fireworks permits due to the recent change in state law, and it was indicated that the board would most likely rescind its previous ordinance regarding the permits at a future meeting.

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


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## Conrad council considers food truck ordinance

CONRAD- Food trucks are the latest culinary craze in urban areas across the country, and they could be making their way to Conrad if the city council eventually agrees to adopt an ordinance discussed at last Thursday night's regular meet-

Maria's Tacos of Marshalltown brought a truck to town last summer with the understanding that the owners would later open a brick and mortar location on Main Street in half of the old Carol's building, but they have since backed out, once again leaving Conrad without a true restaurant for breakfast and lunch. While city officials and members of the Community Development Committee (CDC) have worked hard to bring another eatery to fill the void left when Carol's closed in 2014, it hasn't been an easy task.

"I see the need to have more diversity. I don't think it hurts," Councilman Brad Murty said. "It's tough to get a restaurant in town, and the history has not been very successful."

Blaine's on Main, which was originally slated to occupy the other half of the old Carol's facility, is still planning to open at a new location on Main Street, but a definitive timeline on that process has not been established. Council members and Mayor Jeff Martin agreed that if food trucks are allowed, they need to pay some form of tax to the city.

"It needs to be regulated. It needs to be a cost factor so they contribute to the city similar to what a storefront does," Martin said, adding that the trucks should operate on city property.

Councilman Todd Schnathorst pointed out that while nearby Grundy Center is twice the size of Conrad, it has about 10 different food options within its limits, and the city should encourage economic growth in any way possible.

"I believe in free enterprise," he said. "You can't prevent another grocery store from coming to town. You can't prevent another bar from coming to town, and competition is good."

Not all of the council members, however, were so enthusiastic.

"I don't love them, but I think it's a good way to try to

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bring business in," Councilwoman Diane Miller said.

No official action was taken, and the council is expected to further explore a potential ordinance at future meetings.

The council voted 4-0 (Rvan Callaway was absent) to approve plan "A" for street patching on Center Street and South Main Street and sharing the cost with Grundy County. According to the estimate, it would consist of a three-inch mill, three-inch hot mix asphalt (HMA) fill and 16 patches on Center Street and an eight inch mill and eight inch HMA fill on South Main Street. The total cost to the city is \$23,326.52, and the county will cover the other \$30.509.41. as the two entities share ownership of the roads. The other plan would have patched just nine locations on Center Street and cost the city a total of \$16,105.93.

A memorandum of understanding from Alliant Energy, which plans to construct a substation just east of city property, received unanimous approval,

Alliant will provide a onetime payment of \$10,000 to the city for a fence replacement.

Krista Grant spoke on behalf of the Beaman-Conrad Emergency Response Team (BCERTS) to request the authority to purchase a new defibrillator at a cost of \$19,655.90 with funds from the holdover budget. She noted that other towns in the area have paid between \$26,000 and \$30,000 for the apparatuses, and the proposal was approved unanimously.

#### IN OTHER BUSINESS, the council:

- Accepted the resignation of Lisa Purvis as the zoning ad-
- Approved the renewal of the law enforcement contract with Grundy County at a cost increase of 3 ½ percent.
- Approved a budget amendment that includes the money spent on the fire station project after a brief public hearing.
- Approved a pay request of \$5,985 for landscaping outside of the new fire station.

• Approved an outside permit for RJ's Lounge during Black Dirt Days and a cigarette permit for Casey's General Store as part of the consent agenda.

#### **BCLUW** board approves Dreamland improvement project

board of education voted to
spend almost \$40,000 on improvements and repairs to the
Dreamland playground in Conrad at its regular meeting on
Monday morning.

Hay Construction of Marshalltown submitted a bid not to exceed \$39,323, and board member LJ Kopsa, who runs a construction business of his own, questioned the proposal—specifically the plan to use treated lumber—before ultimately voting for it.

"Are we just putting a Band-Aid on it for two years and then deciding in two years that it's not worth it anymore?" he asked. "I hate to put \$40,000 toward filling holes in those boards."

Board President Beth Neff

noted, however, that the playground was a community effort, and she felt that the district owed it to everyone who helped make it a possibility to maintain and improve it. A motion from Brian Feldpausch eventually passed 4-0 (Eric Engle, Shannan Callaway and Adam Probasco were absent). Work on the project is expected to commence this summer.

In personnel news, the board accepted two resignations: Industrial Arts teacher David Butler is taking a private sector job in Eldora after over a decade with the district, and vocal music instructor Bradley Wilson will leave his post at the end of the year, his fourth at BCLUW. Wilson, a native of the Des Moines area, cited the need to pursue other opportunities closer to family and friends as the reason for his

departure. Michael Jahn, who is currently employed with the Tripoli school district, will replace Wilson at the beginning of the 2017-2018 school year.

Retired social studies teach-

er and former athletic director John Schill will return to the district as a middle school custodian and bus driver in the fall, and Victoria Woosley was hired as the food service director. Shelly Wogan was also approved to become a middle school cook.

The board accepted a low bid of \$63,650 from B and G HVAC for the high school auditorium, and Kapaun and Brown also submitted a bid. After a brief public hearing, the board voted unanimously to approve a budget amendment that will increase "total other expenditures" from \$1,348,543 to \$1,660,000 due

to HVAC and other project

Superintendent Ben Petty mentioned the possibility of hiring a half time Title 1 teacher with carryover funds, and near the end of the meeting, he told the board he had been approached about students traveling overseas. Petty opined that he was leery of getting the district involved due to both costs and liability issues, and board members agreed that BCLUW should not sponsor such trips.

#### IN OTHER BUSINESS, the board:

- Approved the sharing agreement for a school nurse with Grundy Center.
- Approved the commendations.
- Approved the summer recreation contracts.

#### 75 Years Ago This Week -1942



The navy department's message reads: "The navy department regrets to inform you that according to the records Gordon Carnes was performing his duty in the service of his country in the Manila bay area when it capitulated, and he will be carried on the records as missing, pending further information." The day following the receipt of the message from the navy department Mrs. Carnes got a letter from her son written from Corregidor on March 13. He stated in that letter that he was as well as could be expected, but that he had not received any mail for four months. He asked his mother to "keep her chin up and not to worry.'

#### guard up when entering the outdoors, along comes another concern. It is called the POW virus. Powassan is related to the West Nile virus, according to the CDC. Historically, it's carried by several different ticks:

And we have talked before about how people will exhibit a telltale bullseye rash following a tick bite – and others will not. How some will have flu-like symptoms following becoming infected by the bacterium and others will not. After many vears, still much is not known or spoken about Lyme's Disease.

And then along comes this new concern related to the deer According to Richard Wat-

kins, M.D., an associate professor of internal medicine at Northeastern Ohio Medical University and an infectious diseases physician in Akron, Ohio, this is bad news because Powassan can result in a more severe illness than Lyme. Ten percent of Powassan virus cases are fatal, according to the CDC. "Some people will only have a fever while others develop neurological symptoms such as confusion and seizures," Dr. Watkins says. Long-term neurological complications are common. Ten to fifteen percent of people that do get infected do have life-long neurological conditions afterward.

Other symptoms include chills, muscle aches and pains, headaches, and paralysis, Dr. Adalja says, noting that the disease can also cause encephalitis, which is an inflammation of the brain that can be deadly or lead to permanent disability, or meningitis, an inflammation of the

membranes that surround the brain and spinal cord. However, he adds, like Zika virus, some people can contract Powassan virus and have no symptoms at

There's no specific treatment for the disease. "Patients who develop seizures can be treated with antiseizure medications, and physical and occupational therapy can help those with neurological complications," Dr. Watkins says. People with severe cases are typically hospitalized, observed, and given supportive care to help control their symptoms, Dr. Adalja says.

Pennsylvania and New Jersey are among the states with cases of Powassan virus. However, the biggest number of cases reported to the CDC in recent years have been from Wisconsin, Minnesota – our neighbors to the North.

That's about all I could find on this virus in my search. A virus that has similarities to West Nile and the Zika viruses. But am I staying clear of the woods or other natural habitats? No. My precautions will be what we have been saying for years. If you go into woods or high grass, be sure to wear insect repellent with DEET, and check yourself from head-to-toe afterward. Also make sure to protect and check your pets.



then run through a generator to generate electricity, which could potentially be used to power the entire confinement.

Right now, her project is still in the testing phase, but Zinkula reports that the judges at ISWEEEP encouraged her to continue developing the project, which shows a lot of promise.

"It was really great talking to the judges and hearing their feedback about my project," she

said. "They all said to keep going down the path I'm on, and I plan on doing that."

Zinkula said she hopes to have a final product, or at least an idea of one, by the end of high school.

"It's a long process," she said. "Even now, three years in, it's taken me so long to get to where I'm at with this."

But, Zinkula said she's determined to finish the project, and to eventually create a pit fan that could be used commercially.

"It's really been my goal to just create a different renewable energy source that can be used to clean up the ag industry, and to save farmers money," she said.

Zinkula managed to earn herself a silver medal at the ISWEEEP event, along with a gold at the state science fair in April, and several secondary awards, including an award for Women in Science.

The results were fruitful for both teams.








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
